Juliaetta Citizens Urged To Be at City Water Meeting

Members of the Juliaetta City Council will be meeting at City Hall on Tuesday, July 8 and one of the prime subjects under consideration will be consideration of revising the water rates to help cover cost of recent water line extensions and improvements.

Mrs. Carolyn Gravelle said Monday that an open public meeting will be held prior to the regular council session and will begin at 6:30. Purpose of the public meeting, as stated by Mayor Harold Freeman last week, is to gain public input on the water rate issue.

Mrs. Gravelle said one of the preliminary proposals involves raising the rates to \$4.00 per month for a 4,000 gallon minimum with 50c per 1,000 gallons over the minimum. The present rate, Mrs. Gravelle added is \$3.50 for a 6,000 gallon minimum and a 25c per thousand gallon for each thousand gallons over the minimum.

A recent shooting incident in Juliaetta brought a sharp warning from Juliaetta city officials and law enforcement officers. A .22 rifle was fired through an open door and into a wall of the Nolan Norden residence. Children were playing on the porch of the house at the time. It is against the law to discharge firearms within the city limits.



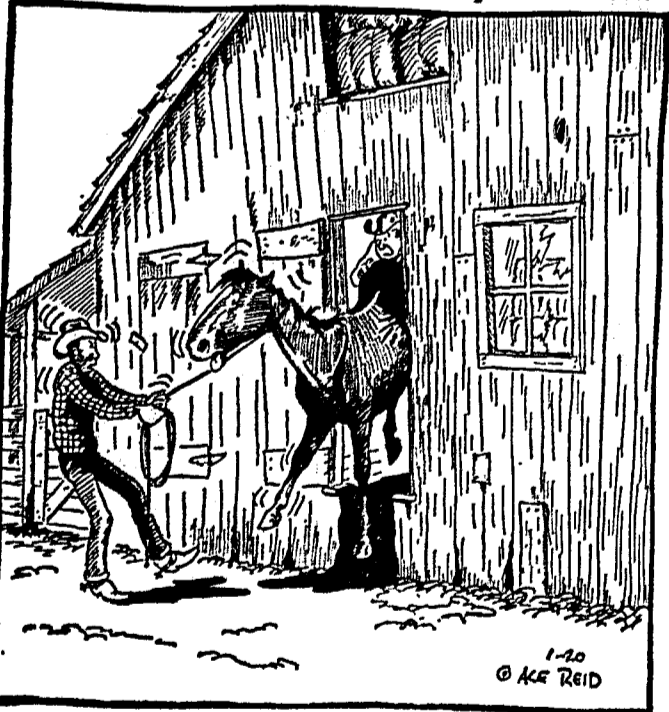

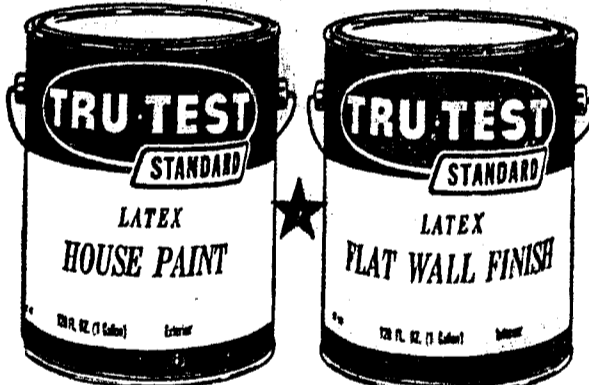
