## Juliaetta Receives Federal Grant For Sewer System

Word was received Monday that the City of Juliaetta will receive a grant of \$235,000 from the federal Housing and Urban Development agency. The money is to be used to cover part of the cost of sewer collection lines.

Juliaetta, in the process of updating and improving its water and sewer facilities, has previously received an Environmental Protection Agency grant of federal money of \$400,962 and a state-aid grant of \$79,678 to cover the cost of a treatment plant and truck collection line. In addition residents of Juliaetta have passed two bond issues authorizing obligation bonds up to the amount of \$315,000 for sewer and water systems. Mayor Harold Freeman said Tuesday morning that borrowing or the issuing of bonds would not be as much as originally anticipated because of this latest HUD grant.

With the assurance of this grant Freeman said the city hopes to begin work on the sewer system as soon as possible. Juliaetta has also received a \$118,000 direct aid grant from the Economic Development Agency for drilling a new well and installing a six-inch line to carry the water from the well to the upper reservoir. The city is faced with raising another \$30,000 for further water improvements and maintenance, Freeman said. Some of the money may come from the already approved bond issues and the remainder would have to come from increased water rates. The council will be meeting Tuesday night to consider rate increases.

## Juliaetta Youth, Michael Cook, 8, Dies After Accident

An 8-year-old Juliaetta boy died Sunday at 10:30 p.m. at St. Joseph's Hospital of injuries received when he was pinned between two parked trucks.

Michael A. Cook was taken to the hospital in Lewiston by the Kendrick Juliaetta ambulance after being injured on the Middle Fork-Potlatch Canyon Road near Juliaetta. He arrived at 9 p.m. and died at 10:30, a hospital spokesman said.

The Latah County sheriff's office reported the youth and five other persons were picking cherries when the accident occurred about 7:45 p.m.

The report said David L. Cook, 17, of Juliaetta had parked a 1966 International truck on a slight grade behind a 1973 International that had been parked by James E. Cook, 18, also of Juliaetta. Both drivers were cousins of the deceased. The motor of the older truck had been left running. The youth was standing between the two unattended vehicles when the emergency brake of the truck at the rear failed and it rolled forward, pinning him.

The Cook youth was born April 13, 1967, at St. Maries to Lloyd and Joyce Cook. The family moved to Pierce in 1970 and to Juliaetta in 1973.

The boy was a first-grade student at Juliaetta Grade School.

He is survived by his parents, a brother, Rodney L. Cook and two sisters, Rena D. Cook and Melinda Cook, all at the family home; his maternal grandmother, Emma Smith, and his maternal grandfather, Ray Lounsbury, both of St. Maries.

The funeral will be held Wednesday at 10 a.m. at the Juliaetta City Cemetery with the Bishop Glen Dixon of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints officiating. Malcolm's Brower-Wann Funeral Chapel was in charge of arrangements.

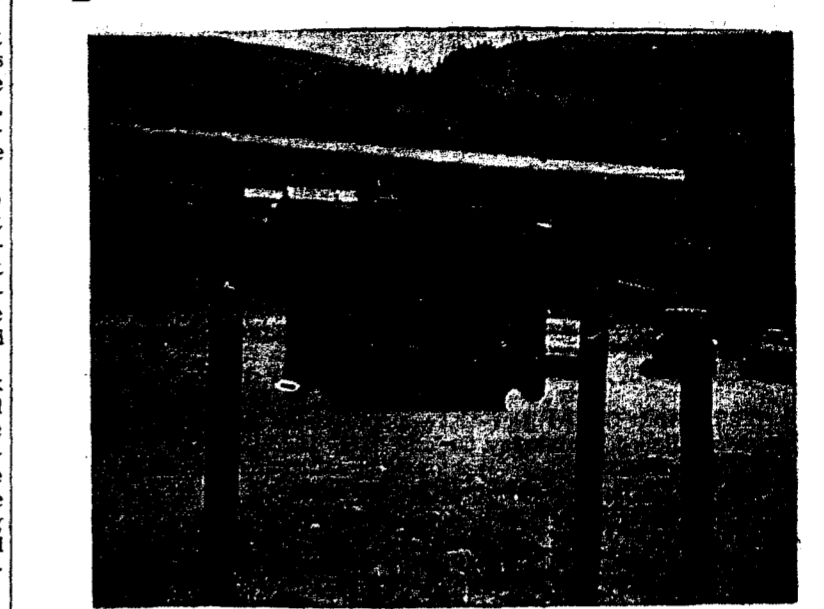

## School of Country Living Opens; Enrollment Small



Carla Emery's controversial School of Country Living opened officially June 30 with seven teachers, 25 volunteer workers-students, tremendous outside press and television coverage and eight students. Even the prestigious "Newsweek" magazine had a staff writer in Kendrick for two days to cover the opening.

While the opening of the School attracted much regional and even national publicity, the beginning efforts of the project drew little interest locally and if there was any expected social or environmental impact on Juliaetta or Kendrick, it has yet to be felt.

Students who come for the opening session of classes arrived from south Idaho, California and Lewiston, although Mrs. Diane Groseclose of the Livingroom Mimeographer, reported two local residents were taking a class in pattern making.

Pattern making, bread baking, how to harness a team of horses, goat milking, spinning and weaving and bee keeping are a few of the classes now in session. "Bee keeping is proving very popular," said Mrs. Groseclose.

In addition to the eight original

students, several others have arrived after the school opened and there is an estimated 15 students now at the school. In addition to these many of the 25 volunteer workers are also attending some of the classes, Diane indicated.

It can be expected that enrollment at the school will grow, especially in view of the publicity the school has received.

Gerald C. Lubenow, from the San Francisco office of Newsweek magazine, was in Kendrick from Tuesday to Thursday of last week as was a television crew from KLEW in Lewiston and from KUID at the University of Idaho. Reporters from Lewiston and Moscow also were in town last week and the July 4th issue of the Tribune of Lewiston carried almost a two-page spread on Carla and the School.

Students and workers at the school have planted 20 acres of the former ranch to garden, according to Darlene Nye, one of the office managers at the Mimeographer. Sale of produce raised on the farm is one method the school hopes to use as a fund-raising project, as there is no charge for the classes.

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**IDAHO DEPT. OF EMPLOYMENT**

Activity picked up somewhat in Latah county's job market, as the local employment office placed a total of 16 persons on jobs during the past week. Frank Hartstein, Moscow office manager for the Idaho Department of Employment said that this is quite a comeback from the decline to 5 reported during the previous week. A year ago the total was 12 for the last full week in June. Hartstein said his office received a total of 26 new job listings during the week and that 23 remained unfilled at the end of business Friday. Workers are needed to fill such jobs as an auto mechanic, secretary, typ-

ists, clothing salesman, truck driver, cooks, bartender (with license), and domestic workers. With the better weather being promised, Hartstein said jobs should begin opening up a little more rapid pace. The total number of persons currently seeking unemployment insurance declined again this week, despite the fact that 82 persons filed new claims for benefits. Hartstein reports indicated that 379 persons throughout the county were seeking jobless pay compared with 398 at the end of the previous week. At the close of last fiscal year there were only 238 persons in Latah Co. seeking such compensation. Little

change was noted in the various communities throughout the county, and increases from last year were spread out, primarily among these communities having the heavier populations. Moscow's figures were 224 currently, 221 last week, compared with 152 last year. At Troy the totals were 78 now, down from last week's 91, but up from last year's 44. Pottlatch showed the same trend going from last week's 87 to the current 53, but still double the 26 of a year ago. At Genesee the totals were 9, 12, and 10, and in the Kendrick area the totals are 15, 15, and 6 last year. Hartstein indicated that unemploy-

**YOUR GAME DEPARTMENT**

Poor Showing

Considering the large number of waterfowl hunters nationwide, they made a poor showing at public hearings on an Interior Department environmental impact statement on duck hunting. The Interior Department said only 483 people attended the hearings, 65 formal statements were presented, and 48,000 letters and petitions expressed the views of more than 78,000 citizens. The outcome of the process that began last year when anti-hunting groups brought a suit against the Interior Department, is that the framework states need to set migratory game bird seasons will be delayed about 20 days. Idaho usually gets the information it needs to set its dove seasons by July 8. Waterfowl data usually arrives before August 8. This year, the dates have been set back to July 21 and August 27. The extra time is to allow the season framework to be published in the Federal Register to give the public a chance to comment on the information gathered year-round by the Fish and Wildlife Service, Ducks Unlimited and U. S. and Canadian conservation agencies. Interior said it would continue to issue annual migratory bird hunting regulations as it has done since 1918. The 10 to 20 days delay is not expected to set back opening dates for waterfowl or dove hunting this year.

**Boating Rules**  
The Idaho Department of Fish and Game is seeking for tighter controls on the number of boats and people allowed to use float or power boats on certain Idaho streams. In a statement submitted to the Idaho Outfitters and Guides Board on proposed changes in that board's rules and regulations the department expressed concern with "proposed regulation 22b which establishes a limit to the number of outfitter licenses issued for power or float boating." "We recommend the board give serious thought to limiting the number of boats that each licensed outfitter may operate and the number of trips an outfitter might be permitted to take in any one season," he stated. The statement said there may be a future need to limit the number of people permitted on any one float or power boat trip to protect the wild life resource. The department also asked for serious consideration of regulating the size and operation of jet-powered boats. "The backwash from a jet-powered boat can be quite damaging to streams and rivers where the banks are unprotected by heavy rubble," the department said. The proposed changes in the board's rules would limit the power of boat motors and the number of licenses issued on sections of the Salmon, Snake, Henry's Fork, Teton, Jarbidge, Bruneau, Owyhee, Clearwater, Selway and St. Joe Rivers.

**Gun Controls**  
Petitions asking for repeal of gun control laws are being circulated throughout the United States. The goal is 2 million signatures. A group called Citizens Committee for the Right to Keep and Bear Arms with offices in Washington, D. C., and Bellevue, Washington, hopes to get the signatures to back a package of pro-gun owner legislation introduced by Senator James A. McClure, R-Idaho. Signers are being asked to support repeal of the Gun Control Act of 1968, to penalize the use of firearms in the commission of any felony; to prevent the Consumer Product Safety Commission from banning handgun ammunition; and to prohibit a ban on the use of lead shot for waterfowl hunting. John M. Snyder, spokesman for the committee, said petitions are available at the groups Washington, D. C. office at 1735 DeSales Street, N. W., Suite 500.

**MENINGITIS**

Meningitis is an inflammation of the meninges, the membranes that cover the brain and the spinal cord. It can be caused by any of several bacteria, viruses or other microscopic organisms, according to the Idaho Medical Association. One of the common forms of meningitis is caused by the meningococcus, a bacterium which seems to infect only human beings. The meningococcus is responsible for most meningitis epidemics. Antibiotics and sulfa drugs are effective against the meningococcus and if treatment is started promptly most patients recover. Meningitis usually begins suddenly with a severe headache and stiffness and pain in the neck, shoulders, and back. A high fever, nausea and vomiting are other symptoms, and in some cases, a skin rash of bright red spots may appear. When meningitis is suspected, a physician should be called at once.

**Job Placements In Latah County Decline Slightly**

Job opportunities decreased in the Moscow area primarily due to the holiday week, according to Frank Hartstein, Moscow Office manager for the Idaho Department of Employment. Hartstein reported that his office received only 11 new jobs during the week and that only seven workers were placed on jobs. This compared with 26 new job listings during the previous week and 16 workers given job finding help. 11 jobs remain open now, including those for a secretary, domestic workers, and cafe workers, mechanics and others.

Unemployment insurance claimants took a jump during the week and additional school connected workers filed new claims for benefits. Many of the workers were those who were not "covered" under regular unemployment insurance program but may now be eligible under the Special Unemployment Assistance Act. Additionally, one lumber operation in the county shut down, forcing unemployment on a number of woodworkers. At the end of the week there were a total of 405 persons seeking jobless pay compared with 379 during the previous week, and 235 at the same time a year ago. 57 persons filed new claims during the week, but 31 persons discontinued their claims. In the immediate Moscow area the total number of jobless pay seekers rose from 224 to 243 compared with only 153 at the same time a year ago. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill-Elk River area the total rose from 78 to 89 and was more than double the number of persons seeking benefits last Independence Day. 49 checks were going into the Pollatch area, down a few from the 53 of last week but almost double the number going into that area a year ago. At Genesee the total are 7 now, 9 last week, and 12 last year, and at Kendrick the totals are 17, 15, and 7.

**RADIOS BEEP DEER HERD THREATS**

A cool wind whistles among the rocks as biologists set up spotting scopes and settle in for a mule deer watch.

By daybreak, they will be searching the ridges near Kimberly for lone mule deer does. The biologists are too far away to hope for picking out fawns hidden in the sagebrush. And, it's fawns they must find.

The crew of eight spreads out along a ridge and waits. They know the does will spend only a few minutes nursing the fawns early in the morning. The spotting must be quick and accurate.

About 6:30 a. m. a doe is spotted as she meanders casually along the side of the ridge.

She is too casual, and Bob Autenrieth, a biologist with the Idaho Department of Fish and Game is suspicious. He figures it will take the doe a couple of hours to make contact with her fawn. The apparent casual approach is a cover; he doe doesn't want to go to the fawn until she is sure a predator isn't watching.

Autenrieth is off by about seven minutes in his predicted time. The doe nurses two fawns for only a few minutes before hiding them again in a stand of mountain mahogany.

The man who spotted the fawns' hiding place stays with his scope and directs the rest of the crew by walkie talkie to the mahogany thicket.

The first fawn is easy to find, but the second one, hidden on a lava ledge takes more searching.

Both female fawns are measured for conformation, weighed, ear tagged and collared. The collars hold a 12-ounce radio transmitter that detects and beeps the slightest movement.

Autenrieth says the signal can be picked up from about a mile to a mile and a half away. The transmitters are connected to elastic collars with folds stitched to let them expand as the fawn grows.

Beeps coming from the radio collars will tell department biologists what is happening to fawns in the South Hills mule deer herd, what is the biggest threat to the fawns in the area.

The South Hills herd has been known as a healthy, productive herd but Autenrieth still is suspicious. "Oregon and Nevada did similar

studies," he said, "and Oregon found coyotes were its biggest problem. In Nevada, they found fawns dying mostly of malnutrition."

"We've had green-up here in the South Hills since February and the does are in excellent condition," he said. So far, the crew has spotted only two coyotes.

Unless some coyotes pick off a few fawns or a disease crops up, the department should still be hearing from most of the fawn's transmitters when hunters arrive in October.

The first few days of listening means the biologists must be very careful. Fawns a few days old will hide or sleep about 23 hours out of every day. Is the fawn simply lying motionless or has it died?

Biologists will depend up the transmitter and will not go to the fawns again. They do not want to break up the doe-fawn bond more than the one time necessary for buckling on the transmitter.

After about 10-4 days, the fawns will start moving with the does and racking will be easier. While the fawn is small and shakey on its feet is the critical time. Its only defense is its ability to make itself invisible to a predator.

Ten of the South Hills fawns carry transmitters now and as they grow, the transmitters will alert biologists to any threat to that herd's future.
