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36 percent drop from the previous year. Receipts from crops were down 43.3 percent while receipts from livestock and livestock products fell 21.5 percent. These reductions reflect continuing downward price trends rather than decreased quantities marketed, says the Newsletter.

Mineral production for the first 3 months of 1975 was generally above last year's levels. Lead, zinc, silver and copper production jumped considerably during the quarter but gold production fell some 16.2 percent below last year's figures. The price of gold is slightly above from that of a year ago, while silver prices are slightly lower.

Production of phosphate rock, elemental phosphates and fertilizer has continued at maximum levels and cement production is at maximum plant capacity.

Lumber production for the first 4 months totalled 422.7 million board feet, a drop of 27 percent compared with the corresponding period in 1974. However, residential construction in May was down just 1.2 from a year ago, notes the Newsletter.

Total employment in Idaho in May was 348,000 an increase of 3.1% above last year. This continuing strong employment pattern is in major contrast to the national pattern. At 275,500 nonagricultural wage and salary employment remains 15,200 jobs ahead of a year ago, and has consistently increased throughout the 1st 5 months of 1975. Manufacturing employment was 2.9% above May of last year while food processing employment was 10.6% greater than 1 year ago.

The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 7.5%, down from 7.7 in April, but still higher than the 5.5 percent a year ago.

Retail sales and services for the July '74—May '75 period in Idaho jumped 13.7% above last year's figures. However, new car and truck sales were off 4.1% when compared with last year, says First Security.

Economic activity in the state was generally mixed during the 2nd quarter, reports the Newsletter. Agricultural cash receipts, lumber production, and transportation equipment were all well below year-ago levels. Conversely, trade, silver and zinc production and employment figures all rose during the quarter.

Cash receipts from farm marketing in Idaho, for the January-April period totalled \$30.8 million, which is

the region with special interest in health planning," he stated.

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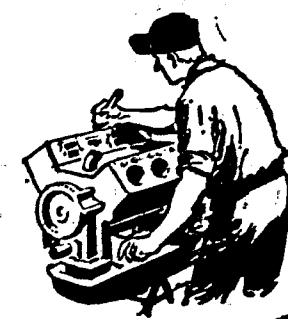
