Paul Supple, 82, Little Bear Ridge Rancher, Passes Monday, August 11

Paul Supple, 82, a Kendrick sheep rancher, died of a congestive heart ailment at 1:15 p. m. Monday at the Orchard Nursing Home where he had been a patient since July 31.

A German-born immigrant, Supple never owned a car until about a year ago and always drove his team and rubber-tired wagon to town from his sheep ranch up on Little Bear. He was born June 6, 1893 at Wirthenberg, Germany to Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Supple. He received his education there and served in the German Army from 1914 to 1918 in Germany. He married Paulina Saar at Wirthenberg on Dec. 18, 1915, and they immigrated to the United States in 1929, settling first at Hanford, Wash. The Supples moved to Kendrick to raise sheep in June of 1943 and resided on Little Bear Ridge. Mrs. Supple passed away in 1984 and Paul remained on the ranch until entering the nursing home.

He is survived by two sons, Eugene Supple of Houston, Texas and Ervin Supple of Smith River, California; one brother, August Supple of Germany; two grandsons, Timothy Supple of Weippe, Idaho and Daniel Supple of Pierce, five grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

The funeral will be held Thursday at 10:30 a. m. at the Cameron Lutheran Church with the Rev. Theo Mueske officiating. Burial will follow at the Cameron Lutheran Cemetery with Malcolm's Brower-Wann Funeral home in charge of arrangements.

Public Hearing Set For Genesee's Comprehensive Plan

Genesee's Planning and Zoning Commission is actively seeking citizen input on the city's proposed comprehensive plan. A public hearing date is set for August 25, 1975, at 7:30 p. m. in the City Hall, by the Commission for the public to express their viewpoints on the plan and Genesee's future. At the public hearing all questions regarding the plans and its functions shall be answered.

Commission members have been working on the development of the comprehensive plan for over one year and feels that the plan will be a most useful guide to the Commission, City Council, and the public for the current and future developments in Genesee.

Various civic organizations in Genesee are currently being contacted to individually gather their ideas on Genesee's future and to further explain the comprehensive plan. Those groups who were not contacted but wish to be informed on the proposed plan are urged to contact John Luedke, Chairman of the Planning and Zoning Commission.

All residents and community organizations who are not able to attend the public hearing are urged to contact one of the Commission members and relate their particular desires to them on Genesee's current problems and future goals. The Planning Commission's current membership includes: Luedke, Ron Bevans, Faye Derganc, Betty Greenwell, Elvon Hampton, Jerry Lanehan, and Adrian Nelson.

The contents of the comprehensive plan will be discussed at the public hearing. Topics of discussion include economy, population, land use, recreation, housing, natural resources, community facilities and services, hazardous areas, transportation, special areas and sites, and implementation.

The Planning Commission will prepare and recommend a zoning ordinance to the City Council based on the comprehensive plan when it is adopted. The purpose of the zoning ordinance is to protect the health, safety and welfare of the Genesee residents and to protect the property values of the residents' land.

Area Wheat Harvest Begins; Crops Good

Harvesting of the 1975 small grain crop in both Kendrick and Genesee area got underway last weekend and while it is still too early to predict yields or quality, warehousemen sounded a cautiously optimistic note. The pea harvest is past the peak this week on what appears to be a slightly below average year.

"Slow—just getting started," was the way Bob Watts, manager of Kendrick Rochdale sized up the harvest Tuesday afternoon. Bob said Doug Harris brought in the first load of wheat last Wednesday afternoon and Glen Wegner delivered some from his fields Saturday. Most of the Rochdale grain is saved for seed purposes and Watts reported that almost all that has come in has been of "real

good quality." Pea harvest for the Rochdale is practically over. Very little barley has come into Rochdale warehouses.

Howard Hoffman, manager of Lewiston Grain Grower's, Kendrick warehouses said the first wheat came in Saturday and looked like good quality grain. Peas are slowing down now as most of LGG growers have finished up in the lower elevations and are moving back now toward the mountains. Just one or two loads of barley have been delivered.

Auditioning For "Country Living" Music Show Begins

Warren Duffy and Joe Saylor, Los Angeles radio producers arrived in Kendrick Monday afternoon to audition musical talent for a series of radio programs they will produce in connection with Carla Emery's School of Country Living. They told the Gazette Monday afternoon that they already had twelve groups and individuals scheduled for auditions and that they hoped to be able to produce a pilot program from the material gathered during their week's stay in the area.

"Really great," was Saylor's summation of progress Tuesday afternoon.

Basically what the two men want to create is a radio program compatible with Mrs. Emery's dedication to a return to the mode of living as self-sufficiently as possible. The musical portion of the program, leaning toward folk, gospel, and tradition selections will be interspersed into a program built around Carla and the people she comes into contact with.

"Maybe on one show Carla might be talking to a beekeeper, a rabbit raiser or an expert on purchasing land," Saylor said.

Plans are to make the pilot show available to a number of stations and if this is well received, to produce more shows and, in time, hope for several hundred stations to pick-up and use the series. "We'll also be in touch with Carla as she goes around the country," Duffy said. "And if she is into anything interesting, we'll be there too."

Both men emphasized that they were interested in keeping the music as authentic as possible. "We're not going to go around telling anyone that we're going to make them a 'Star' "Saylor added. "This is just a good chance for some local musicians to get national exposure without ever having to leave town," he said.

The two men have already contacted the Music Department of the University of Idaho which is interested in the musical aspect of the show, especially since it is geared to capture a portion of area traditional music. Both had high praise for the interest and cooperation they have received from the University.

The actual taping of music will be accomplished in a section of the textile barn out at the "School of Country Living." The program will be edited back to Los Angeles in a regular studio.

Both Saylor and Duffy are staying at the school this week. For Saylor, who was raised in the country and who was lured out of semi-retirement to produce the show, the rural atmosphere is completely enjoyable. For Duffy, who is city bred, it's a brand-new experience.

Three-Fourths Finished

Up at Genesee, Bill Robinson of Asgrow Seed said harvest was past the peak for his company in this area and "going along pretty good." Robinson estimated approximately three-fourths of the peas grown under Asgrow contract have been cut. The quality of this year's crop looks good, he added.

Mike Martinez, assistant manager of Genesee Union Warehouse, told the Gazette Tuesday afternoon that he estimated 55 percent of the pea harvest is completed and as the fields to the north ripen, the quality of peas is improving.

Mike said as of Tuesday afternoon 78,000 bushels of wheat has been taken in at both warehouses. This is approximately 5 percent of the expected crop. Wheat has been coming mostly from the Rim so far with Zenner Bros. Weber in combining operations. "We've been having some 5,000 bushel days," Mike said. Deliveries so far, 150 tons of barley has been taken into Genesee Union as of Tuesday with 140 tons of this being the new Steptoe spring seed variety.

Mike estimated that harvest in the Genesee area is about 15 percent completed.

Weather in all areas continues to favor the farmer with warm days and cool nights. Temperatures have been reaching into the low and middle nineties during the day and dropping down to the mid fifties at night.

Health Needs of Children Before School Stressed

All children entering the first, fifth, or ninth grade should have a physical examination before starting school. These particular years are chosen because this is a time when most children grow more rapidly.

Children entering first grade should be immunized. Boosters are advised for tetanus, diphtheria and polio and a tuberculin skin test. Your child should also be immunized against measles, rubella (3-day measles) and mumps. All of these immunizations are available from your private physician or from the public health department.

Immunization clinics are held the first and third Wednesdays of each month from 1:30 to 4:30 p. m. in Moscow at the courthouse. No charge is made for the immunizations, except for the mumps vaccine.

Some suggestions for your child before beginning first grade include to have these activities mastered:

1. Tying and untying his/her shoes.
2. Dressing and undressing him/herself.
3. Going to the toilet unaided.
4. Knowing his or her name, address and telephone number and parents name.
5. Knows the way to and from school.

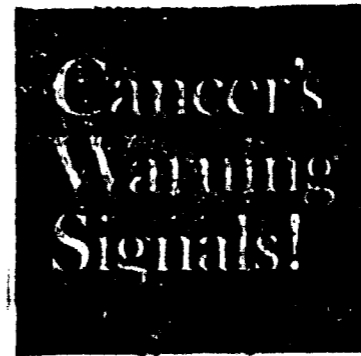

Arthritis Still A Crippler

Arthritis is a general word that includes several different but related illnesses, according to the Idaho Medical Association.

The most common forms are rheumatoid arthritis and osteoarthritis. They are different ailments, but each produce painful, deformed joints.

Rheumatoid arthritis is a disease of the entire body. More common among women than men, it usually begins between the years of 20 and 35. Early symptoms may include weakness, fever, loss of appetite and loss of weight. The skin, especially the hands, may be cold and clammy. Mental depression is common and the patient both feels and looks below par. One or more joints become inflamed and swollen.

An attack may begin with gradually increasing discomfort, or a sudden, dramatic, confining illness. Attacks may come and go for no apparent reason.

Treatment reduces the pain of an

acute attack and usually increases the range of motion. Often an attack of pain in the joint will subside by itself. It usually returns. Quacks capitalize on this tendency of the disease to fluctuate, claiming credit for the treatment being used at the time when actually it is a period of natural remission.

Osteoarthritis, although a less dramatic illness, is less likely to go away when it does develop. Eventually the joint is injured, the smooth lining membrane and the cartilage pads are damaged and permanent changes within the joint limit its motion and make any movement painful.

Everyone will develop osteoarthritis if he lives long enough. It begins in middle age, usually in a hip, knee, shoulder or the back. Often it is first noticed after an injury to a joint.

Management of arthritis involves skilled supervision over a lifetime. The physician individualizes his treatment. Drugs may be prescribed to reduce pain and inflammation. Exercise and physical therapy may be recommended. Weight control may be necessary. Any arthritic patient often must learn new ways to do common daily tasks. Rest is essential. Secret remedies and mystical deception have no place in the care of arthritis. It is not a condition for self-prescribed remedies and nostrums.

Rotary Lawn Mowers Can Be Dangerous

The tips of a spinning rotary lawn mower blade move at 100 to 200 miles an hour. They can hurl a pebble like a gun firing a bullet, cautions the Idaho Medical Association.

The blade of the average mower spins at 2,000 to 4,000 revolutions per minute. The Consumer Product Safety Commission estimates that more than 40,000 American children and adults will be injured in power mower mishaps by the time the grass turns brown next fall.

To protect yourself and others, know the controls. Read the owner's manual carefully. Know how to stop the engine quickly.

Make sure the lawn is clear of sticks, stones, wire and debris which could be thrown from the blade. Keep children and pets at safe distance. Disengage blade and drive clutches before starting. Stop the engine when you leave the mower, even for a moment and when crossing drives, walks, or roads. Keep feet away from blades. Be

Five-Four Given Job Finding Help In Latah County

54 Latah county workers were given job finding help during the past week by the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment.

Frank Hartstein, office manager, said that this figure included about 40 young people placed on jobs under the GETA Summer Youth Program. Other adult workers placed were about the same as the previous week when 13 workers were successfully referred to jobs. During the first week in August a year ago, 25 workers, including some summer youth were placed through the Moscow employment office. At the end of the week there were 28 jobs still open, up from last week's figure of 22, but a little below last year's 35. Currently Hartstein said employers are preparing their work crews for the fall of the year when activities increase. Retail stores, service establishments and professional offices are seeking to supplement present work forces in anticipation of additional demands for their services when the universities in the area resume classes. A need has arisen for bookkeepers, secretaries, cooks and waitresses, domestic workers, farm workers, an auto mechanic, bartender, laborers, and other types of workers.

Despite the fact that more people are being placed on jobs and despite the fact that workers are needed, the number of persons continuing to seek unemployment insurance continues to rise. 45 persons filed new claims for benefits during the past week, up from the previous week's figure at 41, and from last year's figure at 37. At the end of the week, the number of persons still claiming jobless pay rose to 431 from the previous week's 418. This was nearly 200 more than the 234 persons who were claiming benefits a year ago. Contributing factors to the increase were the Special Unemployment Assistance programs which make persons eligible for benefits whose jobs in the past were not covered by the program and the various extended plans and programs which stretch out the number of weeks of benefits to which a person might be entitled. In the immediate Moscow area there are now 271 persons seeking benefits, up from last week's 257, and more than 100 over the 161 of a year ago. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area, the total continues to grow from last week's 76 to the current 83, which is more than double last year's 36. A similar pattern is noted in the Pottlatch area although this week's total is one less than a week ago, the current 51 is more than last year's 24. At Genesee, the total is now 8, a week ago 10, and a year ago 9, showing little change. At Kendrick the totals are 5, 18, and 2.

Approximately 150 Killed Each Year by Lightning

As many as 150 persons are killed in the United States each year because of lightning. Most fatalities occur outdoors on farms, golf courses, or in recreational areas, notes the Idaho Medical Association.

Thunderstorm clouds discharge a great electrical force which is released upon contact with a metal object, such as a rod or golf club, or an object imbedded in the earth, such as a tree.

A lightning stroke contains between 12,000 and 200,000 amperes of current. The current of a 100-watt electric light bulb, by contrast, is less than one ampere.

The cause of death in lightning fatalities is usually sudden cardiac arrest or severe injury to the nervous system. A fatal outcome will invariably occur suddenly or within a few hours. If the victim survives 24 hours, a return to normal is likely.

If you are outside during a thunder storm, do not raise any metal object, even an umbrella above your head. Avoid hilltops, open spaces and isolated areas.

Stay away from trees, golf carts, scooters, tractors and other farm machinery.

This is picnic weather and picnics call for a cool, green, grassy spot beside running water. Only one thing can really ruin a good picnic site, and that is burned grass, shrubs, and trees. Careless people who go away and leave a campfire to burn up the picnic site, could easily drive out their fire with water and leave the picnic spot for another day. Be a careful camper.

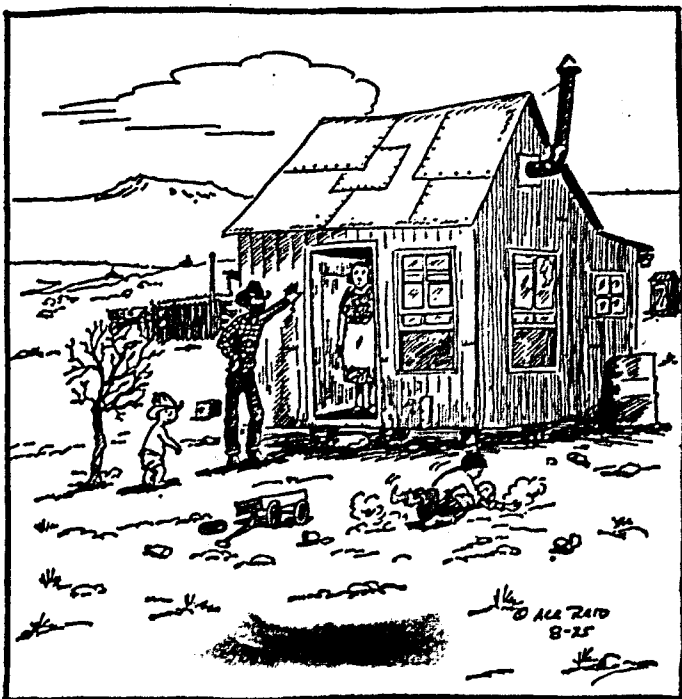
