

Boosters are advised for tetanus, diphtheria and polio and a tuberculin skin test. Your child should also be immunized against measles, rubella (3-day measles) and mumps. All of these immunizations are available from your private physician or from the public health department. Immunization clinics are held the first and third Wedensdays of each month from 1:30 to 4:30 p. m. in Moscow at the courthouse. No charge is made for the immunizations, except for the mumps vaccine. Some suggestions for your child before beginning first grade include to have these activities mastered: 1. Tying and untying his/her shoes. 2. Dressing and undressing him/ herself.

A lightning stroke contains be-tween 12,000 and 200,000 amperes of current. The current of a 100-watt electric light bulb, by contrast, is less

than one ampere. The cause of death in lightning fatalities is usually sudden cardiac arrest or severe injury to the nervous system. A fatal outcome will invariably occur suddenly or within a few hours. If the victim survives 24 hours, a return to normal is likely. If you are outside during a thunder storm, do not raise any metal object, even an umbrella above your head. Avoid hilltops, open spaces and iso-






