

Genesee Schools Ready For September 2nd Opening

Supt. Lester C. Diehl has announced that Genesee schools will be ready to open September 2nd for the 1975-76 school year.

High school students were pre-registered last spring, so will not have to register this fall before school. Any new students should, during the week of August 25-29 drop into the school and register.

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Gus A. Kruger, Former Cameron Farmer, Passes Sunday, Aug. 17

Gus A. Kruger, 510 Airway Ave., Lewiston, passed away at St. Joseph's hospital Sunday, August 17 at 10:45 a. m.

He had been critically ill for some time with circulation problems and pneumonia and had suffered from emphysema for the past ten years.

He was born at Immenhoff, Pommern, Germany on January 5, 1897 to Albert and Bertha Kruger, the youngest of nine children.



At the age of 14 he sailed for America in the company of two sisters—Bertha and Martha. Coming on to the Cameron area they joined two brothers, Carl and Otto, who had made the voyage earlier. There he joined his brothers in farming operations.

On October 4, 1922, he married Martha Siffow. They farmed in the Cameron area until his retirement in 1954, with the exception of several years in the mid-twenties when they operated the Cameron Store and Post Office. They lived in Kendrick from 1974 until 1964, when they moved to their present home in Lewiston Orchards.

He was a member of Grace Lutheran Church, Lewiston.

Survivors include his widow at the family home; three daughters, Mrs. John (Rosalie) Blankenship, Kendrick, Mrs. Ted (Elsie) Freeman, Lewiston, and Mrs. Kenneth (Dorothy) Sinclair, Lewiston; 11 grandchildren and 4 great-grandchildren; one sister, Mrs. Martha Rauch, Wenatchee, Wash., and numerous nieces and nephews.

Kendrick Schools To Register August 26-27; Classes Start Sept. 2

Boh Heppner, principal at Kendrick High School announced Monday that registration for grades 7 through 12 for the coming school year will be held next Tuesday and Wednesday, August 26 and 27 between the hours of 8 and 4. "Those students who can't register on these dates should give the school a call so other arrangements may be made," Heppner said.

Classes take up for the fall term Tuesday, September 2.

Mr. Heppner also reminded that all freshmen are required to have physical examinations.

The School Lunch cafeterias will be open the first day of school at both schools. There will be no change in costs of lunches from last year; children 50c and adults, 60 cents.

Student body cards will be the same price as last year—\$6.18 for Junior High and High School and \$4.12 for Elementary.

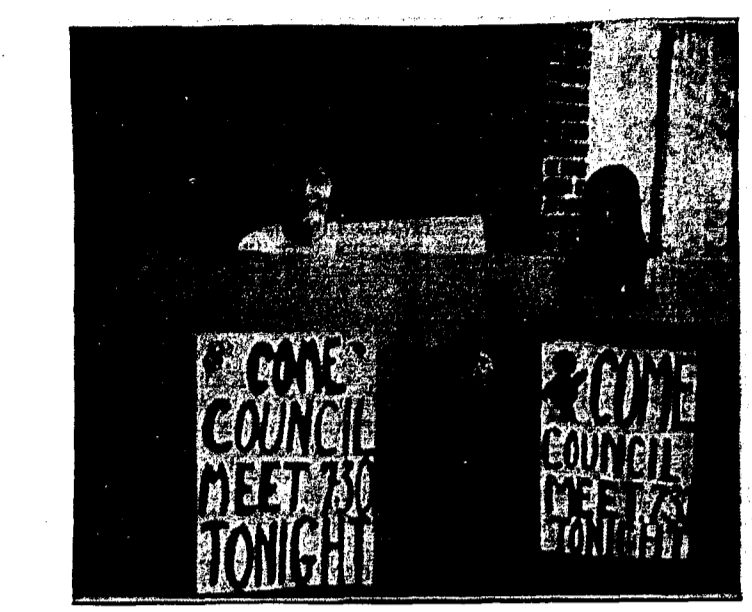

Petitions Objecting To Juliaetta Water Rate Increase Given to Council

Petitions bearing the signatures of 213 Juliaetta residents were presented to the Juliaetta city council last Wednesday evening in protest to Ordinance 195, which has increased the water rates per month for that city. The old rate was \$3.50 per month for the first 6,000 gallons of water used and 25 cents for each additional 1,000 gallons. The new rate would be \$4.00 for the first 4,000 gallons and 50 cents for each additional 1,000 gallons.

Present at the council meeting were Mayor Harold Freeman and councilmen Arthur Boe, Eugene Taylor and Fred Clemenhagen. Councilman Doug Johns was absent.

Approximately 80 people were present at the meeting as Mrs. Caroline Gravelle presented the petition which requested a reduction in rates from those specified in Ordinance No. 195. The new water rates became effective August 1.

The presentation of the petitions culminated a campaign against the new rates by Mrs. Gravelle and several others in Juliaetta.

Mayor Freeman accepted the petition and referred it to the city attorney, Glen Utzman, Moscow, who will help to make a determination of validity and the weight such petitions carry. At the meeting Mrs. Gravelle quoted from "State and Local Government in Idaho: A Reader" published by the Public Affairs Research of the University of Idaho which stated that to repeal an ordinance, a petition bearing the signatures equal to at least 25 percent of the votes cast in the last election must be presented to the council in order to send the issue to a special election. The 213 signatures on the petition presented Wednesday would apparently more than meet this criterion.

The council had prepared a fact sheet outlining the city's position. In this sheet, prepared by Water Commissioner Art Boe, it was stated that \$6,537.44 of Revenue Sharing funds were used last year to maintain this water system. The city's revenue sharing money this year has been cut from \$12,000.00 to \$3,000.00 and this has been ear-marked for street improvement. The city felt that the recent raise in water charges was the minimum raise that they could have and still maintain the water service at present level.

Listing 1974 cost figures, it was estimated by the city that its revenue sharing funds had not been used, the deficit for the water department would have been over \$7,000.

Critics of the water rate increase pointed out that over \$6,000 of expense for the water department came in the form of salaries, which they felt were out of proportion to the time city employees work with the water services.

This week Mayor Harold Freeman told the Gazette that many of the more verbal opponents of the water rate increase were, he felt, the heaviest users of water. He estimated that over half of the residents of Juliaetta used less than the 6,000-gallon minimum eight to ten months of the year.

Freeman said the cost overrun on the drilling of the new well and unforeseen problems such as pump breakdowns have added to the cost and quickly used up the \$18,000 grant. "Basically," Freeman said, "what we want to do is make the water department pay it's own way."

Councilman Resigns
Mayor Freeman said Tuesday afternoon that Fred Clemenhagen, Juliaetta councilman and finance commissioner had submitted his resignation, citing "too much outside pressure without feasible reason" as the factor which decided his action. Mayor Freeman told the Gazette he (Freeman) had several people in mind to fill out Fred's term which will expire this fall, but he had not made any definite decisions.

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School Policy As Regards Free Meals and Milk

Genesee School District No. 282 today announces its policy for free meals and milk for children unable to pay the full price of meals and milk served under the National School Lunch. Local school officials have adopted the following family size and income criteria for determining eligibility:
Mandatory Free Family Income Equal to or below
One Up to \$ 2,580
Two Up to \$ 3,390
Three Up to \$ 4,200
Four Up to \$ 5,010
Five Up to \$ 5,750
Six Up to \$ 6,490
Seven Up to \$ 7,180
Eight Up to \$ 7,830
Nine Up to \$ 8,440
Ten Up to \$ 9,050
Eleven Up to \$ 9,650
Twelve Up to \$10,250
Each additional family member 600
Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free meals and milk. In addition, families not meeting the criteria but with other unusual expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special-education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply. Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the Superintendent's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, it should contact the school. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin. Under the provisions of the policy Lester Diehl, superintendent, will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Tom Boyd, chairman of the Board of Trustees, Genesee, Idaho, phone 285-1578, for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure. A copy of the complete policy is on file in the district office and may be reviewed by any interested party.

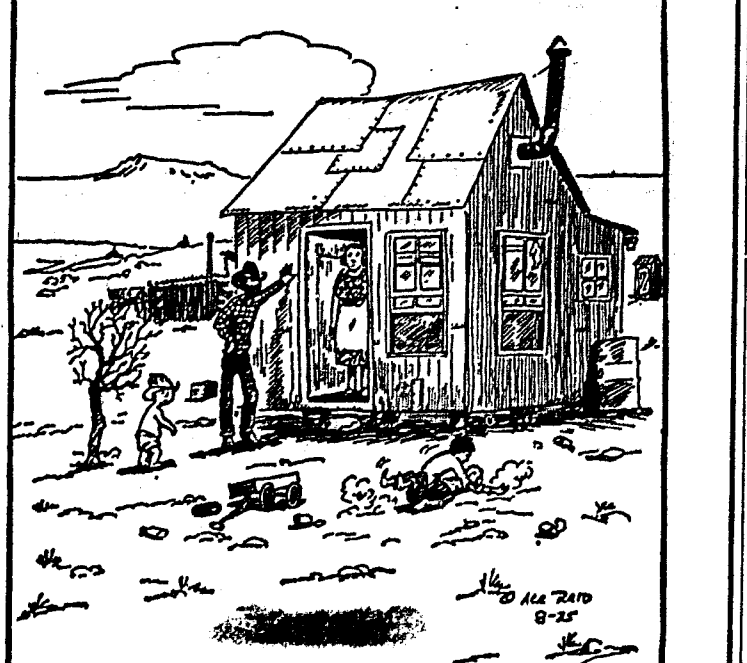

NOTICE TO PARENTS AND GUARDIANS OF SCHOOL AGE CHILDREN

In compliance with the requirements of 33-202, notice is hereby given that: In all school districts of this state, every parent or guardian of any child between the ages of seven and sixteen years shall cause such child to be instructed in certain specified subjects. Every such parent or guardian shall cause child to attend a public, private, or parochial school, during a period equal to that portion of each year during which the public schools are in session in such districts, and shall cause such child to conform to the attendance regulations established by the board of trustees of such school district.
