Tigers Open Grid Season Friday Night at Prairie

Coach Dick Ruark and his 1975 edition of the KHS Tigers football team open the season Friday night against the big and strong Prairie Pirates at Cottonwood. Kendrick, co-champions of the district last season, has five starters back this year, but lack both size and speed, said the coach.

Injuries have already cost Ruark three players. Tim Eichner is out with a hamstring; Rick Steigers will miss the first game because of a pulled muscle and Kirk Ruark is out with tendonitis.

"There are still several positions up for grabs," said Ruark, "but these are the guys we'll probably go with against Prairie."

Doug Lohman, a junior, will start at quarterback; Ron Maynard will be swinging back; Paul Hutcheson, up back and Doug Christensen, tailback for the starting offensive backfield.

John May will start at center, replacing the injured Tim Eichner. Rande Warner and Jody Richardson will be offensive guards; Mike Boe and Doug Craig will be tackles and Glenn Bailey and Rick Gertje, ends.

Possible defensive starters could include: Enda, Steve Peron, Paul Hutcheson or Lee Deobald; tackles, Mike Boe and Rande Warner; nose guard, Rick Gertje; line backers, Ron Maynard, Jody Richardson, Doug Christensen or Doug Craig with Rob Lohman as safeties.

Thirty-five players turned out for football this season including ten lettermen from last year's squad.

Kendrick will be running its offensive plays out of the "I" formation again this year. Lohman, who will be quarterbacking the Tigers, has good speed and can pass, but Ruark added, "we never did do that much passing."

"About average," was the way the Kendrick coach sized up his team's speed. "We're also going to be a lot lighter than most schools we'll be meeting," he concluded.

Last year the Tigers finished with a 5-3 record, but still managed to come up with a share of the district crown.

Helping Ruark with the coaching duties will be Bill LaMunyan and Steve Nordeen. Nordeen is new to the staff and will be the offensive line coach. Steve played at the University of California at Santa Barbara.

Kendrick will debut before the home fans Sept. 5 against Nezperce.

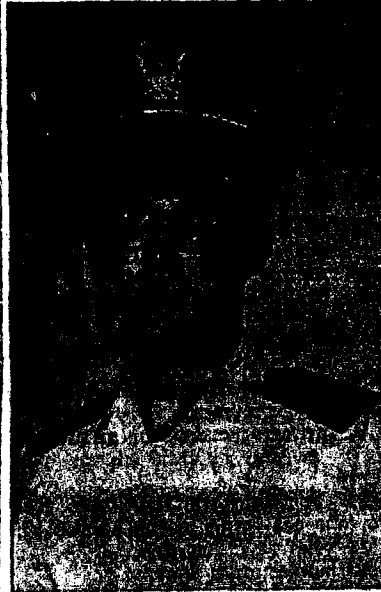

L. C. Groseclose, who has served on the Juliaetta council in previous years, was appointed to serve out the unexpired term of Fred Clemenhagen who resigned from the city council last week. Groseclose will take over the duties of Finance Commissioner and Building Code Commissioner.

Sewer Work Progresses—Mayor Harold Freeman reported this week that installation work on the new Juliaetta sewer line is progressing satisfactorily. Genesee Hosts Timberline Friday In Football Opener

Coach Ozzie Kanikkeberg will throw a heavy, senior team against the Timberline Spartans Friday night as the Bulldogs of Genesee open the 1975 football season on the GHS gridiron at 7:30.

Ten of the starting eleven offensive squad will be seniors this season, including 220-lb. tackle Mark Shirrod and 190-lb. tackle Pat Aherin. "Pretty good size," said assistant coach John Schwartz Tuesday as he was being interviewed about the team. Adding to possibility of a good season will be the fact that Kanikkeberg has three experienced seniors returning to the backfield including quarterback Danny Stout and halfbacks Jay Roach, who weighs in at 195 pounds and Don Smith, a 165-lb. veteran.

On the minus side for the Bulldogs this year will be the lack of depth, Schwartz said. "We've got a good senior turn-out, but we're lacking good substitutes." As a result of this, at least for the first game, there will be little substituting when the Bulldogs switch from offense to defense.

Of the 28 who turned out for football this season, 14 earned letters last year and nine of the starters this year either started last season or saw lots of action.

Max Schwenne and Doug Green will be ends for the team this year; Mark Shirrod and Pat Aherin, tackles; Jerry Wishard and Jo Anderson, guard; Darrell Tyler, center.

In the backfield will be Dan Stout, quarterback; Jay Roach and Don Smith, halfbacks and Jerry Hebling, the only junior or the starting eleven, at the full back slot.

Schwartz said there were not many changes in the rules this year. The only change that might be noted is the 3 time-outs per half rather than the four of last season. Sparring has also been made a flagrant personal foul for which a player can be ejected from the game.

Genesee, Kendrick Co-eds Pledge U. of I. Sororities

"A total of 228 women registered for sorority rush this year, compared to 199 last fall," said Bruce Pitman, Greek advisor. "Last year 176 women pledged sororities compared to 194 this fall."

Heavy Rains Drench Area; Harvest Halted

A downpour of rain Saturday morning dropped over an inch of water over much of the region and brought a complete halt to the 1975 harvest operations. As of Tuesday afternoon there was still no cutting going on in the Kendrick area and farmers were just starting to get back into the field in Genesee.

John Luedke, who maintains rainfall figures for the Soil Conservation Service in Genesee, reported that so far this month 1.42 inches of rainfall had been recorded, most of it over the weekend. Keeping a close watch on the rain gauge, John said 51 inches fell from Friday to Saturday and 67 inches from Saturday to Sunday. The torrential downpour Saturday morning dumped .54 inches within that short period of time.

High August rainfall for the Genesee area, Luedke reported, came in 1960 when 2.14 inches fell; 1968 was another bad August with 2.08 inches.

Up on American Ridge, Dick Benscoter reported 1.05 inches of rain from Friday midnight to Saturday night. He also recorded .10 inches of rain Sunday, the 24th. Total for the month, Dick reported, was 1.46 inches.

Wheat Too Wet—Tuesday afternoon, Mike Martinez, assistant manager of Genesee Union Warehouse Co., told the Gazette that some wheat sample had been brought in but they tested above the .14 moisture per cent. He added that some farmers were cutting peas and that some Kamiah and Steptoe barley should be ready for cutting by Tuesday afternoon or Wednesday morning. The moisture caused by the rain might mean a lighter test weight for wheat, Martinez said.

Martinez estimated that only 25 per cent of the total harvest was completed in the Genesee area. He figured 20 per cent of the wheat was in, but the peas were about 95 per cent finished. Some of the small sieve Alaska peas were showing a higher-than-average bleaching. There has not been enough spring barley out to make a prediction on the quality or size of crops this year.

"Nothing's moving," was the word from Bob Watts, manager of Kendrick Rockdale. Howard Hoffman, manager of Lewiston Grain Growers' Kendrick elevators said nothing had come in since the big weekend rains, "not even samples."

Anita Powers Succumbs at 39

Anita Marlene Powers, 39, of Juliaetta, died Sunday, Aug. 24, at Pendleton, Oregon. She had been in Pendleton for the past several months for medical treatment.

A Juliaetta resident since 1970, she was a member of the Juliaetta Seventh-Day Adventist Church and sang with the Sweet Adelines and the Community Church Choir.

Mrs. Powers was born March 21, 1936 at Walla Walla, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Shirley A. Beers. Her family later moved to Lewiston, where she lived for 15 years. She attended Upper Columbia Academy at Spangle, Washington.

She married Dale Powers at Walla Walla on April 21, 1957. They lived at Dayton, Waitsburg, Walla Walla and Pendleton before returning to Lewiston, where the family lived until 1970 when they moved to Juliaetta.

Mrs. Powers worked as a nurse, including several years at Clarkston. She is survived by her husband, Dale, her children, Teddy, Lonnie, Scotty and Shirley Powers, all at the family home, and a daughter, Danietta, of Pilot Rock, Oregon.

PFI Cuts Back Logging Schedules; 36 Crews Hurt

Weak market demand for pulp and paper products and the subsequent reduced demand for wood chips has necessitated adjustment of logging schedules in the St. Maries area, Carl J. Deward, logging manager for Potlatch Corporation's northern units said Tuesday.

"Log production to supply chip mill requirements in the St. Maries area had to be lowered to bring inventories in balance with chip mill needs," Deward noted. Affected by the limited curtailment are 36 contract logging woods employees and 12 contract log hauling truckers in the area.

Potlatch's whole log chipper at its St. Maries plant was shut down last month because of softened demand for chips. Plans to reopen it have been postponed until the end of the year because the hoped-for improvement in market demand did not materialize.

Similar curtailments have been made in other Potlatch logging operations in Idaho. These have resulted from the same poor market demand for pulp logs and chips, according to T. J. Williams, western wood products division resource manager.

Some Kendrick Area Students Eligible For Free School Lunches, Milk

Kendrick Joint School District 283 serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for 50c and extra milk for 8 cents.

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown on the attached scales are eligible for free milk and for meals free. If your income is greater than those shown but you have unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of your income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses, your children may still be eligible.

To apply at any time during the year for free meals and free milk for your children, complete an application which is available at the school and return it to the school. Within 5 days of receiving your application, the school will let you know whether or not your children are eligible. If you do not agree with the school's decision, you may wish to discuss it with the school. If you wish to review the decision further, you have a right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing Mr. Richard H. Morton, Supt., Kendrick, Idaho 83537 — Phone 289-4211.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If you have foster children living with you and wish to apply for such meals and milk for them, please notify the school or indicate on the application. All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color or national origin.

Definition of a Family: means a group of related or unrelated individuals who are not residents of an institution or boarding house, but who are living as one economic unit. Wards of the court, like foster children, should be considered as one-member families.

Income, as the term is used in this article, is similar to that defined in the Bureau of Census Reports, "Characteristics of the Low-Income Population: 1971" Consumer Income, Current Population Reports, Series P-60, No. 86, December 1972. "Income" means income before deductions for income taxes, employees' social security taxes, insurance premiums, bonds, etc. It includes the following:

1. monetary compensation for services, including wages, salary commission, or fees;
2. net income from non-farm self employment;
3. net income from farm self employment;
4. social security;
5. dividends or interest on savings or bonds; income from estates or trusts or net rental income;
6. public assistance or welfare payments;
7. unemployment compensation;
8. Government civilian employee or military retirement, or pension or veterans' payments;
9. private pensions or annuities;
10. alimony or child support payments;
11. regular contributions from persons not living in the household;
12. net royalties and;
13. other cash income.

Other Cash Income would include cash amounts received or withdrawn from any source, including savings, investments, trust accounts, and other resources, which would be available to pay the price of a child's meal. These amounts received or withdrawn are not restricted to merely the interest derived from such accounts or investments, but include the withdrawn or any principal.

In applying these guidelines, school food authorities may consider both the income of the family during the past 12 months and family's current rate of income to determine which is the better indicator of the need for free meals.

Income eligibility guidelines for determining eligibility for free meals and milk or reduced-price meals:

The income poverty guidelines for determining eligibility for free meals and free milk in National School Lunch Programs, School Breakfast Programs, Special Milk Programs, and Commodity-Only Schools are prescribed as of July 1, 1975, as follows:

License Expires Last Day of August

Idaho motorists with license plates on the staggered system ending in eight (8) displaying "75" black on yellow stickers are reminded that their registration card says "License Expires Last Day of August 1975," or "License Expires August 31, 1975" and must be renewed. This is the registration card issued by the assessor's office and must be carried in the vehicle at all times while the vehicle is being operated upon a highway within this state.

Idahonans who own and operate passenger cars and pickups under 8,000 pounds within the state are required by law to show proof of automobile liability insurance at the time they register or re-register their vehicles. The law, which became effective July 1, 1975, states that applicants must display to the county assessors a current certificate of liability insurance issued by the insurance company covering the motor vehicle to be licensed. Motor vehicle owners who have not received proof of automobile liability insurance prior to registration or re-registration of their insurance company to acquire their motor vehicle should check with the proper forms to show automobile insurance coverage.

Forty-Six Given Job Finding Help

During this past week, 46 persons were given assistance through this office in finding employment according to L. M. Hubbard of the Idaho Department of Employment. A high percentage of this number includes young people being placed on CETA summer jobs. This time last year, only 14 persons were placed, with 38 jobs remaining open, compared with this week's 27 open positions. Included among the openings are an experienced sawyer, skidsteer operator, cook, bookkeeper, typists, waitresses, live-in housekeepers, babysitters and farm equipment operators. Another new addition is the manager of a food co-op store.

The number of persons continuing to claim unemployment insurance benefits remains stable declining by only 6 to 421, from 427 last week. A year ago, the total in Latah Co. was 227. In the immediate Moscow area, the current figure now stands at 262, down a little from 284 last week but well above last year's figures of 155. In the Genesee area there are now 12 persons claiming unemployment benefits as compared with 10 last week and 9 last year. The number in the Troy-Deary-Bozwell area remains relatively stable at 77, 78, and 30 last year. At Kendrick there was a slight decline from 18 last week, 15 this week, only 5 a year ago. Pottlatch has also shown some decline with 55 now claiming 69 last week and 28 a year ago.

Due to the weather conditions, there is little demand for farm laborers this week but some farmers are optimistic and placing orders now for next week. Currently there is quite a bit of demand in the clerical fields, particularly secretarial and bookkeeping.

Take Advantage of Immunizations say Doctors

Despite the ready availability of protection, millions of Americans are facing unnecessary risk of disease, crippling or even death, according to the Idaho Medical Association.

Despite combined efforts of the medical profession, public health officials, school leaders, voluntary health agencies and others many people neglect to get immunization for themselves and their families.

Everyone is urged to put immunization off no longer. Special targets are polio, rubella, measles, diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus. Immunization levels against polio have declined to a dangerous low, making a renewal of the epidemic of the 1940's and 1950's possible.

There are still cases of tetanus, or lockjaw every year. Almost everyone is unnecessary. Tetanus toxoid offers excellent protection. Diphtheria is still dangerous and by no means wiped out, despite the fact that a vaccine has been available for years. Whooping cough is so common in childhood that most parents do not consider it dangerous, but it can be. And it can be prevented by vaccination.

Vaccines against measles—both the rubella and reboela types—are available. Immunization of school children, particularly girls, and of pre-school children is recommended. Smallpox vaccination is no longer recommended for everyone. The disease has been eradicated in the United States. Inoculations now are urged for a few groups, such as hospital and medical personnel and travelers to areas of the world where the disease still threatens.

Your physician is ready to protect you and your family with vaccination. He can do it if only you go to get your shots.

Forest fires rob us of pure air, clean water, outdoor recreation and beauty as well as forest products and employment to our way of life. Conserve your natural resources and your way of life.

A carelessly tossed cigarette, an unwatched campfire, an abandoned trash fire, all caused forest fires in 1974. Your help is needed to prevent such fires this summer. By being careful with all fires in or near forested areas, you will help Keep Idaho Green.

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Reye's Syndrome May Follows Simple Illness

Reye's Syndrome is a serious illness that usually follows shortly after a viral illness, such as flu or chicken pox according to the Idaho Medical Association.

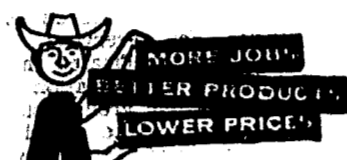
Only a few of the thousands of children coming down with these illnesses develop Reye's Syndrome. But for these few it is very serious and is often fatal.

Usually the child will have completely recovered from the first illness and be back in school or at play before the symptoms of Reye's appear. Sudden, persistent vomiting is almost always the first sign, followed closely by complaints of fatigue, general listlessness and apathy.

If your child shows these symptoms, contact your family physician immediately. Mental disorientation occurs soon after the vomiting ceases. The child may become totally irrational—screaming, striking out and unable to recognize family members and other familiar faces. Unconsciousness soon follows.

Reye's Syndrome is not always fatal. 60 percent of children affected in the US last year recovered completely.

You can better the odds of recovery by watching your child carefully after any viral illness, and by acting swiftly to get help if he displays any of the symptoms associated with Reye's Syndrome.

NOTICE TO PARENTS AND GUARDIANS OF SCHOOL-AGE CHILDREN

In compliance with the requirements of 33-202, notice is hereby given that: In all school districts of this state, every parent or guardian of any child between the ages of seven and sixteen years shall cause such child to be instructed in certain specified subjects. Every such parent or guardian shall cause child to attend a public, private, or parochial school, during a period equal to that portion of each year during which the public schools are in session in such districts, and shall cause such child to conform to the attendance regulations established by the board of trustees of such school district.

When a duly licensed physician or psychiatrist shall certify in writing that the physical or mental condition of a child is such that it does not permit attendance at school and upon a finding by the board of trustees that the best interests of the child or the school will be served by exempting such child from attendance, then the board of trustees may grant such exemption during the continuance of such disability. A petition for exemption for such cause may be initiated by the child or by its present parent or guardian.

Before the board of trustees may exempt any child who is an habitual truant whose conduct would disrupt school order or discipline, the board shall notify the parents or guardian and afford them an opportunity to appear and show cause why the exemption should not be granted. When exempted for such cause, the probate court shall be notified and said child shall come under the purview of the youth rehabilitation law.

Dangers Past Forty

One of the greatest dangers to men and women past 40 is falling into sedentary ways, observe the Idaho Medical Association.

Many such people fight their own physical fitness, assuming they are no longer capable of much physical effort.

If not reasonably adept at a specific sport—bowling, golf, tennis or swimming—they are advised to take instruction in one of these or some other form of physical recreation.

They should take an inventory of physical activity in the daily schedule. It might include such chores as housework, gardening and maintaining the home, as well as sports. Often these do not provide enough physical activity.

For stepping up physical activity, walking is a good starting point. This means a brisk posture walk, holding the belt line level and raising the breastbone. Also, start devoting a part of the weekend to a pleasant activity.

Fifteen minutes of regular exercise every other day is hardly enough to produce noticeable results quickly, but it is a good start. Over a period of time its benefits will be evident.

With regular exercise, the sagging dragging middle-ager may well begin to exhibit a total change in attitude. Even physical appearance is more vital. Before beginning an exercise program a visit to a physician for a checkup is advisable to make certain there are no conditions that would limit exertion.
