ers to most of the available jobs and job openings do not remain unfilled for very long, Hartstein said.

Hartstein's report indicated that a total of 43 persons filed new claims for unemployment insurance during the week. Most of those filing new claims were newcomers into the area although a few construction workers was the first time they had been out filed claims as they were laid off together in 20 years. temporarily from existing jobs in the lyocality. The number of persons continuing to claim benefits declined, however, from last week's total of 421, to the current figure of 413. Of the total of 51 persons who discon-tinued claiming benefits, most either returned to school or returned to work in school related activities. A year ago there were 224 persons in Latah County seeking jobless pay.
