





He married Anna M. Smith of Whitebird, June 1, 1923 at Spekane. After leaving Lewiston he moved to Cedar Ridge near Kendrick before

moving to Polson.

He is survived by his widow at the family home and two sisters, Mima Morgan of Moksville, N. C. and Josie Henderson of Union Grove, N. C.






