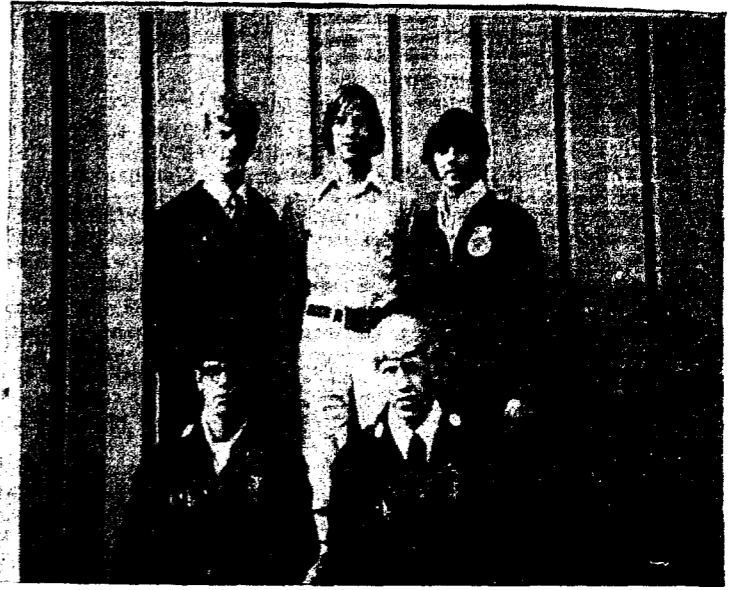

Dennis 'Skip' Chilberg Chosen for Listing In Outstanding Young Men of America



Dennis (Skip) Chilberg has been chosen as one of the Outstanding Young Men of America for 1975, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Chilberg of Juliaetta, were informed this week. "Skip" was one of 15 chosen from the state of Idaho for this honor.

Known to his friends as "Skip," he is a native of Kendrick. He attended public schools here and completed his formal education at the University of Idaho. After graduation in 1966, Chilberg became the Director of the Idaho Youth Conservation Project.

In 1968-69, he served as a computer specialist with the U.S. Army Intelligence Headquarters in Heidelberg, Germany. Upon returning to Idaho he was made Deputy Director of the Community Action Agency in Lewiston.

Mr. Chilberg was appointed Budget director for the State of Idaho when Governor Andrus took office in January of 1971, serving in that capacity until 1973 when he assumed his present position of Director, Department of Administration.

Mr. Chilberg is married to the former Lee Stephens of Lewiston. They have four children. His father, Robert Chilberg, resides at Juliaetta.

Courtney Belt, Former Teacher Passes Recently

Word was received this week of the passing of Courtney A. Belt, a former Kendrick schoolteacher. Mr. Belt died in a Chehalis Hospital following a lengthy illness. He was a resident of Winlock, Washington.

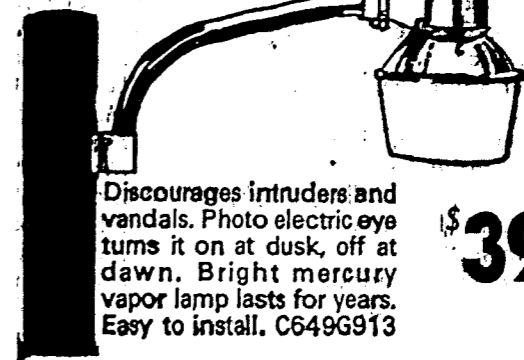

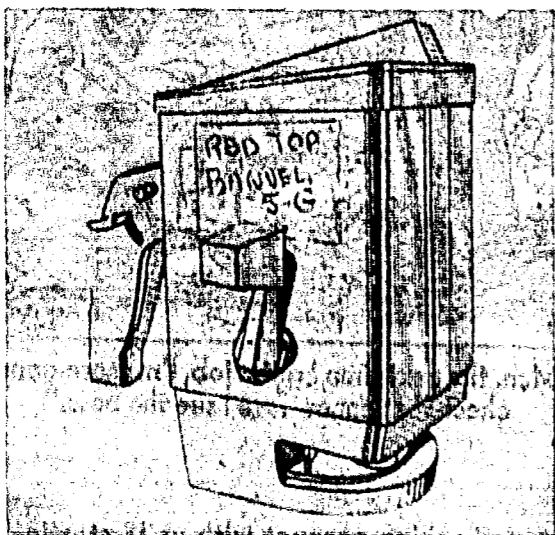

**Rose Clara Hyde, 56, Passes in Lewiston Sept. 10**

Rose Clara Hyde, 56, died at her home in Lewiston at 2:30 p. m. on Wednesday Sept. 10. She had previously suffered cardiac ailments and death is believed to have been caused by heart trouble.

Mrs. Hyde was a communicant of Our Lady of Lourdes Catholic church and was secretary of the church's altar society for four years. She was named the church's woman of the

year in 1966 in recognition of her contributions.

She was born Nov. 27, 1918, near Genesee, the daughter of Henry and Anna Krick. She lived with her parents at Uniontown and attended school there and at Moscow. She was a graduate of Holy Names Academy at Moscow.

She married Hyde at Genesee Dec. 30, 1939 and moved with him to Lewiston where she had lived since. In addition to her husband at the family home, she is survived by four

sons, Daniel D. Hyde, Fernwood, David W. Hyde, Boise, and Dale Hyde and Donald Hyde, both of Lewiston; two daughters, Carolyn Nuxoll, of Clarkston and Linda Gossage, Lewiston; seven sisters, Mary Kasper, of Genesee; Teresa Lundt, St. Maries; Pauline Kasper and Eleanor Zagelow, both of Moscow; Alma Bensch, Endicott; Emma Dahmen, Pasco, and Clara Voss, Princeton; three brothers, Otto Krick and Joseph Krick, both of Tacoma and Paul Krick, of Genesee.

**Spanish-American War Veteran Ellison Mitchell Succumbs at Age 96**

Ellison "Sam" Mitchell, 96, of Polson, Montana, one of the 30 remaining Spanish-American War Veterans and builder of three North Idaho bridges, died Saturday, September 13, 1975, at his home of heart failure. He had been ill for about two weeks.



He lived at Lewiston during the 1920's at which time he supervised the building of the old Peck bridge, the Whitebird bridge, and the Cataldo bridge. He was known when he lived at Lewiston as an accomplished trap shooter. He took second place in the Interstate Amateur Shoot in 1915 and twice competed for the World Trap Shooting Championship.

He served from 1900 to 1903 in the Philippines during the Spanish American War. He re-enlisted in 1904 and served in Cuba until 1907.

He was born January 30, 1879, in North Carolina to Dock and Fannie Mitchell. After he was discharged from the service, he moved west and worked as an engineer on bridge projects.

He married Anna M. Smith of Whitebird, June 1, 1923 at Spokane. After leaving Lewiston he moved to Cedar Ridge near Kendrick before moving to Polson.

He is survived by his widow at the family home and two sisters, Milma Morgan of Moksveville, N. C. and Josie Henderson of Union Grove, N. C.

Two services will be held. Funeral services were held Tuesday at 2:00 p.m. at the Mosley Funeral Home at Polson. The Rev. Laurens Edwards of the Polson Baptist Church was officiate. Another service will be held Wednesday at the Gold Hill Cemetery near Cedar Ridge. Clem Lyons, chaplain of the Kendrick VFW, will officiate. Burial will follow at the cemetery.

Anna Smith Mitchell, the widow, is the daughter of "Doc" Smith, one of the early homesteaders on Cedar Ridge. She was teaching school at Whitebird when she met Mitchell. The couple had no children, but have close family ties with many of her nieces and nephews in the area, as well as her sister-in-laws, Mrs. Geo. Smith, Lewiston, and Mrs. Vester Daniels, Juliaetta. Mrs. Mitchell wrote and published the book "Homesteaders and Early Settlers of the Cedar Creek Ridge Area", in a limited edition in 1961.

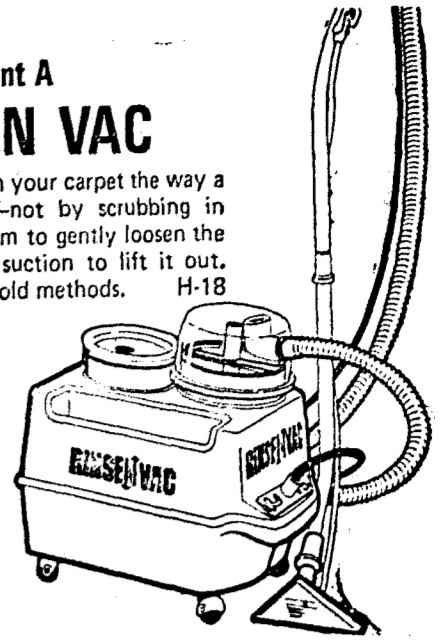

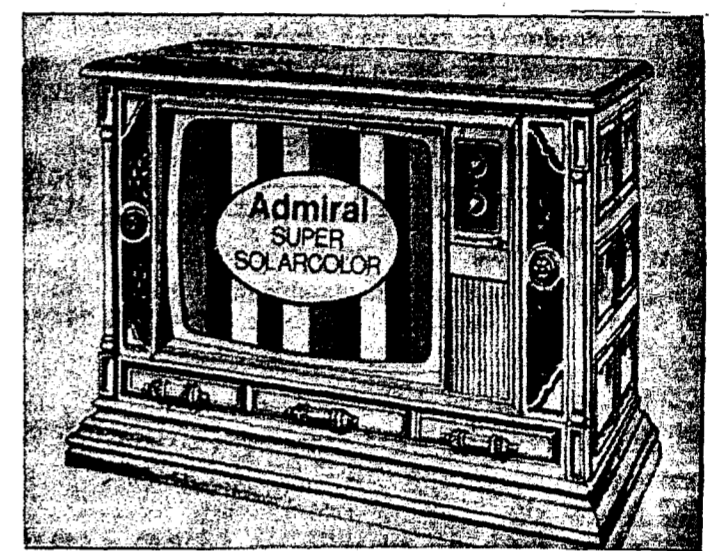
