Tigers Bomb Highland 40-6

Kendrick piled up three touchdowns and 21 points in a big third quarter Friday night as they rolled to a 40-6 win over Highland at Craigmont. Rick Steigers, who scored the first touchdown of the game, turned in a 123 yards rushing effort for the evening to pace the Tiger offense. Steigers put the Tigers ahead 6-0 in the first quarter on a 15-yard run. The kick attempt by Mike Boe failed. Highland came back to tie the score 6-6 on a close in pass and then Doug Christensen scored from 4 yards out to give the KHS team a 12-6 first quarter lead. A big second quarter, worth 21 points, put the game on ice for Kendrick. Doug Lohman went 15 yards on a keeper and Boe's extra point kick was good; Ron Maynard scored on a two-yard run and again Boe kicked the extra point and Paul Hutcheson took a Huskie punt 51 yards back for the next touchdown and Boe kicked the extra point. Kendrick's defense had held the Highland team scoreless during this quarter. With the victory pretty well assured, Kendrick didn't make much of an offensive effort in the third period and then in the final period of play, Lohman passed to Hutcheson who took the eight-yard gain for another 6 points and Boe's extra point kick made it an even 40 for the Tigers. Kendrick's total offensive yardage amounted to 383 yards with 270 of these on the ground. Highland, who hasn't won yet this season, could manage only 87 yards on offense against the tough Tiger defense. At Troy Friday Kendrick goes up the hill Friday night to face the tough Troy Trojans. Troy was barely edged out by the league-leading Deary Mustangs last Friday night in an 8-6 struggle.

Genesee Blanks Nezperce 20-0

Genesee's Bulldogs upped their league record to 2 wins against one loss as they combined an effective offense with stifling defensive to defeat the Nezperce Indians 20-0 at Nezperce Friday night. In the final period Stout passed to Firzlaff for 68 yards and the final touchdown of the game with Aherin's kick adding the final point. Improved Postal Service Effective October 11

The U. S. Postal Service first-class mail service improvement program will go into effect at Kendrick, Genesee and Juliaetta Post offices on Saturday, Oct. 11, it was announced this week. Under the program, first-class mail will receive service that is equal to or better than airmail. The major, new service step will extend to all first-class mail weighing 13 ounces or less. In practical terms, what this service improvement means is that domestic first-class postage will now purchase the level of service that previously only airmail could buy, said a postal official. "Under the new program, there no longer will be an advantage in purchasing airmail postage for domestic delivery," the official continued. Priority mail (now starting at weight in excess of 13 ounces), which includes air parcel service and international airmail, are unaffected by the improvement program and continue in their present form. "Airmail stamps will be sold for use on priority and international airmail. They can also be used in various combinations with other stamps for first class mail. Customers can exchange airmail stamps and stamped envelopes and cards at full postage value for ordinary stamps, stamped envelopes and cards. Stationery bearing airmail indicia, will be allowed to be mailed at the first-class rate.

Blood pressure screening is done primarily for the purpose of detecting high blood pressure that has not previously been detected. If you are taking a medication for blood pressure, it is necessary that you obtain a written request from your physician to have your blood pressure checked in Kendrick and Juliaetta. At the last screening, 75 persons had their blood pressure checked and 22 persons were referred to their private physicians for evaluations of the results of the tests. This screening is sponsored by the Latah County office of the North Central District Health Department.

County Job Placements Down

Job opportunities declined slightly from the previous week as only 10 workers were placed by the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment. Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager said today that this was a drop from the sixteen workers placed during the previous week and also below the 15 put on jobs during the first week in October last year. At the end of the week, there were 12 jobs still open, down only one from last week. Among the jobs open now are one for an accountant, a mechanic, a bookkeeper, cooks, waitresses, domestic workers and a cashier. Claims for unemployment insurance rose slightly during the week, according to Hartstein's report. He said that the total number of persons seeking jobs pay now totalled 272, compared with 263 a week ago. The figure was more than double last October's figure of 117. A total of 35 idled workers filed new claims during the week and consisted of construction workers, loggers, and a host of workers from out of the area who had just moved into Latah Co. In the immediate Moscow area, the total rose from 180 to 186, compared with only 77 a year ago. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area, the figure was 52, compared with 44 a week ago and more than triple the 17 of last year. 22 checks were going into the Pocatello area, down from 1st week's 24, but above 1974's figure of 12. In Genesee the figures are 6 now, 8 last year while at Kendrick the totals are 5, 7, and 3. Many are blaming the politicians for the shortage of gas but that is hard to believe. GAS is one thing they are never short of.

Kokanee Closure

To protect spawning runs of kokanee, parts of the South Fork of the Boise River and Fall Creek have been closed to all fishing.

Increasing numbers of fishermen trying to snag spawning kokanee in tributaries of Anderson Ranch Reservoir have become a threat to the maintenance of the spawning run.

To allow adequate escapement of fish for spawning, the South Fork of the Boise was closed from Pine Bridge downstream to the backwaters of Anderson Ranch. Fall Creek from the Fall Creek-Pine Road culvert downstream to the reservoir backwater also was closed.

The closure is effective immediately and extra conservation officers will be assigned to the areas to enforce the closure. The kokanee live year-round in Anderson Ranch Reservoir but travel up tributaries in early September for spawning.

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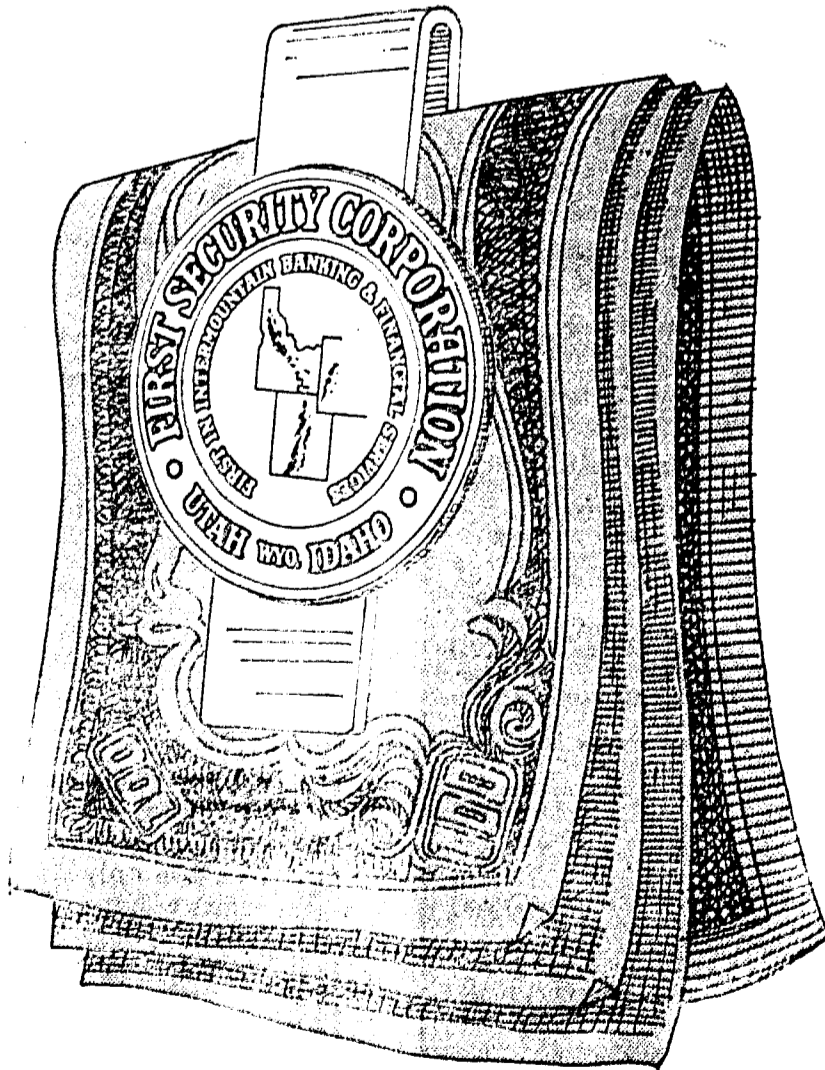
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Carelessness for Hunters Can Be Tragic

Carelessness can cost dearly, and for hunters the toll is too often counted in human lives, reminds the IMA. It contributes to nearly every hunting accident.

Attention to a few basic safety rules can do much to avoid suffering and even death. The first rule: Before pulling the trigger, know what you are firing at.

Never cross over or through a fence or climb a tree with a loaded gun. Unload first and reload after crossing.

Even a small bore rifle has considerable range. Know where your bullet will stop before pulling the trigger. Do not shoot at a hard, flat surface. Glancing bullets can carry long distances.

Keep guns away from children. Never leave a weapon unattended without unloading it. Store guns and ammunition beyond the reach of youngsters, preferably under lock and key.

Always carry a gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle if you stumble. Keep the safety catch on until ready to shoot. Be sure the barrel is clear of mud, snow or other obstructions. A clogged barrel may burst.

Never mix liquor and shooting.

Dear Bill:

Seems my subscription is out in September. Here's my check for another year of enjoyable reading and informative doings along the Potlatch and its environs.

Noticed that Bill Steigers had recently gathered in a trophy bull elk for himself, so guess a few still are left. I can remember back thirty or forty years ago when the Steigers, Heimgartner and Hoisingtons went hunting thirty strong up Rocky Ridge way and returned with their pack horses loaded down with thirty elk and thirty deer each fall, killed not too far from main forest road. I'm afraid those days are gone from Idaho forever.

I believe there should be an enclave of some area entirely around the Dworshak embowment—where no hunting permitted in the wintering grounds, now greatly reduced along the North Fork and Little North Fork of the Clearwater and its tributaries. The State has informed me plans are underway to log-off then burn off the lower area of Smith Ridge between the Little North Fork and main North Fork of the Clearwater where I had plans for a hunting lodge. I think a game reserve on the wintering area one of the best ideas to come out of the Fish and Game Dept. in a long time. Another good idea was the live trapping of Grizzly bears in Yellowstone and Glacier Parks and releasing a few here and there in Idaho's more remote back country. There undoubtedly is considerable calf elk and fawn losses from present overpopulation of black bears in elk country. Grizzlies never hesitate to catch, kill and eat their black bear cousins—true, the Grizzlies would also kill and eat some elk and deer; however, the reduction in black bear numbers would, in my opinion, be beneficial to all wild life. Lastly there's always an extra thrill to know you are hunting in Grizzly bear country.

Mountain lions are no longer pursued for bounty in all areas of the back country as they were before the bounties were removed. True equally as many or more lions are being killed by guides with their trophy hunters, but most lions are being killed in areas assessable to snowmobiles and landing fields and not in the more remote areas of the Selway Salmon and Clearwater where deer, elk and mountain sheep and goats winter. Those areas in former times were controlled by real mountain men and lion hunters, beginning with Uncle Dave Lewis on the Middle Fork of the Salmon and in more recent times, the great George Lowe of Kootenai, who thinned the lions each winter in the Selway and along the Salmon; Frank Long on the main Salmon and the Wolfenburgers along the upper Selway. Cougars, when plenty of game is available, increase like house cats and compete for the best hunting areas.

I'd like to see some of the news items of from 60 to 90 years ago about Old Genesee during the Nez Perce War of 1877 era, but maybe only in the records of the Lewiston Tribune. (Gene, our's only go back to 1888—Bill). I can remember Indians buying three kinds of lard and flour. There was regular pails of lard and sacks of flour, then there was "Skoukum" and "H U Skoukum" lard and flour, depending on whether the lard pail or sack of flour contained a fist or quart of whiskey. Sales started when the Nez Perces paid for the reservation in 1895.

Regional Questionnaire Results Compiled

Employment, mass transit, education, agricultural land and housing were key issues in a recent questionnaire distributed throughout North Central Idaho. Obtaining citizen input on key regional, county, and local planning issues was the purpose of the questionnaire to which more than 3,300 area residents responded.

Lack of employment opportunities is considered the largest problem in communities of the five-county region. Other major problems faced by towns and cities include lack of mass transit, lack of housing, inadequate roads, lack of industrial growth, and increasing crime.

Education was also strongly emphasized by respondents to the questionnaire. Although local governments were rated high in providing education services (second only to fire protection) 56 per cent of the respondents felt that it should be a top priority project for improvement.

Further services which respondents felt needed immediate improvement by local units of government included road improvement, water pollution control, police protection, and preserving natural surroundings. A majority of the respondents felt that these services could be improved without increasing taxes and, in fact, emphasized that a major effort be made to keep taxes down.

Respondents speaking to county issues, placed a high priority on preserving prime agricultural and prime recreational lands. A high number of respondents, however, stated that no more land should be designated as wilderness or primitive areas.

Gathering citizen input on these and other issues was a cooperative effort of the Clearwater Economic Development Association (CEDA) and the University of Idaho Cooperative Extension Service. CEDA staff members will use the results to develop general policies for the region to act as a guide for local units of government in their planning efforts. The policies will center on planning aspects on the local level that have regional concern.
