Aside from these car lots shipments there have been many tons of beans and oats shipped by truck to various points. Also trucked thru Kendrick there have been several million feet of lumber sawed at mills in the upper country.

Save Jaws

Hunters who are successful in bagging big game this fall are reminded the Department of Fish and Game needs the animal's lower jaws.

Quota Nears

Sales of nonresident deer and elk tags stayed up through most of Sept.

By October 4—8,455 deer tags and 6,950 elk tags had been sold, bringing the number of both tags near the 9,500 nonresident quota set on the tag sales.

From September 27 through October 3, a total of 302 deer tags and 111 elk tags had been sold.

This leaves a balance of 1,769 deer tags and 3,122 elk tags still available to nonresidents.
