

# City Elections November 4; Positions Contested

The increasing tendency of citizens to involve themselves in community affairs and government can be seen in the forthcoming municipal elections in Genesee, Kendrick and Juliaetta. Unlike a few years ago when city council positions went almost begging for lack of candidates, this Tuesday, November 4 will find that the three cities all have contests for the position of mayor and city council seats.

**Julietta Contests**  
The city of Juliaetta which has been the scene of recent controversy over a water rate increase will elect a new mayor November 4 to succeed retiring incumbent Harold Freeman, who declined to seek another term.

Richard Groseclose and Paul Gravelle are seeking the office of Juliaetta mayor.

Groseclose, a lifetime resident of the Juliaetta area, is a former councilman. Thirty-six years old, Groseclose is employed at Gem State Lumber Co. in Juliaetta and is married to the former Janice Helmgartner. Dick said he filed his petition of candidacy mainly at the urging of friends and also because he "saw things I think might be done just a little differently."

Asked if he had any plans for change if elected, Groseclose said there are things he would like to see changed, but added that from experience he knew that any changes would have to come from both the mayor and the city council. "Just because you're elected doesn't mean you can change things by yourself," he said. "I know what can happen and what can't," he added.

Paul Gravelle, 31, is a Research Forester with Potlatch Corporation in Lewiston and has lived in Juliaetta with his wife Carolyn and three children for the past two years. He is a 1966 graduate of the University of Idaho and is making his first bid for a public office.

The fact that he could see "lots of room for improvement" in the city government was one of the motivating factors which caused Gravelle to enter the race for mayor.

Among the things Paul would like to see, if elected, would be a review of the bookkeeping and auditing methods presently in use. "I'd like to spread out the responsibility as much as possible," he said, "and hope to enlist interested citizens and not just elected officials", as to the way the city is operated. He cited assistance from the public in setting up bookkeeping, record keeping and other procedures, as an example.

Gravelle also sees "lots of potential" to improve the appearance and public facilities in the city park; would like to see the city TV system include an educational channel and would work to make the council meetings more business-like and the sessions briefer. He would also encourage town people to come and express opinions at council meetings.

Paul and his wife were both active in petitioning the council to reduce water rates and he would be in favor of a reduction of the current rate.

Also up for election in Juliaetta is a council seat for a four year term.

Two candidates have petitioned for this position. Eldon (Jody) Fey, who is employed with Fleming Truck and Equipment Co. in Kendrick and L. C. (Lude) Groseclose, who is now on the council and is the maintenance man at the Juliaetta School.

**Four Seek Kendrick Seats**  
Two council seats are up for election in Kendrick. The terms of incumbent Wayne Harris and John Deobald expire December 31. Deobald, a veteran of the council, will not seek re-election. Harris will be seeking another term of office.

Also appearing on the ballot in Kendrick will be Jerry Brown, who is employed by the Troy Telephone Co.; Donald (Bud) Eichner, former Kendrick mayor and councilman and Ruth Hoffman, a teacher and housewife.

**Six on Genesee Ballot**  
Two council positions in Genesee will be up for election in the Tuesday balloting. One position is for a four year term and the other is for two years.

Seeking the four year term will be Walter Moden, an Agricultural Research Engineer and professor at the University of Idaho; Leonard Singhose, manager of Asgrow Seed Co. in Genesee and Mark Zenner, who farms with Zenner Bros. Moden and Singhose are both incumbent councilmen.

Running for the two year term are Guy Ailee, a retired Air Force man and currently a student at the University of Idaho; Jerry Linahan, a Genesee farmer; and Stanley Merrill, manager of First Security Bank in Genesee.

## Emulus Brown, 86, Long-Time Kendrick Resident Passes October 15

Emulus R. Brown, a long-time resident of the Kendrick area and a retired employee of the Clearwater Timber Protective Assn., died of the infirmities of age at 6:50 a. m. Wednesday, October 15 at Grimtm Hospital in Moscow, where he had been a patient for one day. He was 86.

Even when in his 80's, Brown worked as a carpenter, worked in Potlatch Corporation logging camps and for the Idaho Department of Highways.



He was born October 18, 1888 in Springfield, Missouri, the son of John and Martha Brown. He moved in his youth to the Kendrick area.

He married Bessie Brown at Cameron July 7, 1915 with the Rev. Geo. Finke officiating. Mrs. Brown died in 1950.

## Deary Blanks Bulldogs 28-0 For White Pine Crown

Deary High School won undisputed first place in the White Pine football league and the league championship for 1973 on the strength of a convincing 28-0 victory over the Genesee Bulldogs last Friday night at Genesee.

Deary claimed a powerful defense and the running of Denny Eggers to shuntout the Bulldogs. Eggers, a 155-pound junior, gained 235 yards that evening, scored two of the Mustang touchdowns and was a constant threat to the GHS team. The Deary defense intercepted five passes, including one fourth period interception they converted into a touchdown.

The opening minutes of the game looked as if it might be a real thriller as the teams traded punts and Genesee stopped a Deary drive on the Bulldogs 10-yard line. But then Eggers swept around the left end of the field on a punt return and went sixty-five yards for the touchdown. Mike Jones took a pass from Quarterback Gene Nelson for the extra two points.

Deary scored again in the second quarter as Nelson passed to Eggers who took the pass on the Genesee 45 and went all the way. The extra point try failed, but Deary took a 14-0 lead into the halftime break.

Actually until that point Genesee had control of the ball more often than Deary, but against the tough defense of the Mustangs they were unable to move the ball. Genesee was also defending well against the Mustangs with the exception of not being able to contain the slick running of Denny Eggers. Had not Eggers broken free for his two touchdowns in the first half, the game would have been described as very close.

In the closing minutes of the second quarter, Genesee scored from 20 yards out with Jay Roach packing the ball around right end for the touchdown. The play was called back because of a clipping penalty. Genesee came back, and on a series of line bucks bulled down to the Mustang half-yard line but was unable to punch through the Deary forward wall for a score and the Mustangs took over on their own one-yard line.

In the third quarter Genesee mounted another scoring threat after blocking a Deary punt near midfield. Roach picked up 20 yards through the middle of the Deary line, Dan Stout then brought in down to the 17 where the Bulldogs were unable to pick up another first down and gave up the ball on the Mustang 10.

Deary then mounted its first sustained ground drive which was climaxed with a four-yard touchdown run by Mitch Winn. Nelson passed to Gary Main for a two-point conversion.

Genesee, with the clock running against them had to get to the pass in an attempt to play catch-up ball and in the final minutes of play Dale Clark, who had played an excellent defense game all night, picked off one of Dan Stout's passes and went 60 yards for the final score.

In the hubbub of planning a hunting trip, many hunters forget to take one last look at the regulations. The result is a hunting violation. Here is a rundown on things to remember:  
--All tags must be punched immediately after the kill in two places designating the day and month of the kill.

**WAX COVERED WINDSHIELDS**

Wax covered windshields can be a driving hazard, cautions the Idaho Medical Association. The National Highway Safety Administration advises car owners to keep auto windshields free of the liquid car waxes used in many automatic car washes. Citing reports from drivers who have experienced the problem, the NHTSA points out that a wax-covered windshield may appear exceptionally clear in bright sunlight but can become impervious to wiper action when rain or road grime is added to the coating.

The wax is often hard, and has a high melting point, and is usually mixed with silicone oil or ingredients to make it spread evenly. Both the wax and the mix ingredients may render the windshield nearly opaque when mixed with rain and road grime. Wiper blades also become wax coated. Both glass and wiper blades should be cleaned. Most household window-cleaning products, or common household detergents to which a small amount of alcohol has been added are effective in removing the wax. Vigorous rubbing may be necessary and the solution should be rinsed away when cleaning.

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

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



## WHOOPING COUGH

Whooping cough is not prevalent, but even the few cases that do occur need not happen, according to the Idaho Medical Association.

There is a good vaccine that prevents it. Whooping cough is an acute infectious communicable disease which involves the respiratory tract. It was described in medical reports as early as 1678 and occurred in epidemic form in England in the 17th century. It may occur at any season but is most common in late winter, spring and summer. One attack usually produces immunity.

The organism responsible is a bacterium known as Haemophilus Pertussis. It is found in the discharge coughed from the respiratory passages by a victim of the disease.

Vaccination against whooping cough is effective. Many school districts require vaccination against whooping cough and several other childhood diseases before children may enroll in school.

Symptoms include inflammation of the respiratory tract and much secretion of mucus, which becomes thick and sticky as the disease progresses. Coughing may be prolonged and violent and accompanied by a whooping sound.

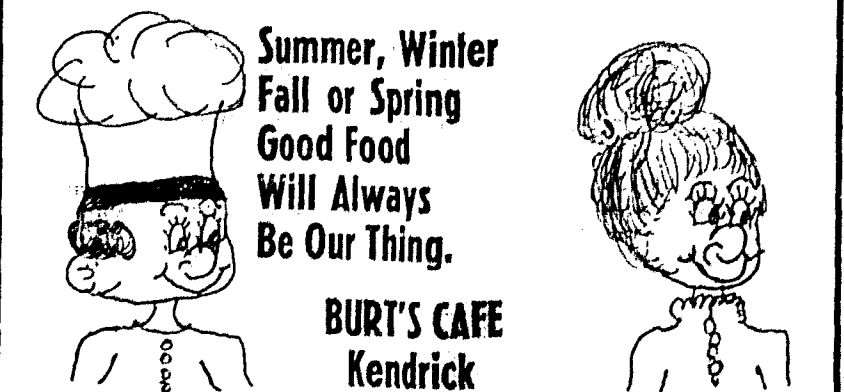
