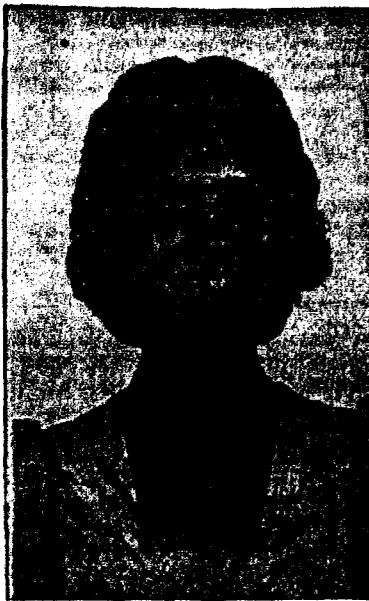


## Tami Hutton Chosen J-K Jr. Miss Saturday

The procedure for this day will be as follows:

College representatives will each establish an information center in a room with a display of their college catalogs, applications and other information including five schools which will show films. Seniors may choose those in which they are personally interested.

The Higher Education Days in the area were officially begun last Monday in a District meeting in Moscow. All the area counselors attended, including KHS's counselor, Bill Berndt.

Mr. Berndt reported that this past week the seniors were given a specially produced publication giving basic information about colleges in Idaho. This publication cost each of the major institutions over \$200 to produce. Its purpose is to acquaint the seniors, in brief, with each college in Idaho.

Students presently have ten major institutions of higher learning in Idaho from which to choose, seven of these are public: University of Idaho, Boise State, College of Southern Idaho (Twin Falls), Eastern Idaho Vocational-Technical School (Idaho Falls), Idaho State (Pocatello), North Idaho College (Coeur d'Alene), and Lewis Clark State College.

All of the foregoing will be represented this coming Tuesday except for the College of Southern Idaho and Eastern Idaho Vocational-Technical School.

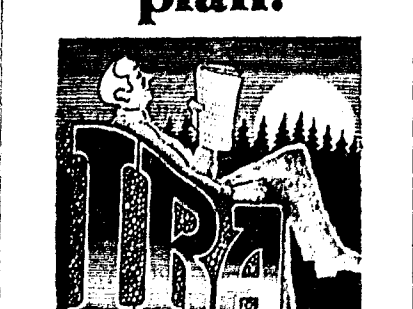

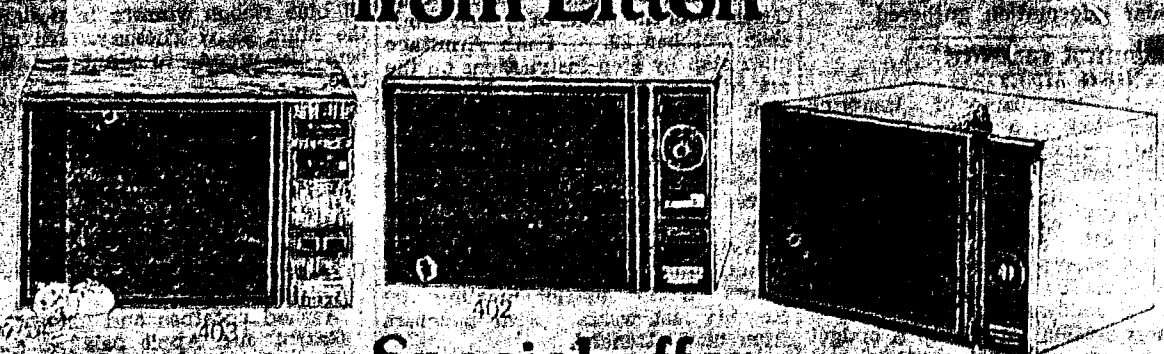

**LONG WINTER NIGHTS**

Long winter nights are with us, and it is sometimes difficult to avoid driving in darkness.

Night driving calls for extra safety precautions and the Idaho Medical Association passes on these suggestions:

Clean windshields, side windows and headlights. Wash the glass on the inside too. A film can build up and blur vision when facing oncoming headlights.

Take it easy on the gas pedal. At night the ability to see and recognize objects decreases by 20 feet with

each 10 mile-per-hour increase in speed.

Do not wear sunglasses or tinted glasses at night. Wearing glasses during the day, however, will ward off glare so that rested eyes will see better at night.

Avoid looking into the lights from approaching traffic. Instead, watch the righthand edge of the roadway.

The older you get the harder it is to see at night. The amount of light needed to see doubles with every 13 years of age. On long trips it might be better to save the night work for the youngest driver in the car.

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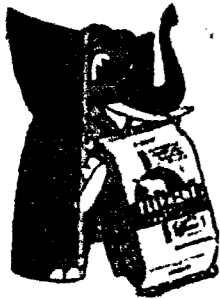
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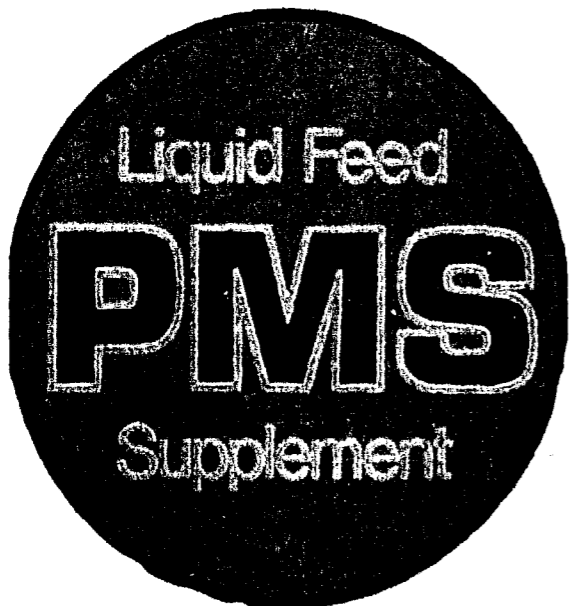

With the holidays but a short time away, there will be parties, pot luck and family dinners, not to mention a special dish to give some one for Christmas. We'd like to have your recipes, even if they aren't originally yours. Most all of our recipes are from friends or have been family favorites for years. This week, our recipes are from Mrs. Ethel Liberg, former Genesee resident now of Coeur d'Alene. Each fall we look forward to the recipes she so generously shares with us. Thanks Mrs. Liberg.

**CARROT BROWNIES**  
To quote Mrs. L.: This is the first original brownie we've seen in years and one of the easiest. They are moist and scrumptious.  
1/2 cup butter  
1 1/2 c. light brown sugar  
2 eggs  
2 c. sifted all-purpose flour  
**HOME TEMPERATURES**  
Idahoans who respond to energy

2 tsp. baking powder  
1/2 tsp. salt  
2 c. grated carrots  
1/2 c. chopped walnuts  
Preheat oven to 350 degrees.  
In sauce pan melt butter, add sugar and stir until well blended.  
Remove from heat and beat in eggs  
Beat in remaining ingredients except nuts. Pour mixture into 2 8x8x2-inch greased pan. Sprinkle chopped walnuts over mixture in each pan.  
Bake for 30 minutes (350d)  
Cut each pan in 9 squares.

**CINNAMON BARS**  
3/4 cup butter or margarine  
1 1/2 c. sugar (divided)  
2 eggs, separated  
1 ttbl. brandy (if don't have I use vanilla)  
1 c. uncooked rolled oats  
1 1/2 c. sifted flour  
1/2 c. packed brown sugar  
1 1/2 tsp. cinnamon  
1 1/2 c. chopped nuts—I use half cream butter and 1/4 c. sugar. Add egg yolks, one at a time, beating well after each. Stir in brandy. Add flour and oats. Mix well. Pat mixture evenly in bottom of 10x15-inch rimmed cookie sheet. Bake at 350 d. for 15 minutes.  
Combine 1/2 c. sugar, brown sugar, cinnamon and nuts. Stir in unbeaten

egg whites. Cook, stirring over low heat for about 5 minutes. Spread over baked mixture. Continue baking for 15 minutes. Cool. Cut in bars. Yields: 3 to 4 dozen.  
Crunchy bars (delicious).

**ZUCCHINI NUT COOKIES**  
1/2 c. shortening  
1/2 c. sugar  
1/2 c. packed brown sugar  
1 egg  
1 c. grated, unpeeled raw zucchini  
2 c. flour  
1 tsp. soda  
1 tsp. cinnamon  
1/2 tsp. nutmeg  
1/2 tsp. cloves  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1 cup raisins  
1/2 c. chopped nuts—walnuts or pecans  
Cream shortening and sugar.  
Beat in egg. Add zucchini.  
Sift dry ingredients. Add to creamed mixture. Stir in raisins and nuts.  
Drop by ttbl. onto greased cookie sheet. Bake at 325 degrees for 15 minutes, until slightly browned.  
Mrs. Liberg says she baked them as a bar and it worked fine.

**FROSTY FRUIT SALAD**  
1 pkg. lemon jello  
1 pkg. orange jello  
2 cups hot water  
1 1/2 c. cold water  
1 can crushed pineapple (303) can drained  
2 or 3 bananas, diced  
2 cups miniature marshmallows  
Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Add cold water and set in cool place until consistency of unbeaten egg whites.  
Add fruit and marshmallows. Pour into 13x9x2-in. baking dish and chill until firm. Then spread with topping.  
Topping: 1 egg beaten, 2 ttbl. flour, 2 ttbl. butter, 1/2 c. sugar, 1 c. pineapple juice, 1 c. cream, whipped, 1/2 c. shredded cheese, sharp.  
In sauce pan combine egg, butter, sugar and pineapple juice. Stir over heat until thickened. Cool and fold in whipped cream. Spread on top of gelatin and sprinkle with cheese.  
Let set. Serves 12 to 15.

**MACARON CHERRY DELIGHT**  
3 egg whites  
1 1/2 c. sugar (divided)  
1 tsp. baking powder  
1 1/2 tsp. vanilla (divided)  
1 tsp. vinegar  
1/2 c. crushed soda crackers (21)  
1/2 c. chopped nuts  
1 envelope dessert topping mix  
1 8-oz. pkg. creamed cheese, softened  
1 21-oz. can cherry pie filling  
1 tsp. lemon juice  
Beat egg whites until foamy  
Gradually add 1 cup sugar, baking powder, 1 tsp. vanilla and vinegar, beating until stiff peaks form. Fold in cracker crumbs and nuts. Spread mixture into buttered 9-13-inch pan. Bake at 325 degrees for 20 minutes or until golden brown. Cool. Combine dessert topping with milk and remaining 1/2 tsp. vanilla. Prepare as directed on package.  
Beat cream cheese and remaining 1/2 c. sugar until smooth and creamy. Fold in dessert topping. Spoon over baked crust. Blend pie filling and lemon juice. Spoon over top. Refrigerate for several hours or overnight. Serves 12. Delicious!

(just like apple butter)  
8 c. zucchini, peeled and cubed  
Cook until tender mash fine and put through blender

Add: 3 c. sugar, 1/2 c. vinegar, one-fourth tsp. cloves; 1/2 tsp. allspice and 1/4 tsp. cinnamon  
Put in 300 d. oven and cook for about 3 hrs. stirring occasionally.  
Put in sterilized jars and seal.

High pressure "guns" spraying grease or paint through a nozzle can cause serious wounds, reminds the Idaho Medical Association.  
Prompt medical attention is urgent if a hand or finger accidentally gets in the way of spray from one of the pressure guns. Such injuries can be very serious and in some instances can necessitate amputation.  
The nozzles of paint and grease guns emit a fine jet stream from 600 to 7,000 pounds per square inch. Paint or grease fired at these velocities through small nozzles is driven through the skin and spreads along the affected limb.  
After entering the finger, the paint or grease may be found in the palm.

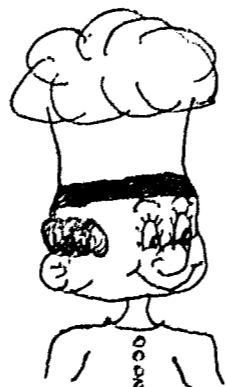
