Helen Cowger Ends Long Career In School Food Service Program—

The pictures tell part of the story here, helping show how much School Food Service operations have changed since 1956 when the picture of Helen Cowger was taken (left). The latest photos shows Helen and Jean Clemenhagen at the Juliaetta lunch facilities. Mrs. Cowger has added an almost 25-year career as a school food service worker.



Helen A. Cowger, a resident of the Gold Hill and Southwick area for over 50 years, retired last week after nearly 25 years in the School Food Service work of the area and of District 253.

Helen started at the Southwick Grade School as a helper at \$20.00 per month. Because of a vacancy in personnel she soon became head cook, serving approximately 50 students per day. There were few conveniences but the neighborhood donated canned fruits and vegetables along with fresh garden produce which was taken to the Lapwai cannery to be can-

ned for the hot lunch program.

When the Southwick School burned on March 15, 1954, Helen had just bought her first electric stove for her home, but now there was no job. However, in just three days the district and community converted the gymnasium into a school. The stage was made into the kitchen and lunch room. Helen loaned her old cook stove which was built with fire box coils and a water reservoir. The wood to heat that stove Helen would split and carry to the building. Cold water was piped in but often something went wrong at the pump house and

it seemed to be when the snow was waist deep and on the coldest day of the year.

In reminiscing, Helen reflects on the fact that she was cook, dishwasher, janitor, plumber, electrician, carpenter, stage hand and costume maker until 1965, when the school was closed and the pupils were sent to Juliaetta. The teachers, Mrs. Darwin Tarry and Mrs. Nora Callison and Helen, as cook, were transferred to Juliaetta also.

She assisted and learned other school cooking skills from Mrs. Carlton who was head cook at Juliaetta

until she retired in 1969. She also served as assistant janitor at Kendrick from 1965 until 1969. After Mrs. Carlton's retirement she became head cook and Jean Clemenhagen her assistant. On November 7, this ended and her retirement began.

In closing Helen says, "I've decided it's time to see how the other half lives and not to keep trying to straighten out all the curves between Southwick and Juliaetta. There has been many changes in the lunch program and always there was the challenge of teaching the beginners to eat because it was different from momma's."

Joe Broemeling, 81, Passes Nov. 17

Joseph J. Broemeling, 81, a lifelong resident of Genesee, died early Monday morning, November 17, at Latah Convalescent Center in Moscow.

Broemeling, a retired farmer and warehouse employee, had lived at the center since 1969.

He was born August 12, 1894, at Genesee to Herman and Mary Broemeling. He was married there to Amanda Grieser who preceded him in death in 1940.

He was a communicant of the St. Mary's Catholic Church in Genesee and was a member of the Knights of Columbus and the Genesee Community Firemen.

He is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Ben Holliday, Spokane, Mrs. Robert Tyler, Genesee and Mrs. Harley Howell, Seattle; two sons, Howard of Genesee and Richard in Trout Lake British Columbia; a brother, Gerhardt, in Provost, Canada and 21 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren.

Voting in this election will be at the Genesee Fire Hall and the Kendrick Fire Hall Dec. 1.

WOMEN AT WORK

The majority of American women work outside the home. 60 percent of them work during their first pregnancy. Good news or bad?

It all depends. The fact is that little attention has been paid to the special risks pregnant women face from exposure to toxic chemicals and other hazards in the air at work.

Certain occupational hazards may be especially dangerous, since the development of the fetus can be affected adversely by a variety of substances the mother inhales. Radiation and lead are known to damage the fetus. So is carbon monoxide, which is present in large quantities in cigarette smoke and in some industries.

The lead industry itself has already recommended that women who are fertile, pregnant or nursing babies be excluded from employment. That means all women of child-bearing age. Some groups fear this massive approach as a way for certain industries to discriminate against hiring women. The problem is complicated.

Studies by the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health suggest that it is not only reproductive processes of women who may be affected by breathing hazardous substances in the air. While a study of women anesthesiologists showed that they suffered from unusually high rates of spontaneous abortion and of babies with birth defects, a study of male professionals in this area showed some surprising findings. The children of these men also had a very high level of birth defects.

Some work can be hazardous to the reproductive processes of both males and females. More research

NICOTINE IN NONSMOKERS

Most urban nonsmokers have nicotine in their body fluids for most of their lives, says new research. They get it from breathing indoor air polluted by other people's tobacco smoke.

Measurable quantities of nicotine were present in the blood and urine of most nonsmokers tested at two hospitals in London. While the average concentration of nicotine in the urine of nonsmokers was 10 units, it was 1200 units for smokers. However, when nonsmokers were deliberately exposed to high concentrations of tobacco smoke in an unventilated room for a little more than an hour the average level of nicotine in their urine increased 1000 percent.

One startling result of the study was this: after exposure, several non smokers had such enormous increases in their urinary nicotine levels that they were higher than those of smokers.

The researchers at the New Cross and Maudsley Hospitals said, "Passive smoking may be harmful, and infants are most at risk." Another London study showed that tobacco smoke generated by parents' smoking actually doubles the risk of an infant's attack of pneumonia or bron-

chitis.

"The fact that some nicotine is present in the urine of almost all nonsmokers suggests that episodes of passive smoking are common in urban life," says the researchers. "We conclude that virtually all urban non smokers have measurable amounts of nicotine in their body fluids throughout most of their lives. It is derived from the indoor air they breathe and it requires no more than one or two smokers to contaminate a vehicle or building."

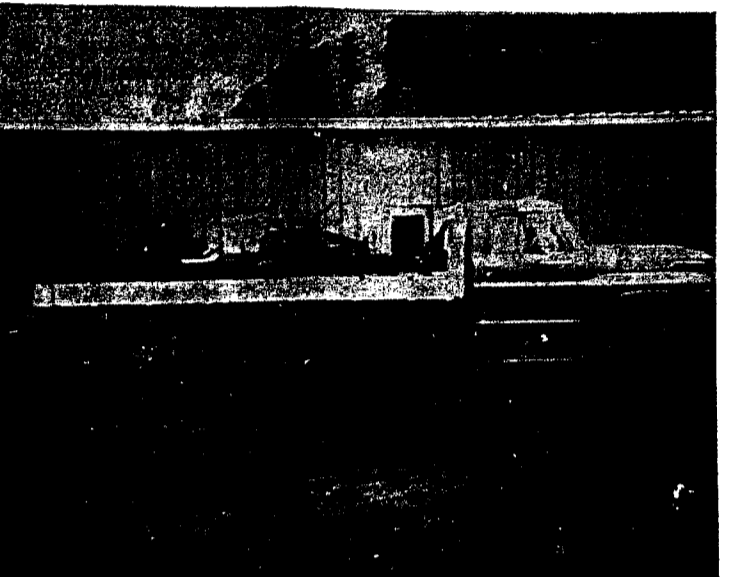

**Job Situation
 Grays Stable**

Frank J. Hartstein, manager of the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment, said that although job placement declined from 11 last week to 5 for the current week, the total number remained the same as for the middle week in November of 1974. New job listings were down, also, reflecting a slight tightening of the labor market in the area.

Jobs available include secretaries, a bookkeeper, cafe and domestic workers, and some technical workers, as well as an experienced library worker.

Hartstein's report indicated another rise in the number of persons seeking jobless pay in Latah county. He said that his office accepted 74 new claims during the previous week and 68 during the same week a year ago. The total number of persons now filing claims for unemployment insurance benefits rose to 505 from last week's 473, and was up 200 over the previous year's 305. All major areas in the county showed increases in the number of claimants, with the largest increase in the Troy-Deary-Bovill area where most of the county's woods workers are living.

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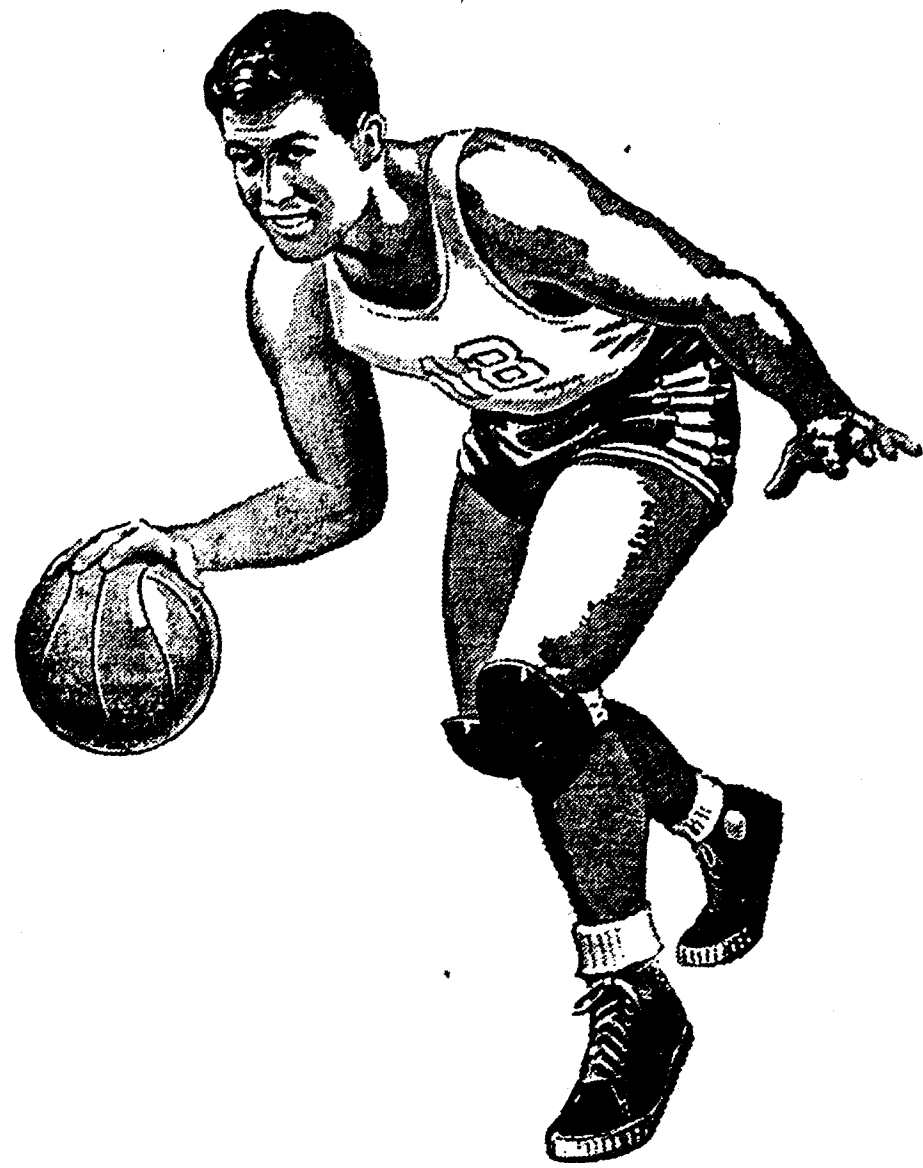

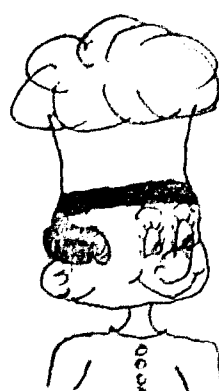
