Community cooperation cannot be overstressed. Participation from every one means successful results. This is a program in which strengths and deficiencies in our school's learning process can surface.

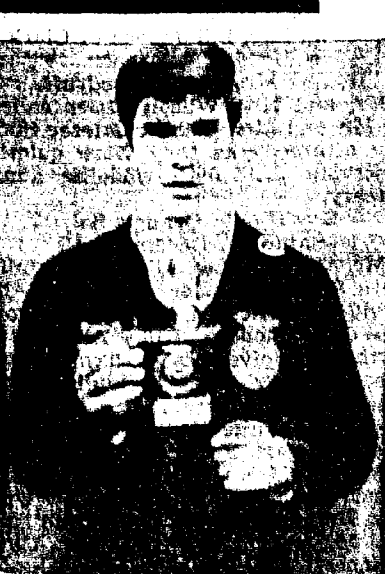
A good, constructive response from the students, the community and the teachers will be the only way the committee can compile the facts, identify the critical needs and bring forth an efficient problem-solving plan.

"We know that a baby's chances for having a good start in life are better if his parents are healthy and well-informed, and we want our friends to know that too."

"In addition to learning about such things as the benefits of good nutrition and the dangerous effects of drug and alcohol abuse," Miss Armitage said, "we also learned a variety of communication skills which we can use to get our message across. Some of the interesting ways that we present our information is through audiovisual presentations, newsletters, and graphic designs with health care themes."

"Here in Kendrick, we will be putting this knowledge to work by carrying out a two-year project in which the need for genetic counseling to prevent birth defects will be emphasized."
