

Basketball Season Opens Friday for Bulldogs, Tigers

High School varsity basketball season opens this weekend for many schools in the area including Kendrick and Genesee both of whom have games scheduled for Friday night evening, December 5.

Genesee travels to Lapwai to meet the Wildcats and Kendrick will host the defending A-4 State Champions, Deary.

Junior Varsity games are scheduled to begin at 6:30 with the varsity games following.

Injuries Riddle Tigers

Tiger Coach Bill LaMunyan faces the opening of the cage season with a squad riddled with injuries. Tim Eichner will be out at least until the middle of the month waiting for a broken ankle to heal; Doug Craig is

in a back brace for an undetermined period of time and Mike Boe, who was just recovering from one sprained ankle, sprained the other one in practice Monday night.

"We're going to be looking at the short end of the stick until January," Coach LaMunyan said Monday afternoon as he reviewed the season's possibilities.

Returning to the team this year will be lettermen Mike Boe, Earl Lawrence, Paul Hutcheson, Tim Eichner and Doug Craig.

Coming up from the JV ranks will be Doug Lohman, Ron and Rob Maynard, Doug Silflow, Jason Meyers and Jerry Hamilton.

As for a starting five for the Deary game, LaMunyan said Lawrence and Hutcheson will be definite starters but the other positions are "just up for grabs" because of the injuries.

Actually, when the team gets healthy again, LaMunyan will have a good potential. Eichner is pushing 6-3 in height while Meyer, Craig and Boe are all nearing the 6-2 mark.

The Kendrick coach also isn't too happy with the scheduling—After this first home game, the Tigers will be on the road until January 9th. "Next year we're going to try for a rotating schedule like we use in football," he said.

Deary should be one of the toughest teams in the district as well as the State again this year and the crippled Tigers will be facing an uphill battle in the first game of the season.

Lots of Bulldog Seniors

Nine of the ten varsity players on Coach Ozzie Kanikkeberg's Genesee Bulldogs are seniors this season, only Gary Bennett, a junior, will not be playing his final year of high school ball. Genesee travels to Lapwai Friday night and then returns home the next evening for a game with the Culedeas Wolves.

Back on the varsity this year will be lettermen Pat Aherin, Dan Stout, Ed Eglund, Jerry Wishard, Doug Green and Gary Bennett. Joining them will be Don Smith, Al Coulter, Marvin Alderman and Jay Roach.

"There are no 'big men' on the Bulldog squad this year. Ed Eglund goes about 6-3, Aherin 6-2 and Stout nears 6-1. The rest of the team drops down into the 5-10 area.

Ozzie reported that with the exception of a few minor aches and pains, the squad is free from injuries as the season nears its beginning.

For the Lapwai game Kanikkeberg says he tentatively plans to start Aherin at center, Dan Stout, Gary Bennett, Al Coulter and Doug Green.

"We've got real good depth this year," Kanikkeberg said. "All ten players are capable of really contributing to the team."

Summing up his chances, Ozzie said "we're pretty optimistic." He said the squad was shooting good and looking good in practice and if they can rebound and move the ball, the Bulldogs might have a good year.

"It's going to take a couple of real games to find out how we stand," he concluded.

Heavy Snows Covered Area Sunday

The first real snow storm of the season moved into the region early Sunday morning and by evening had virtually paralyzed much of the transportation methods. The storm also closed schools in Genesee and Kendrick and other nearby towns Monday. Then almost as quickly as it came, the snow disappeared, especially in the upper elevations which were exposed to the warm chinook winds which blew in from the coast.

But while the snow lasted it gave Kendrick, Juliaetta and much of the Potlatch valley some of the heaviest snow cover it had experienced in many years including the very severe winter of 68-69.

The storm came in late Saturday night and snow began falling early Sunday morning, accompanied by strong winds in the higher elevations. The snow just kept falling all day, gradually increasing in intensity until late Sunday evening. During much of the day, while the temperatures were in the middle and lower twenties, the snow was light and drifted easily, quickly blocking many portions of highway 95 and the other secondary roads in the area.

With the coming of darkness the temperatures rose and the snow turned to rain. The winds still were blowing strongly in Genesee and on the hills and the combination of the warm rain and winds started to remove the snow almost as quickly as it came.

The sheltered Potlatch valley didn't get the wind and by Monday morning there was still over a foot of snow on the ground which was rapidly turning into a slushy mess.

The weather remained overcast and above freezing Monday in the valley and warm and windy on the hills. By Tuesday morning the snow was almost gone in Genesee and Kendrick and Juliaetta were almost covered with about six inches of wet slush.

Schools resumed Tuesday after an extra day of Thanksgiving vacation for area students.

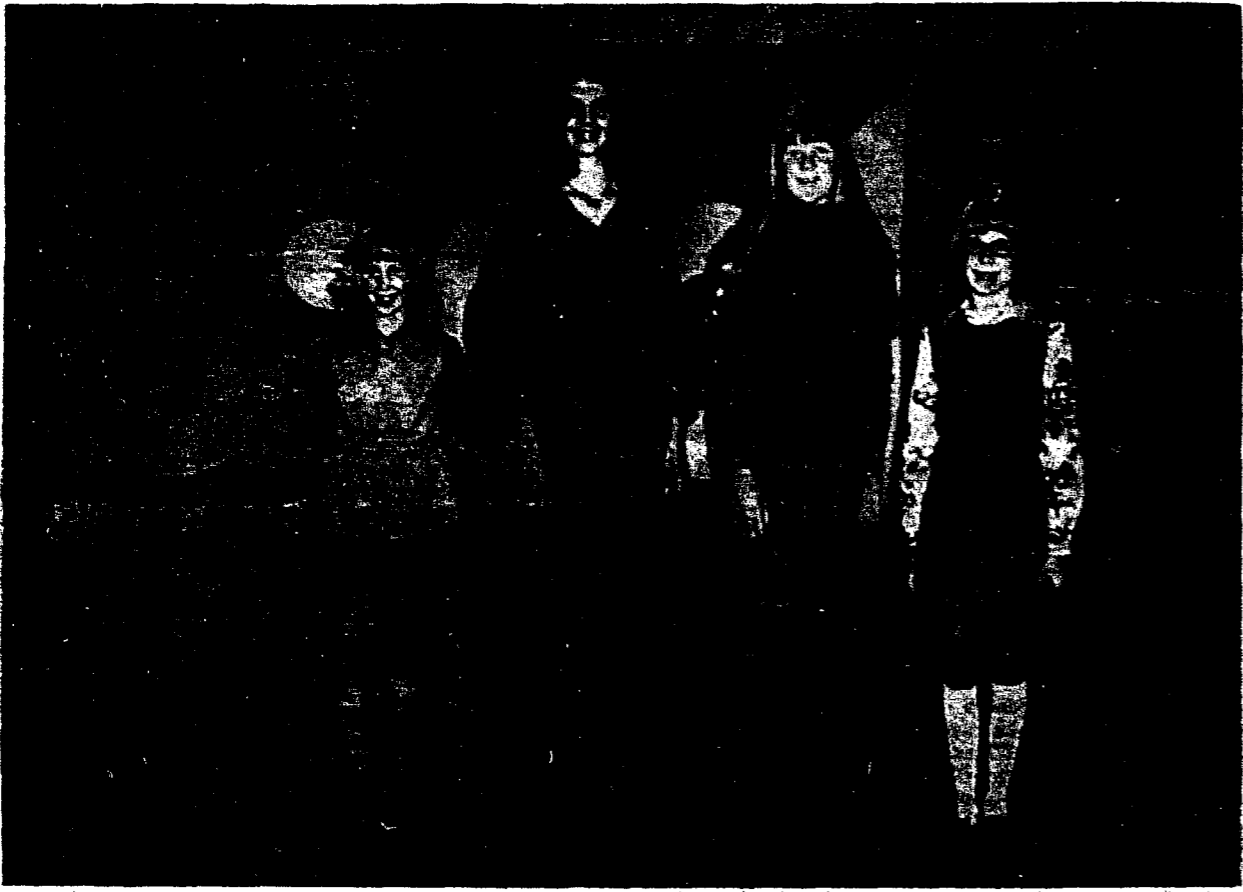

Skater's Monoxide Is Hazard

Carbon monoxide comes from car exhaust. From cigarette smoke. And, sometimes from skating rinks.

Carbon monoxide produced by ice-resurfacing machines at indoor rinks may be a health hazard to skaters, especially children. At one rink in Seattle where children developed headaches, nausea, and vomiting, Dr. Carl J. Johnson reported the carbon monoxide level at 304 parts per million. That is excessive and dangerous. In industry, for example, the maximum concentrations of the gas cannot average out to more than 50 parts per million.

The trouble with detecting the gas is that it is colorless and odorless. But it has telling effects. Even low levels cause dizziness and interfere with vision and motor coordination.

When someone inhales carbon monoxide the gas pumps oxygen out of the red blood cells. The cells of the body become starved for oxygen. High levels can be lethal.

According to Dr. Johnson, children are at higher risk from carbon monoxide at skating rinks because they are nearer the floor, where the gases tend to lay. For another, children have a higher metabolism and probably a higher carbon monoxide uptake. And skating can increase breathing volume by as much as ten times.

Dr. Johnson recommends that indoor ice rinks be monitored to make sure that carbon monoxide levels are minimal. He suggests opening all doors to the outside air to improve ventilation, and limiting the time when resurfacing machines are in operation. He also suggests special mufflers for the machine.

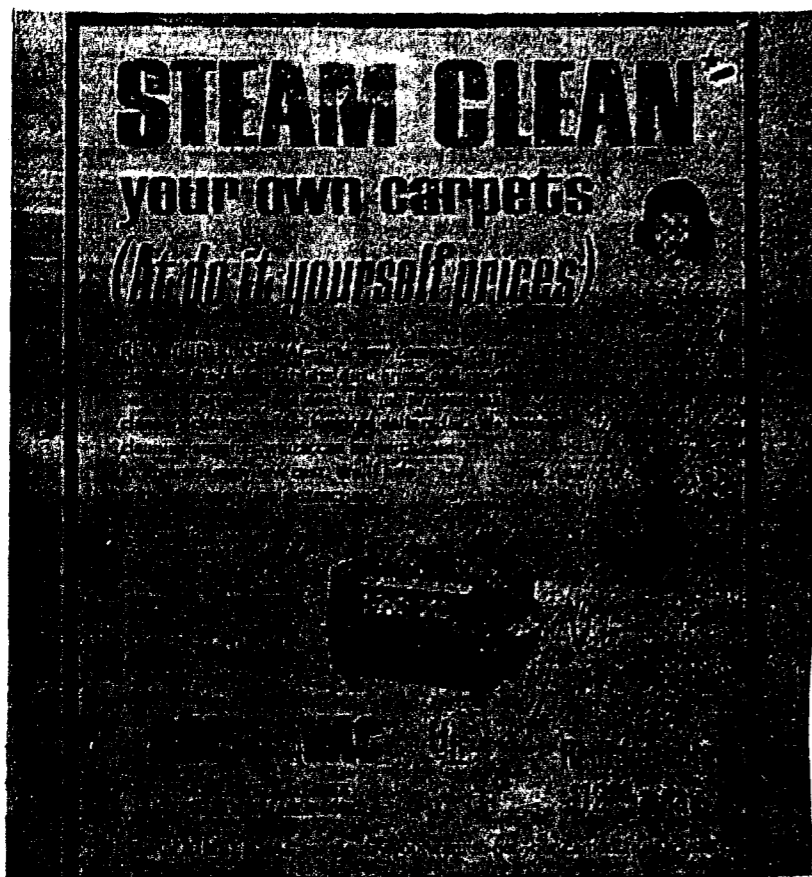

New Trap Aids Kokanee Research Planning Project

By Royce Williams
Idaho Dept. Fish & Game
Concrete being poured into forms now on the South Fork of the Boise River will help change kokanee fishing at Anderson Ranch Reservoir.
The Department of Fish and Game is building a kokanee trap just downstream from the Pine Bridge. The trap is expected to be in use by next fall and it will serve two purposes. Eggs from kokanee trapped as they move up the South Fork from Anderson Ranch will be used for restocking the reservoir and stocking other waters in the state. The trap also will contribute substantially to the department's search for the optimum size and number of kokanee Anderson Ranch can support.
The department recently hired

John Coon, a U/I graduate who will continue a long-term study of the South Fork and Anderson Ranch fisheries.

From past research on the Anderson kokanee, the department has found a close connection among three factors affecting the lake's fish. A balancing of numbers and size of fish as well as the fishermen take must be made, the department said.

With the trap, the department can get a better idea of growth rates of the kokanee, how many there are in the reservoir and document changes brought about by the regulated fishermen's take.

Kokanee fishing in the future in Anderson Ranch and in streams will depend upon the balance achieved by the outcome of Coon's study and by the Idaho angler's preferences, the department said.

For example, the department said, if the optimum size of kokanee at Anderson were to be set between 12 and 14 inches, then the number of fish might have to be cut back to a population that could grow that large

County Job Picture

Although 65 workers filed new claims for unemployment insurance benefits during the week, the number of Latah Co. jobless pay seekers declined by 2 from the previous week. Frank Hartstein Moscow office manager for the Idaho Department of Employment reported today that a number of loggers returned to work during the past couple of weeks, but that the cold weather curtailed some construction activities. This almost balanced out the total number of persons continuing to file claims. The total now stands at 518, down from the 520 of the previous week and up from the 401 at the end of November 1974. Cold, dry weather will keep woods workers busy, Hartstein indicated but severe cold weather coming now may further cut into the ranks of those working on building and road jobs throughout the area.

The placement of job seekers remained fairly stable also, according to Hartstein's report. He said that his office found work for 8 county residents during the week compared with 6 during the previous week and 7 in Thanksgiving week a year ago. Job opportunities were up somewhat from the previous week as a total of 13 jobs were on hand at closing time Friday.

As the number of kokanee grow beyond the reservoir's food production, the fish become stunted. If anglers prefer more of the smaller fish the numbers of kokanee could be allowed to increase, the department said.

Future limits on the fisherman's catch, limits that do not allow cutting into the spawning run, will be set based partly on information gathered at the new permanent trap on the South Fork, the department said.

Home Cookin'...

Apples are so plentiful this year—so everyone is amply supplied with them. There are so many ways they can be used, and every way is delicious. This week, Mrs. Al Zenger, another one of Genesee's excellent cooks, shares her Raw Apple Cake with all of you. Our gal, Marilyn, tried it, and says it's delicious.

Raw Apple Cake
 ¾ cup butter or oleo
 1½ cups white sugar
 2 well-beaten eggs
 2¼ cups sifted flour
 1½ tsp. soda
 ½ tsp. salt
 ¾ cup strong coffee (cold)
 1 tsp. vanilla
 3 cups chopped apples
 ½ cup brown sugar
 1 tsp. cinnamon
 ½ cup chopped nut meats
 Cream butter with white sugar, eggs. Add sifted flour, soda, salt, coffee and vanilla. Fold in chopped apples. Pour into a 13x9x2 pan. Mix brown sugar, cinnamon and nuts; sprinkle over batter in pan. Bake in moderate oven 350 degrees for 45 to 55 minutes. Serve with whipped cream.

Smoking Cycles

History repeats itself. Even the history of smoking.

Early explorers and colonists in the New World learned to inhale tobacco from the Indians who smoked the leaf in a Y-shaped pipe. Each end of the double-forked pipe which was called a TUBACO, was inserted into a nostril. Historical records show that Colonial women as well as men smoked pipes, and in the early days smoking was even permitted at church services.

Matches were unknown then, and pipes had to be kept lighted by sparks created when flint was scraped. The sound of scraping was such an annoyance during services that soon smoking had to be banned at church meetings.

Other offensive aspects of tobacco were recognized early by General Court in Massachusetts which passed laws making it illegal to grow the weed or to smoke it in public. "Those who wished to do so might smoke in taverns but only if no one present objected," says one historical source.

"At the first complaint the smoker had either to stop smoking, hire a private room where he would not disturb anyone or face a possible fine of two shillings and sixpence."

The cycle is coming 'round again. Smoking in enclosed public places is being restricted or prohibited by legislatures across the country. At this point in history, the purpose is to protect the health as well as the comfort of nonsmokers.

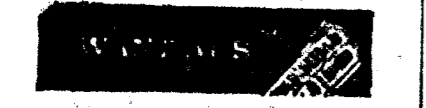

Snowmobiles

Idaho has its share of snowmobiles skimming across snowy fields, observes the Idaho Medical Association.

A sport that offers such excitement is not without its hazards.

The International Snowmobile Industry Association has the following suggestions to keep the fun in and the injuries out:

Practice driving before going anywhere. Become familiar with the controls and characteristics of the machine.

Be extra careful on ice. A machine with more than one rider can go through ice strong enough for skating.

Watch the weather. Avoid frostbite and chill.

Wear suitable clothing. Carry extra fuel, a can of de-icer, spare parts, tools and flares. Breakdown in the back country is a real danger.

Know the terrain. Fences and partially concealed obstacles can cause serious injury or death.

Never travel alone on a long trip—use the "buddy system" and tell someone where you are going.

One Hair May Hang a Poacher

A poacher in Idaho can no longer come within a hair of getting away.

Microscopes in the Department of Fish and Game lab at the Region 3 office in Garden City are helping conservation officers identify poached game.

Greatly enlarged, one hair from a deer or elk shows certain patterns in the scales of the hair shaft. Each animal has its own hair scale pattern.

Les Trout, a senior game research biologist at the lab said the hair identification has been used in two Idaho cases and is accepted as evidence in court.

"In one case," he said, "we only had one hair found on a knife blade, but it was enough to identify the animal and tie the poacher to the poached game animal."

Should the conservation officer be investigating a suspected poaching case, he can take a few shafts of hair from the back of a pickup truck, for example, and send it to Trout's lab for positive identification.

"It helps in the identification," Trout said, "if the conservation officer can find a drop of blood or a small sliver of meat in the back of the suspect's truck."

If there is a meat sample or a bit of the animal's blood, Trout will use it in a second identity test called ascending paper chromatography.

Amino acids in the blood or meat of the animal will stain a strip of paper in a series of stripes fading from red-brown to white-pink. Each animal species will leave a print on the paper strip different from other species, Trout said.

The process takes about 24 hours and involves hanging a strip of filter paper inside a sealed tube so that the bottom of the strip touches the solvent holding the meat or blood at the bottom of the tube.

"California's Fish and Game Department say they have developed this method to the point they can tell the precise drainage an animal was taken from," Trout said.

He said Idaho may be able to do the same thing but that is farther down the road.

"Right now, we're building up a library of chromatography strips and hair scale patterns for Idaho species."

"Linking an animal to a particular drainage may be one of the results of the reference collection we're building on hair patterns and chromatography," Trout said.

Work continues at the lab on what has been a major problem for fish and game departments—the identification of the game animals taken illegally.

Trout believes the hair scale patterns and chromatography methods will play an increasingly more significant role in curbing poaching in Idaho.

CHAIN SAWS

Chain saws are widely used in the Mountain West, and injuries are all too common, observes the Idaho Medical Association.

The U. S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, which reports that there were 23,000 people in the United States requiring hospital treatment for chain saw injuries, suggests a few basic safety tips.

Use a machine appropriate to the job: a light saw for trimming branches rather than a heavy, cumbersome unit.

Have wood to be cut close to the ground and the saw parallel to the ground so the saw won't swing down toward your body after the wood is cut through.

Keep legs well apart or to one side of the saw so that it won't hit your legs in case of a kickback.

When walking with the saw, turn off the motor and hold it to your side with the chain pointing backward.

Always start the motor on the ground or other firm surface. Wear clothing which will protect you from flying chips, and safety glasses are a good idea. Never leave an unat-

LOWER HOME TEMPERATURES IN THE WINTERTIME

Lower home temperatures in the wintertime conserve fuel, and also provide some health benefits, observes the Idaho Medical Association.

Heating the interior of homes and offices removes moisture from the air. The higher the temperature, the dryer the air. Air with little moisture aggravates bronchial and other respiratory problems. It can contribute to dry throat and nose, coughs and dry, itchy skin.

The respiratory system does not cope well with sudden changes in temperature.

Moving from an overly warm room into outside cold affects the body adversely, causing coughs and respiratory problems. The body adjusts to temperature changes gradually.

Although there are no major health advantages inherent in keeping inside temperature somewhat lower, there are some benefit in keeping the thermostat below, rather than above, 70 degrees in the winter.

HEART ATTACKS

There is evidence suggesting that the aggressive, driving individual is more likely to have a heart attack than the more relaxed person, reports the Idaho Medical Association.

In connection with the Western Collaborative Group Study of Coronary Heart Disease, records are kept for more than 8 years on more than 3,000 men employed in 10 California companies.

Those who exhibited aggressiveness, ambitiousness, competitive drive and chronic sense of time urgency had heart attacks more than twice as frequently as the more relaxed individuals.

The classic "risk factors" were reaffirmed as playing a role in heart attacks—family history, diabetes, schooling, smoking habits, behavior pattern, blood pressure and levels of blood lipids. The behavior pattern was one of the major factors.

Result of the study were reported in a recent issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association by physicians associated with the Mount Zion Hospital and Medical Center, San Francisco.
