### Genesee Bulldogs Trample Lapwai, Culesac To Open '75-76 Basketball Season

Genesee's Doug Green scored 22 points against the host Lapwai Wildcats to help lead the Bulldogs to an easy 60-39 victory Friday night. Genesee, opening its season against the Wildcats who last earlier in the week to Culesac, dominated almost every phase of the game. Genesee led 33-18 at the of the first half. The Bulldogs had a big advantage rebounding. Pat Alerin, the Bulldog center pulled down 13 rebounds and Dan Stout did well under the boards also. Genesee's shooting was a big factor, too—they hit 50 of their shots from the field and 87 percent from the foul line. Green hit 60 percent of his shots in collecting his 22 points. Al Coulter was 6 for 10 from the field hitting

5 in a row in the first half, and Dan Stout also shot well under the basket. Both Stout and Coulter had 12 points. The only junior for Genesee, Gary Bennett, scored 2 points. Marv Alderman and Ed Eglund came off the bench to add to the score—Alderman getting 6 and Eglund scoring 2. The Bulldogs proved to be a bit out of shape, but were ready for the Wildcats, leading from the first basket on. The Wildcats had their full court press on in the second half but the Bulldogs were able to handle it easily. The Lapwai Wildcats won the JV game 36-34. The Bulldogs were leading 34-24 with 3 minutes to play in the ball game when Lapwai put on the full court press and the Bulldogs weren't able to handle it. Lapwai's JV's evened their season record to 1-1 while Genesee is 0-1. Genesee's Mark Eagen led all scorers with 12 points while Greg Haynes hit 10 for the Bulldogs. Coach Ozzie Kanikkeberg's Bulldogs made it two in a row Saturday night by rolling past the visiting Culesac Wolves 55-41. Culesac tied the game briefly in the second quarter before GHS pushed out in front again and was never in trouble after that point. Doug Green, the sharp-shooting Bulldog guard, dropped in two free throws to put Genesee ahead 2-0 within just three seconds of the opening jump. Early in the first period the Bulldogs lead 8-2 before the Wolves finally started to hit and closed the gap to 6-6 at one point. Genesee came back and were leading 17-12 at the end of the first quarter. Genesee kept its lead until about midway in the second quarter when Culesac began hitting from under the basket, finally tying the game at 22-22. Then Marv Alderman dropped one in from the side; Doug Green hit on a 20-footer from above the key and Al Coulter made it 28-22 on a 12 foot jumper before Culesac called for time out. Genesee had moved out to a 32-25 lead at half-time. The Bulldogs outscored the visitors 14-8 in the third quarter as they tried to break up the tight Culesac defense under the basket and ended the game out-rebounding the Wolves 30 rebounds to 19 for CHS. Ozzie used his bench strength thru much of the third and final quarters as the Bulldogs pushed to their 55-41 win. Green and Coulter each collected 14 points while Dan Stout added 9 more and Ed Eglund 6. Genesee's B team romped to an easy 71-32 win in the curtain-raiser behind the 23 point effort of Mark Eagen. The Bulldogs were ahead 44-18 at the half as Coach Gary Hook swept his bench clean to keep the score down.

### Wallace (Caus) Clark, Retired Fix Ridge Farmer, Passes December 6

Wallace (Cus) Clark, 78, a retired Fix Ridge farmer died at 10:05 p. m. Saturday, December 6, at Tri-State Hospital in Clarkston, Washington following a lengthy illness. He was born November 15, 1897, on Fix Ridge near Juliaetta, the son of Walter and Lavonia Clark, one of ten children. He enlisted in the Navy during World War I serving 18 months overseas and was a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Baker-Lind Post 3913 at Kendrick.



He married Nora Cox of Kendrick, October 17, 1923, and they started farming on Fix Ridge which has been their home until 1972 when they moved to 3113 5th Street, Apt. 5, Lewiston, Idaho.

Clark served for many years on the Fix Ridge School Board. He was a great lover of baseball and boxing. For several years he played baseball with the towns of Juliaetta, Kendrick and Genesee. A write-up in the Kendrick Gazette in 1923 stated, "He was the invincible catcher on Kendrick's crack baseball team." During World War II, he served as an officer on the Moscow City Police force under police chief Orville Crooks in 1943 and 1944.

He was known by all as a real family man and his family and joy in Bible study were his greatest satisfactions.

Family members who preceded him in death were three brothers, one sister, and his son, Walter Clinton, who died on July 17, 1951 at the age of 21 years.

He is survived by his widow at the Lewiston home; one daughter, Jacquelyn Richardson of Ellicott City, Md.; three sisters, Myrtle Snoon of Vancouver, Wash., Minnie Dyer of Longview, Wash., Minnie Rice of Metaline Falls, Wash.; two brothers, Keith of Lewiston, and Claude of Metaline Falls; three grandchildren, one step-grandson, five great-grandchildren and a host of friends and relatives.

Funeral services will be held Wednesday, Dec. 10, at 1:00 from the First Church of the Nazarene at 1700 8th Street with the Rev. Richard Salisbury of the Orchard Nazarene Church officiating. Burial will be at the Lewiston Normal Hill Cemetery.

Vassar-Rawls Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements and the V. F. W. will conduct graveside services.

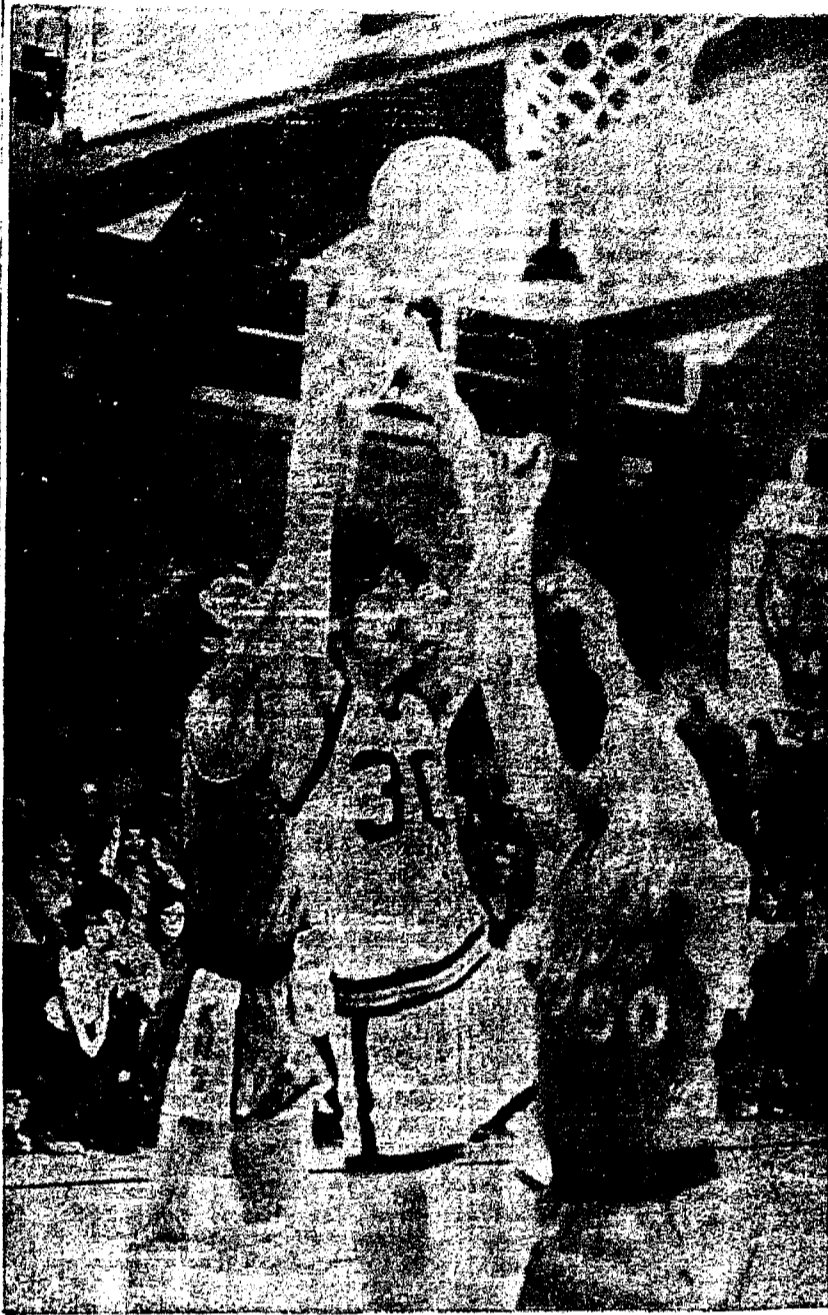

Although the Mustangs won 63-40, Kendrick kept the game close all through the first half and even had it tied briefly in the third quarter.

The Tigers were playing without the services of Eichner and got less than full use of Mike Boe who was playing with a strained ankle and Doug Craig, who is recovering from a sore back.

Deary held on to a 16-12 lead at the end of the first quarter of play. The Tigers outscored Deary in the second period 13-11 and were down by only 27-25 at the half.

Coming out in the third quarter Kendrick tied it at 27-27 and then Deary turned loose its fast break and ran up five field goals in a short time. "That just broke our backs," LaMunyon said later. Kendrick managed to stay with 10 to 13 points of the Mustangs until the middle of the final period when the visitors stretched out to almost 20 points.

Paul Hutcherson scored 12 points to pace the Tiger offense and stole the ball away from Deary players several times plus causing numerous turnovers.

The Tiger coach also had praise for the backboard work of Rob Maynard who hauled the ball down 12 times, despite being shorter than most of his opponents.

Other Kendrick scoring was Doug Lohman 7; Doug Sillow 4; Mike Boe 6, Ron Maynard 2, Doug Craig 2, Rob Maynard 3 and Jason Meyer 4. Kendrick will be Kaniah Friday night and then Saturday goes to Lapwai.

**KEEPING UP SCHOOL GRADES**

He may have defective vision, and be unable to read the teacher's notes on the blackboard. Does the child hear well? There may be defective hearing, caused by something as simple as impacted wax in the ears. This should be checked by a physician. **Job Situation Remains About Same**

Little change was noted in the total number of persons seeking jobless pay in Latah county during the past week. **A SORE THROAT**

A sore throat is nature's warning that something is out of order, says the Idaho Medical Association. Often it accompanies a common cold and the soreness passes in a few days, but it can be the symptom of disease: from diphtheria to leukemia, disease that may require a physician's skill to diagnose. Sometimes tonsils and adenoids are involved in causing a sore throat. Allergies can cause a sore throat. Cold, dry winter air can trigger it, as can extreme thirst, excessive smoking or mouth breathing. Anything that dries out the throat and cuts off secretions that normally wash dust away can be the culprit.

ing slight increases elsewhere in the county. All areas of the county reflected significantly higher unemployment this year than last except the Troy-Deary-Bovill area. Job placement declined from the previous week to only 4 persons placed in gainful employment. A week ago 5 workers were given job finding help, but during the first week in December 1974, only 2 persons were successfully referred to jobs. Hartstein said his office had a total of 14 jobs still available, most of which called for experience, training or specific types of education.

The first railways reached the Northwest in the early eighties. Passengers were mostly of the brave and adventurous types. Their journals remarked at the buffalo herds, the Indians, the vastness of the prairies, the incredible mountains.

One man wrote of the Montana coal deposits that often lay right on the earth's surface. Smoke clouds marked the spontaneously ignited fires that seemed to burn perpetually and little noticed.

No steam locomotives trail their dark plumes today but the coal still lies beneath the prairies by the billions of tons. Scientists estimate that

it could meet the nation's energy needs for 500 years to come.

An energy crisis is now upon us. Power plants fueled by surface-mined Western coal represent a practical, immediate solution. Such plants are planned and, although they include every environmental safeguard, their existence is being seriously threatened by anti-power plant forces. Public understanding of the urgency of the situation and support of plant construction without further delay is essential.

## Rural Mail Patron's Help Ask As Winter Approaches

The cooperation of rural and suburban postal customers in helping to keep private roads passable and approaches to mail boxes clear during the coming winter months was requested today by Postmasters Verla Hall, of Genesee; Floyd Heimgartner of Jullaetta, and Bob Magnuson, of Kendrick.

"Postal customers are responsible for keeping approaches to their mail boxes clear of snow and other obstructions that would make mail delivery difficult or impossible," the Postmasters said. "People should be aware that failure to clear paths to mail boxes promptly after heavy snows may temporarily prevent carriers from making deliveries. Customers will be contacted if they have an obstructed mail box."

There may also be a need to ask postal customers to relocate their boxes on a new line of travel if excessive and extended detours are necessary, the postmasters said.

"Highway officials are responsible for keeping public roads passable and in good repair," the postmasters said. "But in areas where mail service is provided over roads not maintained by road authorities, the owner of the road is responsible."

Rural and star route carriers will make every reasonable effort to serve the greatest number of customers during severe weather, the postmasters said. "But service on foot when roads are impassable is not required. Also, when state highway authorities or local police consider road travel hazardous, postal service may be cur-

### FROSTBITE

Frostbite can bring more than discomfort reminds the Idaho Medical Association. It can bring pain and potentially serious injury.

Frostbite means that tissues are frozen. Crystals of ice forms between the cells. Nerves, muscles and blood vessel tissues are most susceptible.

Wind is an important factor. The chilling effect of air at 20 degrees, moving at 45 miles an hour is the same as 40-below-zero on a still day.

Often, frostbite is first detected when another person notices that the victim's ear or nose is turning white. The frozen part becomes hard to the touch and loses feeling. Many sports leaders advocate a buddy system for outdoor winter sports.

Proper dress is important in the prevention of frostbite. Avoid over exertion and excessive perspiration. Avoid contact of bare flesh with cold metal. Do not smoke or drink alcohol.

NEVER rub the affected part with snow. Forget the completely invalid caution against rapid thawing. Do not massage or rub the frozen part.
