

## Genesee's American Legion Building May Be Purchased By City Under HUD

A special meeting was called Monday evening by Mayor L. W. Sorensen for the purpose of the pre-application of a HUD grant purchase of the Legion building in Genesee.

Attending the meeting besides Mayor Sorensen were councilmen Guy A. Lee, Leonard Singhouse, Jerry Lanehan and councilman-elect Stan Merrill and clerk Mike Martinez. Also representatives of the Moscow Latah Library, Linda Schlueter, Dorothy Hollen, Genesee librarian; L. W. (Lonnie) Williams, CEDA, Moscow; Bob White and Fred Loazia, Lions club; Leon Danielson, president of Civic Association, and Ray Stout, Ed Morken and Bill Browning, representing Bielenberg-Schooler Legion Post.

The general discussion involved moving the Genesee Community li-

brary from the Delta Ford building, where it is now located, to the Legion building and utilizing another part of the building as a Senior Citizen and Community Center.

It was noted that the Delta Ford building is inadequate for the amount of books that can be utilized and that the roof of the building is badly in need of repair. The present library space is only about 500 square feet, and, at the Legion building space could be more than double. In short, it was opined that the existing library is in need of extensive renovating.

A Legion representative stated they will run a study on the cost of heating and keeping the building heated at all times.

Lonnie Williams said there are funds allocated to the State of Idaho in the amount of \$2.1 million dollars from HUD for which the city could qualify for use as a Senior Citizen Center.

The Genesee council agreed to hold a public meeting on Monday, January 5, 1976 at 8 p. m. at City Hall. All interested people are invited and urged to attend.

Discussed at the January 5 meeting will be the total cost of maintenance and operation of the Legion building and who would pay for portions of the upkeep, and what would be the city's cost, and make other further studies.

Some recommendations made for financing the upkeep were that a fund raising event be held annually with funds derived from same to pay for the upkeep.

The Civic Association representative stated they will be willing to put up some funds for the upkeep and the city indicated they were in favor of moving the library temporarily to the Legion building. The executive committee of the Legion post indicated they will discuss this with Legion members and further discuss it with the city at the January 5th meeting.

It was also reported that Genesee will apply for a HUD grant to complete the water improvement project started last summer.

**Genesee Cold**  
A tight man-to-man defense and some cold shooting by the Bulldogs gave Kamiah undisputed claim to first place in the Central Idaho A-3 league Friday night as the Kubs won 35-25 in a contest highlighted by defensive play.

Genesee had jumped out to an 8-4 first quarter lead before Kamiah rallied in the second and took a 10-14 advantage into the dressing room at halftime. Both teams were on the defensive in the third quarter, but Genesee was ice-cold, managing just 2 points the entire 8 minutes of play.

The Kubs outscored the Bulldogs 10-9 in the final quarter for the win. Al Center's 10 points led all scorers for the evening. Doug Green had 8, Dan Stout 4, Ed Eglund 2 and Pat Aherin 1. Doug Kries paced the Kubs with 8 points.

**Tigers Dropped 57-42**  
Still hampered by injuries, Coach Bill LaMunyan's KHS Tigers went to Timberline Saturday night and were dropped 57-42. One bright spot was that this game marked the return to limited action of Tim Eichner, who is in the process of recovering from a broken ankle. Eichner wasn't able to play at full speed or the complete game but he managed 6 points and Coach LaMunyan was pleased with Tim's contribution.

Mike Boe pumped in 16 points to pace the Tigers. Paul Hutcheson, nursing a sprained ankle, was below par with only 4 points.

Timberline moved out to a 10-15 first quarter lead and were ahead 21-17 at the half. Kendrick had a poor third quarter, managing only 6 points while the Spartans were moving out to 16.

Kendrick goes up to Pottlatch on the 26th for a Christmas tournament. The Tigers play Garfield at 6:30 in the first round. Whether the team wins or loses will determine game time Saturday. Should Kendrick win its game Saturday will be at 8:00. If Kendrick is a loser in the first round its Saturday game will be at 6:30.

#### INSULATION AND WEATHER STRIPPING TO YOUR HOME

There is a good deal of merit in adding insulation and weather stripping to your house if it is done properly. Roy Taylor, Agricultural Extension Engineer, has advised county agent Gordon Dulle that observing the vapor barriers in insulation is most essential. If an attic is now insulated and more is to be added, use a pour in or blown in or batts without a vapor barrier. Insulation between two vapor barriers is apt to become moist and lose its value. Wet material transfers heat and can also cause damage to walls and ceilings.

#### YOUR GAME DEPARTMENT

Idaho Dept. of Fish and Game  
LONG AND SHORT

On the first day of 1976, the new length limits on fish caught in Idaho go into effect.

The Department of Fish and Game conservation officers will be measuring fish under the new regulations as follows:

Total length is the greatest length between the tip of the head or snout and the tip of the caudal (tail) fin when the fin rays are squeezed together.

Measurements will be taken in a straight line and not over the curve of the fish's body.

Called the trout length limit, the new rules say an angler can catch 10 fish, but no more than five of the fish can exceed 12 inches. No more than two of the fish over 12 inches may exceed 18 inches.

In some of the state's 6 fishing areas there may be exceptions to this general regulation, and anglers are advised to check the "exception" section of each area he plans to fish.

New fishing regulations are being made available to license vendors across Idaho as the vendors place their orders for 1976 licenses. The mailing began December 17.

**You're Kidding!**  
"Over the years I've heard of such stories but was always skeptical. "Now I believe."

The letter was written by the district forest ranger at Idaho City to a rancher in Emmett.

Back in November, the forest ranger happened to be on the North Fork Thorn Creek when he thought

he saw the remains of an elk that had been taken during the open season.

"From a distance the entrails, hide, legs and head could be seen and since there were no antlers on the head and the 1975 hunt was a bull only hunt, we thought we had discovered a game violation," the ranger wrote.

The ranger went in for a closer examination.

"The evidence made what happened obvious.

"Someone had dressed out a mule rather than an elk," the ranger said. "I suppose by now it is being served hot on some sportsman's table," he said.

"I don't know that this is your lost mule," he told the rancher, "but if it is, at least now you know what happened to it."

Moral: Don't take elk steaks from strangers this Christmas.

Say Cheese

Going hunting in the middle of the winter and knowing before the hunt there will be no game brought home may sound strange.

But, it is done in Idaho. Throughout the winter, the Department of Fish and Game offers free permits to nonconsumptive hunters, those hunters who go after mountain lion with camera and dogs.

The dogs are prohibited in any units in which a deer or elk hunting season is open, but all but three or four late archery elk and deer hunts have closed.

In getting a mountain lion's image on a strip of film and listening to the chase involved is a hunter's idea of fun, the regulations list the following steps:

—There are no nonconsumptive lion hunts in Units 43, 53, 60, 61, 62, 62A, 63, 63A, 64, 65, 66, 67, and 69.

—Permits are available from any of the department's offices.

—One permit is required per party of hunters.

—Each permit is valid for no more than 10 calendar days.

—Each permit must specify the area to be hunted.

—No hunting license is required.

**Fishing Closure**  
Part of the Salmon River is closed to all fishing except for steelhead catch-and-release until the end of the year.

The Fish and Game commission said the catch-and-release steelhead season will continue through November 30 as set earlier, but the closure is to regulate fishing to protect steel head.

**Former Area Professor Visited Russia Four Times**

James Nelson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Nelson, Rt. 2, Orofino. He grew up and was educated in this area and is now teaching at Cornell College in Mt. Vernon, Iowa. The following is a story that appeared in the college's student publication.

Four trips to Russia mark the past of Dr. James Nelson, assistant professor of Russian at Cornell. Nelson, hired this year to replace the late Dr. Mihailo Mihailovic, made his most recent visit to the Soviet Union this past summer.

Nelson, who received his B. A. and M. A. from Syracuse University and his Ph.D. from the University of Illinois, returned this summer from Russia where he was visiting for ten weeks as a participant in the Sum-Change of Language Teachers under the Cultural Exchange Program. Thirty-two other language teachers accompanied him on the trip.

Through he specializes in Slavic linguistics and Russian literature, Nelson is interested in all aspects of the Soviet Union.

"When I go to Russia, I go for academic and non-academic reasons," he said. "I am interested in Russia in a global sense and explore every aspect of the country that I can."

Nelson began his journeys to the Soviet Union in 1968 when he visited the country for three weeks during August and September. During his visit, Russian troops invaded Czechoslovakia.

Over the Russian radio, the press announced the event as a news story," he said. "The action was not called an invasion. It was termed an action taken at the request of the Czech people."

His second trip to Russia occurred from Aug. 1970 to June, 1971. He was a Fulbright Fellow and a participant in the government exchange program.

While he was there, he worked on his dissertation on unstressed vowel phonology in southern Russian dialects at the University of Moscow. His wife, who has an M. A. in Slavic language and literature, aided him in the research.

His third trip to the country was taken last January when he took a group of students from Wells and Colby colleges on a three week visit.

Nelson taught at Colby College in Waterville, Maine the semester before he came to Cornell. A year earlier he was teaching in Wells College at Aurora, New York and before that was teaching at both Wells and Eisenhower College in Seneca Falls, N. Y. for two years.

In addition to his interest in Russian Nelson is also a fan of motorcycles. He currently has a motorcycle in Mt. Vernon, but has found little time to ride it.

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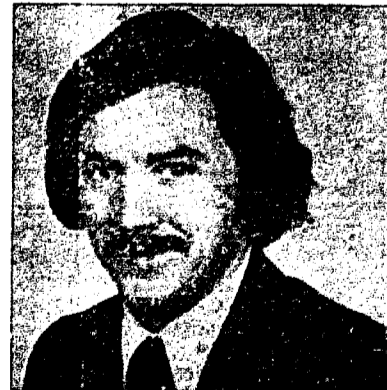

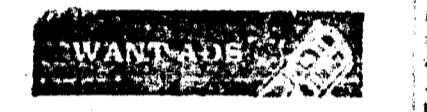

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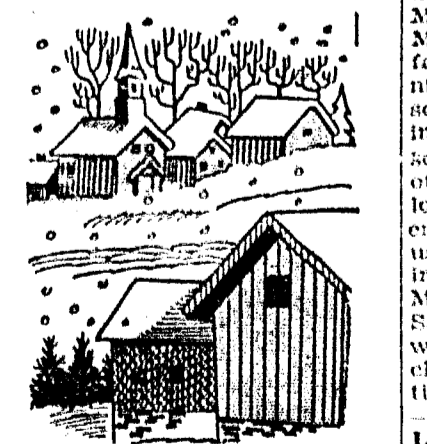

County Job Situation

Seven Latah county workers were given job-finding help during the week through the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment. Frank Hartstein, Moscow office manager said that this figure was the same as the number placed during the previous week but was somewhat higher than the 4 persons so helped during the same week a year ago. At the end of the week, 9 jobs remained open, one more than last week, but the same number as the vacant jobs listed during the pre-Christmas week of 1974.

Although 60 workers filed new claims for unemployment insurance benefits during the week, the total number of persons still seeking benefits declined by 31 from last week's 524 to the current figure of 493. This is indicative of the fact that many workers have returned to work in the

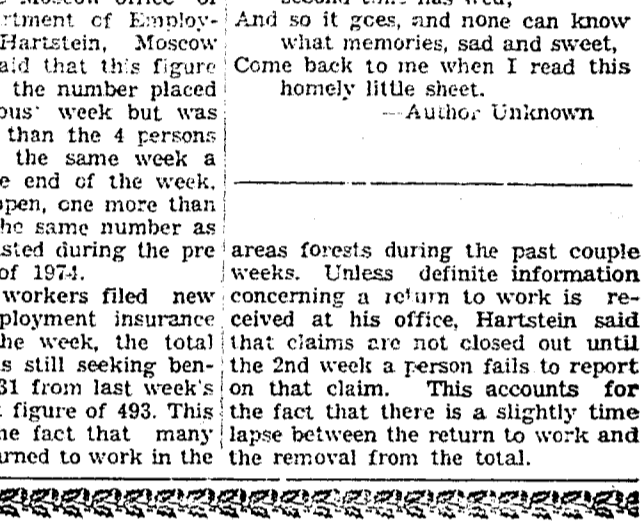
