A good tackle box is next on the list.

Pushing my hand in the dresser drawer for a pair of socks and pulling out a Mepps spinner lodged in my index finger is getting a little boring. Those rusty hooks that litter the bottom of the shaving kit bag are getting a bit old, too.

**MICROSCOPIC ORGANISM**

Chances are good that any dog or cat is carrying around a microscopic organism that can cause a nasty infection in the animal bites someone, reports the Idaho Medical Assoc.

The offender is known to physicians as Pasteurella Multicoda. It is often found in the mouths of healthy dogs and cats and is a common cause of infection following bites or scratches, according to a report in a recent issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association.

A research report based on a 10-year study at the Oregon State Public Health laboratory, Portland, notes that some 550,000 domestic animal bites and scratches are reported each year most of them dog bites.

Many of the bites transmit Pasteurella Multicoda. The infection responds well to penicillin and some other antibiotics but it is so common that it is often not diagnosed promptly according to the study.

The only prevention is to avoid

getting bitten.

The researchers advise physicians to consider that the bite might be infected until proved otherwise, and to institute proper antibiotic treatment.

**Job Placements  
At Standstill**

Closure of classes at the U/I at WSU and at area public schools caused an influx of individuals filing claims for unemployment insurance. This was coupled with the closure of two operations in the lower part of the county, causing some additional unemployment in the Kendrick-Juliaetta area. Some students filed claims and are seeking work during the semester break at Idaho. Others have completed work towards graduation and are coming on the labor market on a full-time basis. Workers who became eligible under the Special Unemployment Assistance Act a year or so ago have re-opened claims in an attempt to receive benefits during the period of unemployment until school opens again next year. A total of 80 persons filed either new or re-opened claims though during the week. The total number of jobless pay seekers rose from the 493 of a week ago to the current figure of 511. A year ago, prior to enactment of the Special Unemployment Assistance program, only 443 persons were seeking such benefits in Latah county.

Job placement activity was nearly at a standstill for the first part of the holiday week. Only one placement was verified as of Wednesday evening. The total number of jobs still open remained the same as for a week ago, and the same, nine, as were open at this time one year ago.
