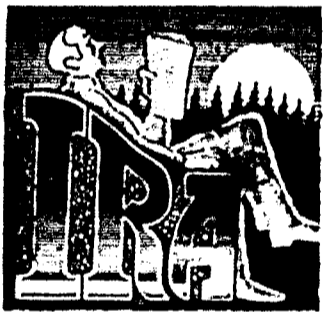

## Accidental Injury from Falls Common On Idaho Farms

This word of warning from Wayne Fisher, Safety Specialist, U/I Cooperative Extension Service. Early results from the 1975 Farm Safety Survey indicate that 1200 Idaho farm people were involved in falls with

medical expense reaching \$400,000. This would translate to one member out of every 25 farm families suffering from this type of accident. Medical costs on reports ranged from \$15 to \$4500 per happening. It is likely that injuries in 30 incidents were serious enough to cause permanent disability or death.

The survey shows that 40 percent of the injuries due to falls of farm people will occur in non-work related situations. The largest share of the non-work falls occur in the home and

involve persons from all age groups. Children playing outdoors or participating in activities around the farmstead account for 12 percent of the fall injuries. Another 3 percent occurred in organized games. Not included are the numerous injuries due to falls from horses or those involving motorcycles and snowmobiles, either at work or leisure.

The largest share of the farm work related fall injuries involve a machine, tractor or wagon. A particularly hazardous situation, which

seems to be pronounced on Idaho farms, relates to the handling of hay and hay bales. Over 18 percent of the falls reported on the survey involved hay handling. The injuries tended to be more serious and one fatality was reported due to a young person falling from a load of bales and being run over.

In other work related farm falls, 12 percent involved situations such as mishaps while chasing animals, walking or working in slippery areas and similar conditions where the in-

dividual was not in contact with an animal, machine or any other particular "thing" which could have contributed to the accident.

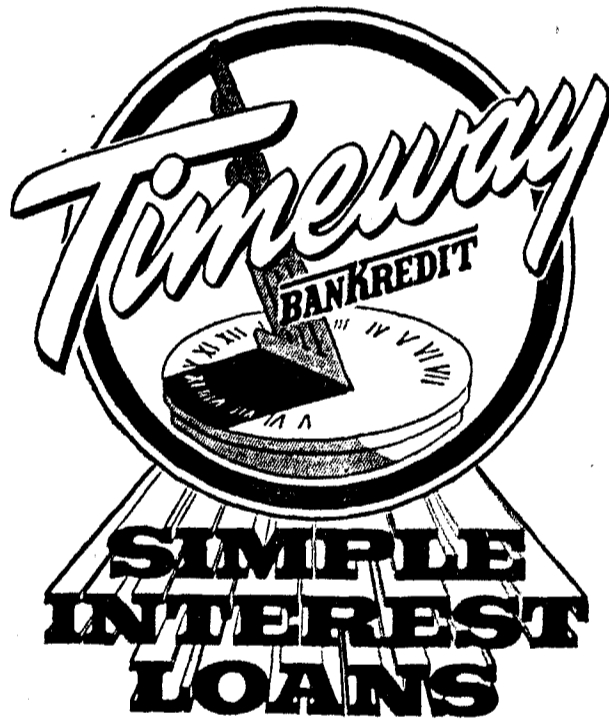
6 percent of the work related falls did involve contact with animals but were not directly caused by animal temperament. Two quite similar reports, for example, involved falls when the victims lost their grip while assisting with the delivery of a calf.

The Idaho Farm Safety Survey, according to Fisher, is producing

some very beneficial information which will be useful in reducing accidents among Idaho's farm families. Data to this depth or magnitude has not been gathered in Idaho previously. Results from the Idaho survey appear to differ somewhat from surveys taken in other states which in perhaps due to different agricultural situations. Data gathering for the survey is nearly complete and has, according to Fisher, shown evidence of a splendid effort and cooperation
