Future of Land Use Bills Doubtful, Says Sen. Judd

The three land use bills introduced in this session of the Idaho legislature may not make it out of committee, said Senator Claud Judd when he talked to the Gazette from Boise Tuesday morning. Land Use in general and these bills in particular have come under heavy fire from well-oriented protest groups and the hearing on these bills drew more protests than support. The committee is scheduled to take action next Wednesday on these bills.

"We're just at the cross-roads" said Judd when asked about bills affecting financing of funds for Idaho roads. There is currently a bill before the Legislature which would almost double the cost of licensing automobiles and light trucks. Last year the licensing of these vehicles brought in \$72 million which was divided by formula to the county highways districts, Law Enforcement and State Highway Dept. The increase, if the bill passes, would be added to this money. Under the proposed legislation, the minimum of \$7.50 for an older car would be increased to \$10.80 and the top limit would raise from \$18 to 27.

There is also a bill which would divert the sales tax from the General Fund to the Transportation Fund.



Job Situation In Latah County Improves Slightly

6 Latah Co. workers found employment through the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment during the past week. Frank Hartstein, Moscow office manager, said this compares with 7 persons placed on jobs the previous week, and 5 so helped during the last week in January a year ago. There are currently 6 job openings available in

the Moscow area, down from last week's 8, but up from the previous year's 4. All jobs remaining open call for some experienced training or specific skills.

The number of persons still seeking unemployment insurance declined during the week to 576 from the previous week's 598. A year ago there were 594 Latah Co. persons seeking jobless pay. In the immediate Moscow area there are currently 329 persons seeking benefits, there were 342 last week and 298 a year ago. In the

Troy-Deary-Bovill area 116 claims are being filed, down from last week's 125, and also below 1975's figure of 131. 86 checks are going into the Pottlatch area, up one from the previous week but showing quite a decline from last year's figure of 114. In the Genesee area the totals are 21 now, 20 last week and 25 a year ago. While in the Kendrick area the totals are 24, 26 and 26, reflecting relatively stable conditions in those 2 areas of Latah county.

The Jamboree will feature fiddling of old-time tunes from hoedowns to waltzes as well as variety acts and public dancing following the show.

NEW SEED HELPS SPUDMAN

Moscow, Idaho—Virus-free potato seed has proved its worth in Idaho, according to an economic summary prepared jointly by the University of Idaho, Washington State University

and Oregon State University. The new seed "shows evidence of improving yields in areas of cooler summer temperatures," the report said.

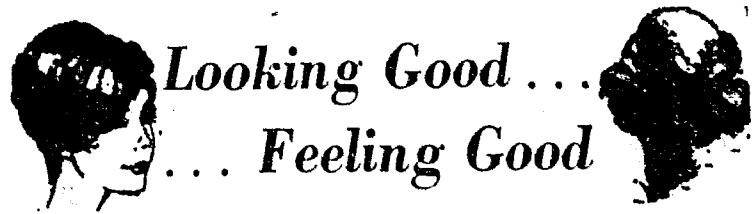

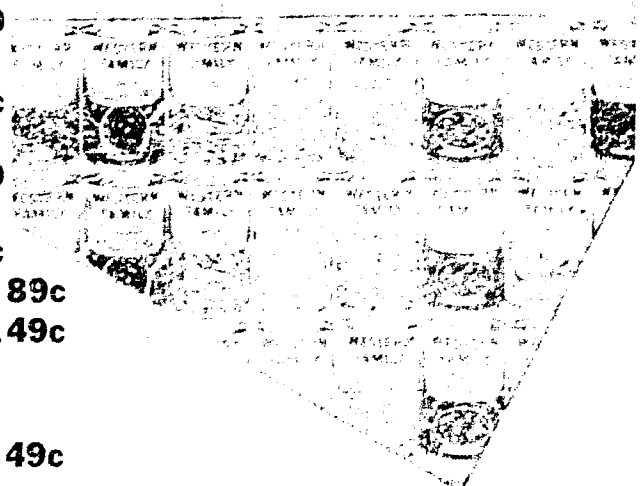
