At a special meeting, held January 23rd, the Board of Directors of Genesee Union Warehouse Co. accepted a bid from Morrell Construction of Lewiston to erect two (2) 205,900 bushel, bolted steel storage tanks and an 8,000 bushel per hour elevator leg with a truck hoist and pit. Construction should be completed for the

The cost of the new unit will be aproximately 79c per bushel (\$325,000 olus the cost of electrical panel and hook-up.)

Location of the new bins will be lirectly east of the cement tubes at the West End (office) facility.

A committee headed by Gordon Iverson was appointed by president Haxton to evaluate a satellite facili-ty. 




