

Angus W. Fry, 79, Passed Away March 12

Angus Wellington Fry was born May 10, 1896 in Bitter Root Valley, Montana, to Enoch and Mattie Fry, and passed away March 12, 1976 of infirmities of age at Lewiston Convalescent Center, where he had resided since October, 1975. He was 79.

He moved to the Kendrick area as a child with his parents. He married Bertha Thornton at Lewiston, Idaho, in 1917. They homesteaded in Bed Rock Canyon near Leland, where he was engaged in farming until they were divorced in 1943.



He moved to McCall, Idaho, in 1945 and was a woodworker and farmer in that area until 1955 when he moved to Southwick, Idaho. He was an avid hunter and fisherman. One of the things his early day neighbors and friends will remember of Angus is hearing him yodel for several miles away above the sound of his team and wagon.

Survivors include a daughter, Ineta Schneider of Cavendish; two sons, Ervin Fry of Southwick, and William "Ted" Fry of Colorado Springs, Colo.; three brothers, Ward Fry of Fruitvale, Wallace "Jim" Fry of Emmett and Alec Fry of Cocoa, Fla.; one sister, Ethel McKiddy of Albuquerque, N.M., 11 grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren. Two brothers preceded him in death.

Memorial services were held at 11 a.m. Tuesday, March 16 at Malcolm's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel, Lewiston, Idaho, with Rev. Jim Koons of the Wesleyan Church of Clarkston officiating. Mrs. Oscar Blund was organist and Ann Meske sang "Does Jesus Care" and "Going Down The Valley." Casket bearers were Roy Glenn, Richard Blewett, Paul Richardson, Aaron Wells, Bill White and Homer Parks. Burial was at the Leland Cemetery.

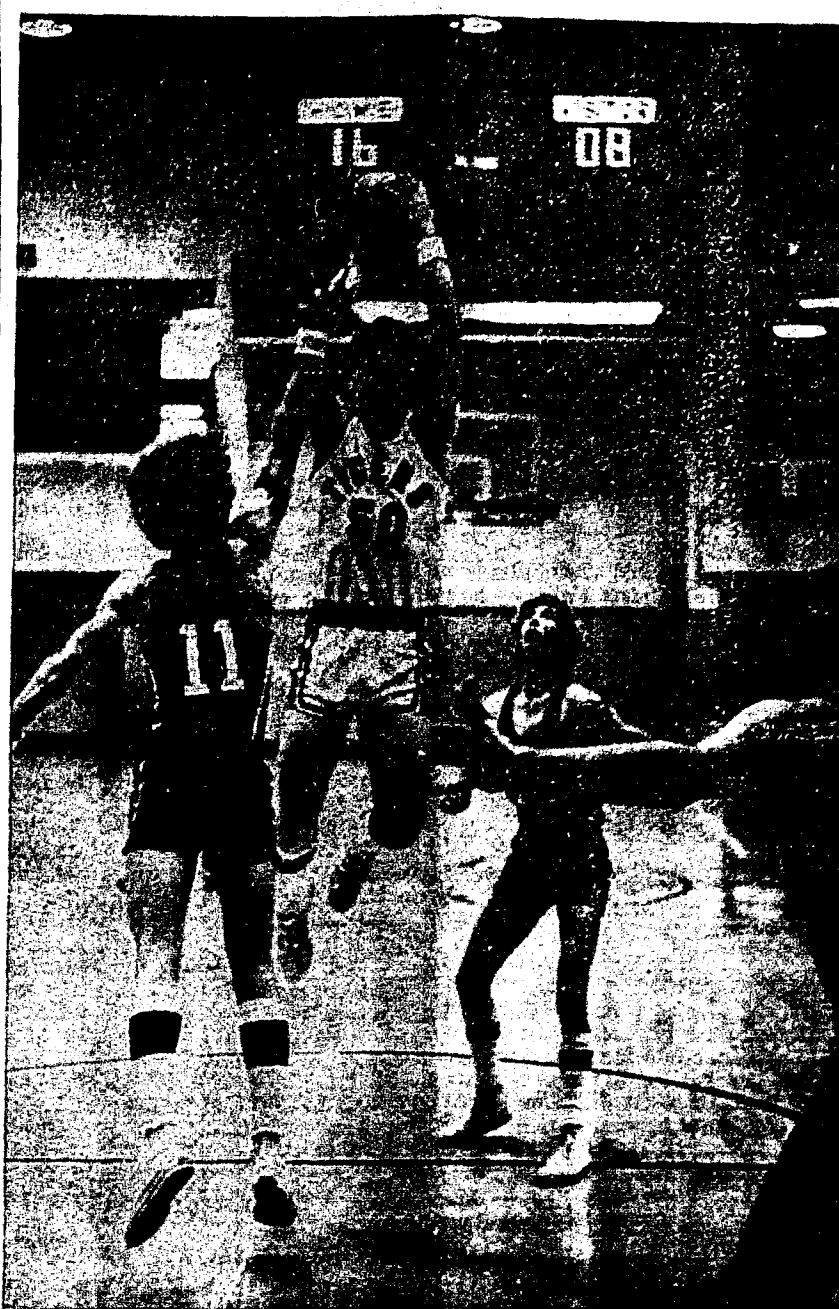

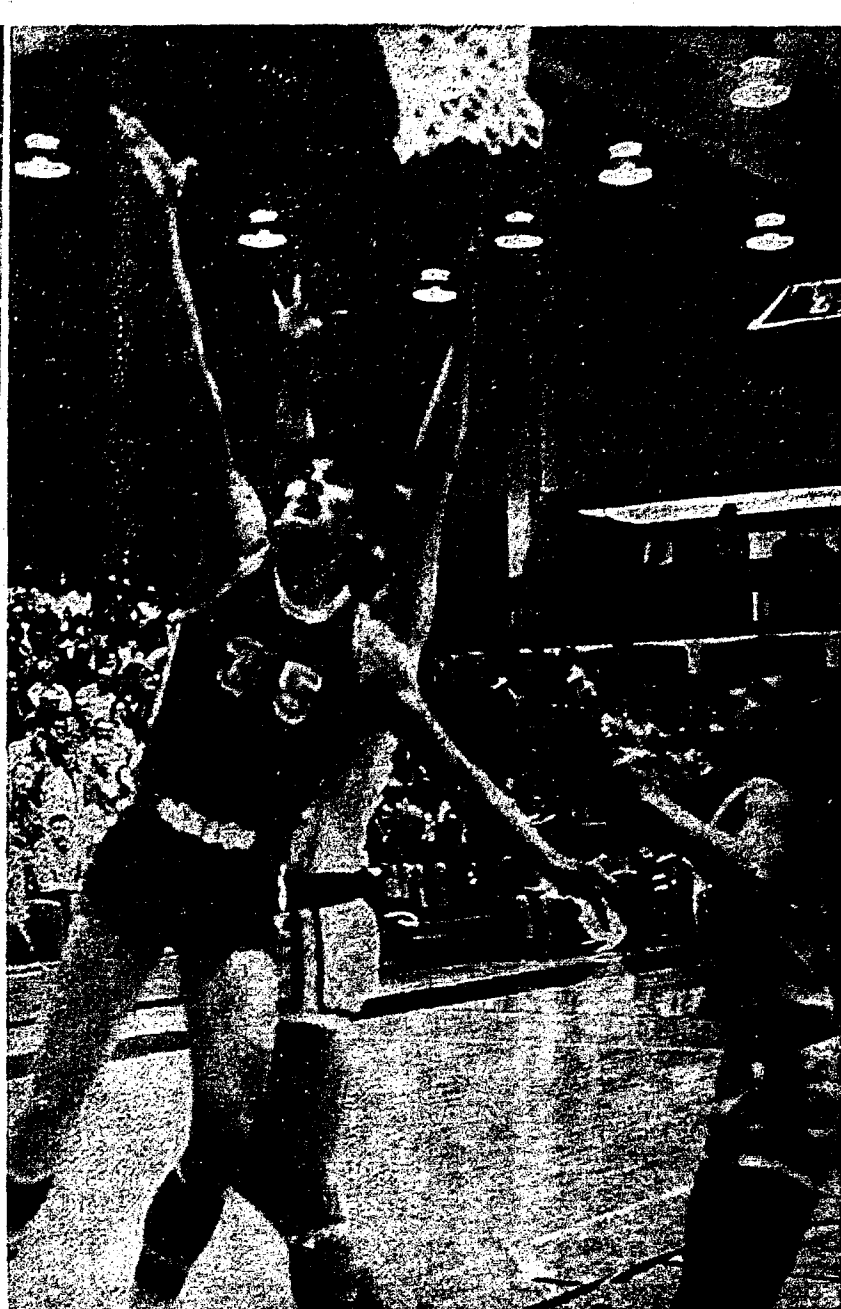

Genessee and Kendrick Clipped In State A-3 Hoop Tournament at Twin Falls

Basketball season is over for Kendrick and Genessee high schools and despite the sour note on which it ended for both teams, it was a successful one for the Tigers and Bulldogs as the teams were good enough to qualify for the state A-3 tournament at Twin Falls. But unfortunately this was not the year for smaller teams and Kendrick and Genessee fell victims to taller, stronger squads from the south.

Genessee won in the first round of play and went on to the semi-finals. Kendrick was bounced in two straight games.

Kendrick Topped Kendrick, the number 2 team of District 2 played in the afternoon session last Thursday at the College of Idaho gym at Twin Falls and were roughed up by the New Plymouth Pilgrims 61-43. The Pilgrims had it over the Tigers in height, strength and experience and wasted little time overpowering the Tigers. Leading 25-

16 at the half, New Plymouth came on in the third period with a 21 point outburst and then cruised home for the win.

Earl Lawrence was high man for the Tigers with 15 points and Mike Boe had 13.

Genessee Over Ririe Paced by the 17 points of Dan Stout, Genessee ripped the Ririe team 63-40 Thursday night as three Bulldogs were in the double figure scoring. Ririe was cold in the first quarter, scoring only four points while the Bulldogs rolled up 15. Both teams stepped up the pace in the second quarter with Genessee out scoring the southern team 20-17. This was the only team the Bulldogs were to meet who were anywhere near its own size in the tournament.

Stout had 17 points, Doug Green 16, Pat Aherin 13, Gary Bennett 7 and Alan Coulter 6.

Kendrick Bows Out Kendrick, fighting for its tournament life, made a contest out of it against Kimberly Friday afternoon, but suffered from a cold third period in which they could only manage 4 points and were knocked out of the tournament 57-47. Kendrick was down 31-24 at the half but fell behind 42-28 at the end of the third period. The Tigers came back to outscore Kimberly 19-15 in the final frame but it was too little and too late.

Boes 16 point were high for Kendrick with Doug Lohman adding 10 more.

Genessee Defeated Genessee was as cold Friday night against Glenns Ferry as they were hot Thursday night and the Bulldogs were sent into the consolation bracket with a 59-37 loss. Only in the second period, when the Bulldogs hit 16 points, were they in the ball game. Glenns Ferry scored 32 points in the final half of play while Genessee could get only 15.

Green and Coulter each hit 10 points for Genessee, Aherin had 7 and Stout 6.

Genessee Ousted Genessee, battered from two previous games fell prey to the taller, stronger New Plymouth Pilgrims Saturday night and were dropped 61-54. Genessee got off to a slow start, getting only 4 points in the first quarter. The Bulldogs came back to outscore the Pilgrims 12-9 in the second period. Genessee fought back to two points of the Pilgrims in the 4th quarter 47-45 but the New Plymouth team just outgained the Bulldogs under the boards and spurred ahead again.

Green had 14 points, Stout 12 and Aherin 11. Coulter had 2, Bennett 5 and Eagen 6.

Both schools were appreciative of the fine support they received during the tournament.

Dr. Dwight Ingle, a Kendrick native, and an Emeritus Professor of Pharmacological and Physiological Sciences at the University of Chicago, announced this week that his most recent book, "Is It Really So?"—A Guide to Clear Thinking—will soon be published by the Westminster Press and be on sale at the University of Idaho bookstore and at the "Book People" book store in Moscow.

Simply, but thoroughly, Dr. Ingle examines the basis of belief and reasoning the way the mind works; how science searches for knowledge and tests information; the assumptions upon which science is built; the complexities of causality; the psychological origins of false beliefs; research variables and requirements for "proof".

Water Protection Topic of CEDA Meet

Lewiston—The Clearwater Economic Development Association (CEDA) has been proposed to serve as an agency responsible for developing an areawide plan to protect and improve water quality.

Public meetings to discuss the proposal are scheduled in Orofino and Moscow on March 22 and 23, according to James Kimball, regional supervisor of the Environmental Division of Health and Welfare.

If selected, CEDA will be responsible for developing an areawide waste water management plan for Clearwater, Idaho, Latah, Lewis and Nez Perce counties. The State Environmental Division will be responsible for planning if CEDA is not selected.

Purpose of the proposed study is to provide an areawide plan for protection and improvement of water quality in the Clearwater drainage basin and part of the Panhandle basin, Kimball said.

Federal funds would pay for 75 percent of the cost of the two-year study with CEDA providing a 25 percent match. Final designation of a wastewater planning agency for the area will be made by Governor Cecil D. Andrus after considering comments from the public.

The meeting in Orofino will be held at the WWP auditorium beginning at 7 p. m. Monday, March 22. The Moscow meeting will be held in the Student Union Silver Room Tuesday, March 23, at 7 p. m.

Job Situation In County Stable

Job placement in the Moscow area remains stable according to a report from the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment. Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager said that his office found work for 9 Latah county job seekers during the week one fewer than during the previous week but two more than the same week a year ago. He said a total of 10 jobs were still open one more than at the end of the preceding week. Nearly all jobs that remain open call for specialized training skills or experiences.

Although 62 persons filed new or reopened claims for unemployment insurance benefits during the week, the total number of jobless pay seekers rose by only 13. The current total is now 611, up from the previous week's total of 598, but slightly below the figure for the same week in 1975. The additional unemployment over the previous week reflects more layoffs in the logging industry and show up in the Troy-Deary-Bovill and the Potlatch areas. Potlatch's total is now 101, up slightly from last week's 98, but just a few less than last year's 115. The 152 checks going in to the Troy-Deary-Bovill area is up from last week's 145, and down from last year's 176. Additional loggers are expected to be idled during the next week, as mild weather makes logging and transporting logs too costly to be feasible.

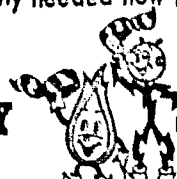

NOXIOUS WEEDS

Notice is hereby given this 8 day of March, 1976, pursuant to the Idaho Noxious Weed Law Section 22-2444, Idaho Code to every person who owns or controls land in Latah County, Idaho, that noxious weeds standing, being, or growing on such land shall be destroyed or eradicated by effective cutting, tillage, cropping, pasturing, or treating with chemicals or other effective methods, or combination thereof, approved by the County Weed Superintendent, as often as may be required to prevent the weed from blooming and maturing seeds, or spreading by root, root stalks or other means.

22-2162. Violations - Penalties. 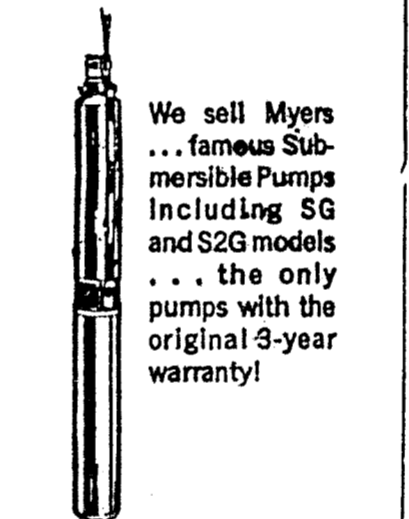

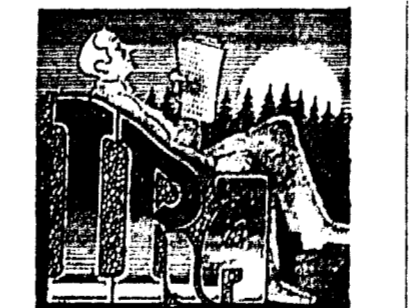

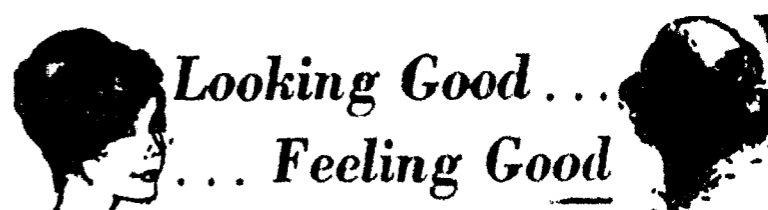
