

IDAHO DEPT. OF EMPLOYMENT

As a result of logging operations the number of persons seeking un-employment insurance in Latah Co. rose to the all-time high for the year. Frank J. Hartstein, office manager of the Idaho Department of Employ ment said that there were currently 661 persons seeking jobless pay. This is an increase of 50 from the previous weeks total, even though 46 persons discontinuing filing such claims. A total of 96 persons filed new claims indicating that they had become unemployed during the past two weeks. A year ago, the high for 1975 was 656 benefit claimants. Currently, there are 320 persons seeking checks THE LATAH COUNTY FIDDLERS in the Moscow area, compared with 322 a week ago, and 278 a year ago. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area the total now stands at 179, up from 152 last week, but fewer than the 197 of last year. The Potlatch area is represented by 125 persons filing claims up from last week's 101, but still below the 1975 total of 136. Hartstein indicated that additional workers would file claims next week as many of those who became unemployed this week earned too much money to be eligible for benefits during the current week. The totals for the Genesce area are 17 now, 18 ast week and 21 last year; and for the Kendrick area, 20, 18, and 24.

Six workers were given job finding help during the week and a total of 10 jobs were still open at the end of the week, Hartsteins report contin-He said that other workers had been referred to jobs, but that verification of their being hired had not yet been received. Among the job opportunities available are building inspectors, cafe and domestic workers and some technical jobs. A government agency is seeking secretarlial help for work out of the area, and has provided the Moscow Employ of each month at 1:30 p. m. men office with some information concerning these jobs.



NOXIOUS WEEDS

Notice is hereby given this 8 day of March, 1976, pursuant to the Idaho Noxious Weed Law Section 22-2444, Idaho Code to every person who owns or controls land in Latah County, Idaho, that noxious weeds standing, being, or growing on such land shall be destroyed or eradicated by effective cutting, tillage, cropping, pasturing, or treating with chemicals or other effective methods, or combination thereof, approved by the County Weed Superintendent, as often as may be required to prevent the weed from blooming and maturing seeds, or spreading by root, root stalks or other means.


