Kendrick School Board Met April 8

At the April 8th meeting of the Kendrick School Board, Superintendent Richard Morton presented a report on the school district's cost for sending the basketball team, cheerleaders and spectators' bus to the state basketball tournament at Twin Falls in March. The cost to the school was \$879.20, which comes from the athletic and student body funds, neither of which is tax revenue.

The board directed the superintendent to gather cost estimates for carpeting areas of the Juliaetta Elementary School.

The resignation of Darrell Manfull from the position of teacher-principal of the elementary school was accepted.

In further action, the date of May 18th was set for the election of a Board Trustee from Zone 5 (Leland area). Board chairman Luther Parks presently holds the position. Also on the ballot will be an override levy of 5 mills for the 1976-77 school year. Mr. Morton stated that although the levy millage request is the same as was collected for the present school year, the 76-77 levy would raise an additional \$1500. due to assessment increases. This increase will replace some funds lost to the district because of decline in enrollment.

The next regular Board meeting will be at 7:30 May 13th at the high school.

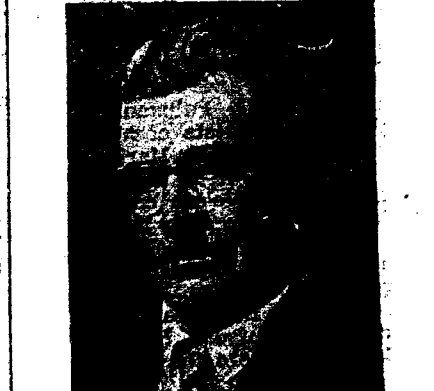

Cancer Claims Life Of E. L. (Bud) Fey

Everett Lyle "Bud" Fey, an employee of Gem State Lumber Co. and a resident of Kendrick for more than 40 years, died at 9:20 p.m. Friday at his home of cancer. He was 60.

Fey had worked as a mechanic and millwright for Gem State Lumber Co. for 10 years before he became too ill eight months ago.

He was born Feb. 27, 1916, at Ashton, S.D., the son of Charles and Susie Fey. He grew up and attended schools in South Dakota and then came to the Kendrick area in 1934 to work on a farm. His family followed him to Kendrick in 1939.



Fey served in the U.S. Army in England from 1941 to 1945. While he was in the Army, he married Constance M. Mattson on June 12, 1943, at Clarkston. He worked as a farm equipment mechanic for several years before working for the lumber firm.

Fey was a member of the Kendrick United Methodist Church, Kendrick Grange, Kendrick Masonic Lodge and the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Survivors include his widow and his father, both of Kendrick; two sons, William R. Fey of Juliaetta and Dan E. Fey of Kendrick; three brothers, Charles H. Fey, Ted Fey and Roy Fey, all of Kendrick, and six sisters, Sue Ann Nichols, Eva Roseman and Nell Heimgartner, all of Kendrick, Vivian Daniels and Lois Fraser, both of Lewiston, and Polly Augustine of Blundt, S.D.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Tuesday at Malcolm's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel at Lewiston with the Rev. Steve Caskey officiating. The Kendrick Masonic Lodge and VFW post conducted graveside ceremonies at the Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens. The family suggested any memorial contributions be made to the Kendrick-Juliaetta ambulance fund or the American Cancer Society.

SUDDEN DEATH AND YOU

It has been estimated one million persons in the U. S. experience acute heart attacks yearly. Over 650,000 die annually of heart disease. About one-half of these deaths occur outside the hospital, usually within two hours of onset of symptoms. Death from heart attack is the most important medical emergency today. It seems probable a large number of these deaths can be prevented by prompt treatment. In addition many victims of sudden death resulting from such accidental causes as drowning, electrocution, suffocation, poison, drug overdoses, insect bites or auto accidents could be saved by prompt and proper application of cardio pulmonary resuscitation, (C. P. R.) and emergency cardiac (heart) care (E. C. C.). E. C. C. includes the following elements:

1. Recognizing early warning signs of heart attack, preventing complications, reassuring victim and moving him or her to a life-support unit without delay.
 2. Providing basic life support at the scene when needed.
 3. Providing advanced life support as quickly as possible.
 4. Transplanting stabilized victim for continued cardiac care.
- The emphasis is on life support through stabilization of the victim at the scene of the life threatening emergency.
- Within the concepts of E. C. C. are Basic Life Support. The emergency First Aid procedure consisting of recognition of air way obstruction, respiratory arrest, cardiac (heart) arrest and the proper application of cardio pulmonary resuscitation (CPR). CPR consists of opening and maintaining a patent airway, providing artificial ventral action of lungs by rescue breathing. Artificial circulation blood by external heart compression to be administered by the general public.
- Advanced life support is basic life support plus use of mechanical devices, intravenous fluids, drug administration, defibrillation monitoring vital signs and life support until delivery to a continuing care facility (hospital). Advanced life support is administered by emergency medical technicians (E. M. T.), a requirement of all ambulance crews. Advanced life support is under the general supervision of a physician having direct and continuous communication on a 24-hour, 1 day basis.
- Everyone should know C. P. R. because 4 to 6 minutes after stoppage of breathing and circulation of blood irreversible brain damage occurs. The most efficient way of getting CPR to all people is through the school system, at the 8th grade level and repeated each year through high school. The course is 3 hours and according to standards of the American Heart Association.
- The foregoing is a national wide community program of emergency Medical Services (EMS) as recommended by the National Academy of Sciences, National Research Council and the American Heart Assn. co-sponsored standards for cardio pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and emergency cardiac care (ECC) 1973. Supported by medical associations and societies professional groups,

New Legislation Improves Retirement System

Amendments to Chapter 13, Title 59, Idaho Code, accomplished by passage of S 1312 at the Second Regular Session of the 43rd Legislature provide substantial improvements for members of the Public Employee Retirement System, according to T. F. Terrell, executive director.

A major change in benefit provisions permits the Retirement Board to annually authorize cost-of-living adjustments for retired members up to a maximum of 6 percent, subject to fluctuation of the Consumer Price Index. Previously the ceiling had been three percent.

The requirement that actuarial assets of the System must exceed actuarial liabilities, including the cost of any adjustment, before the Board can act remains intact except, under the new law, a one percent adjustment each year will be automatic.

"High rates of inflation, particularly the past three years, gave this revision the Retirement Board's highest priority for legislative attention," Terrell said. "The added flexibility takes a big step forward in protecting the purchasing power of retired members."

Another important change offers retirement benefits to a group of elderly public employees for the first time. "By this amendment," Terrell explained, "employees who were 65 years of age (60 for police, fire and military personnel) or totally and permanently disabled and left public employment before the system began operating or before their employer entered the system, can now apply and receive retirement allowance provided they meet all other eligibility requirements applicable to retired members." Inquiries concerning this revision can be directed to Retirement System offices at Coeur d'Alene, Boise or Pocatello.

Other improvements and changes in the retirement status will—

- eliminate mandatory retirement at age 70, leaving that decision with individual employees.
- extend the time period in which an active member may repay a separation benefit to reinstate previous service credits, subject to payment of interest after two years.
- change the time for payment of disability retirement allowance from 6 to 5 months following the date of disability.
- reduce the service requirement to qualify for an optional death benefit for a surviving spouse from ten to five years.

"Proper funding to maintain actuarial soundness will necessitate increasing the employer contribution from 7 per cent to 7.3 per cent of salaries effective July 1, 1977," Terrell stated. "Postponement until '77 will enable all public employers ample time to budget this additional cost," he added. Since 1965 employer cost has reduced from 9-1 per cent to 7 percent. The contemplated increase will be the first in twelve

Social Security Number Verification Requested

According to officials at the IRS Service Center in Ogden, Utah, the Internal Revenue Service and the Social Security Administration are making a joint nationwide effort to correct and update the Social Security Number files.

A computer-generated notice questionnaire will be sent to approximately 4,000 Idaho married taxpayers who file jointly and fail to supply their spouse's Social Security number, or when the spouse's Social Security number does not agree with the name on Internal Revenue Service records.

Taxpayers will avoid problems later when they apply for social security benefits by providing the requested information now.

years of Retirement System operations.

"The 1976 amendments to the retirement law are another milestone in the Retirement Board's efforts to keep the Retirement System in tune with the times and a valuable asset to public employers in recruiting and maintaining talented and career oriented persons in public employment," Terrell concluded.

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
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
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Job Placements In Latah County Increased Slightly

Reflecting an upward trend in the local economy, the Idaho Department of Employment at Moscow reported that the number of job seekers placed on jobs rose slightly from last week. The total number of Latah County workers given job finding help was 22 for the week, compared with 19 workers successfully referred to jobs during the week before. However, during the first week in April 1975, only 9 workers were placed. Frank Hartstein, Moscow office manager said that the increase appears to signal an upturn and expressed confidence that job opportunities are on the rise in the area. At the end of the week there were 12 jobs still open. Hartstein said, however that most of the jobs remaining vacant required workers with special skills, training or experience.

Gout Is a Painful Form of Arthritis

Gout is a form of arthritis which is most likely to show up in joints of the body, most commonly the big toe, according to the Idaho Medical Association.

It usually develops in middle age, and mostly in men. It is caused by a metabolic disorder which results in an abnormally high level of uric acid in the blood. Eventually the excessive uric acid crystallizes into solid substances (urates) which may be deposited in various parts of the body where they result in the inflammatory response known as gouty arthritis.

The affected joint is extremely painful and swollen and the surrounding skin may be sensitive to the touch. It is not uncommon for the patient to have a fever and a general feeling of illness. Untreated, an

Your physician can suggest a specific program for the relief of pain and for long term prophylaxis.

Preventing the recurrence of attacks is important. Repeated attacks may result in permanent joint damage and there could be damage to the kidneys and other vital organs. One who has gout, or one from a family with a history of gout, should follow a living pattern which includes keeping weight to a normal level; avoiding foods associated with gout, reducing strain, if possible and seeking medical help when an attack occurs.



The number of persons continuing to file claims for unemployment insurance declined slightly from the previous week, although the total was higher than a year ago. During the week 67 persons filed new or reopened claims for benefits, Hartstein's report continued. He said that most of those workers were from the area's forests, where poor road conditions and muddy working areas caused curtailments in activities. The total for the County now stands at 685, down from the 671 of a week ago but up from the 613 of last April. In the immediate Moscow area there are now 270 persons

filing claims for benefits, compared with 291 last week and 234 a year ago. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area little change was noted, as the current total is 225, a week ago there were 206 and a year ago 215. In the Potlatch area the number of jobless pay seekers remained fairly constant with the present total being 132, last week 139, and last year 130. At Genesee the totals were 20 now, 20 last week and 18 last year and in the Kendrick-Julietta area the totals were 18, 18 and 17. Hartstein said he expected little change over all during the next few weeks.



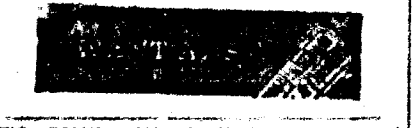
