New Steel Tanks at Genesee Union

Work is progressing "close to schedule" on the new steel tanks at Genesee Union's west end, according to Larry Trieber, foreman for Morrill's Construction Co. at Lewiston, Idaho.

The first tank is scheduled for completion July 15, 1976 and the second will be finished by August 15th (hopefully, in time for the bulk of harvest).

The new construction will add 411,800 bushels of storage, bringing the cooperative's overall storage capacity to just over 2 1/2 million bushels.

The concrete pad for the first tank poured last week, took 110 yards of concrete, the footings, 108 yards and the stem wall, 30 yards. The pad is 14" thick.

The steel for the tanks is scheduled to arrive toward the end of this month. Each tank will be 59 feet in diameter and will be 80 feet to the eave and 94 feet to the top of the cone.

The tanks will be serviced by an 8,000 bushel per hour Howell leg. The outside leg will rise 130 feet above ground level and will also be able to fill the existing cement tubes.

Ramey Hunt, Former Area Farmer Passes April 19

Ramey O. Hunt, 85, a long-time Kendrick area farmer and resident of Clarkston for the last 15 years, died Monday morning at his home at 2333 Valleyview Drive. He had been in ill health for the last two years.

Hunt farmed on Big Bear Ridge and Texas Ridge in the Kendrick area for more than 30 years. He moved to the Weiser area about 1947 and farmed there for several years before moving to Clarkston.

He was born Jan. 28, 1891, at Reeds Spring, Mo., the son of James and Nancy Ellen Hunt. He attended schools there and moved with his parents to the Kendrick area in 1910.

He started farming there, first with his father and later alone. He enlisted in the U.S. Army during World War I, and served about one year. The war ended before he was to be sent overseas. He was a member of Hells Canyon Barracks, Veterans of World War I. He never married.

Surviving are two sisters, Joyce Florence of Clarkston Heights and Gertrude Miles of Long Beach, Calif.

The funeral will be held at 11 a.m. Thursday at Merchant Funeral Home, Clarkston, with the Rev. Arthur Johnstone officiating. A graveside service will be at 2 p.m. Thursday at Wild Rose Cemetery on Big Bear Ridge, with the Kendrick Veterans of Foreign Wars in charge. Three Treated After Eating Poison Hemlock

Three persons connected with the School of Country Living were treated to counteract any toxic effects after they had mistakenly eaten some poison hemlock thinking it was Indian Celery.

The three involved were Jack Clark, Moscow, who is serving as a business consultant for Mrs. Emery; Lulaina Konekman, Carla's public relations representative from California and Mrs. Konekman's son, Jim. They, Carla and some others were looking at some land below Juliaetta when one of the party spotted the hemlock, told them it was Indian Celery and offered it to them. The three ate a stalk, all except the young boy who didn't like the taste and spat it out. Shortly afterwards Carla discovered what had happened and was immediately suspicious of the plant. She checked further and decided that it was, indeed, poison hemlock and rushed all three into Kendrick to the Red Cross Pharmacy where Dave Clayton administered an emetic to induce vomiting to cleanse their stomachs. They were then taken to St. Joseph's hospital in Lewiston where Clark and Mrs. Konekman's stomachs were pumped.

Clark, who talked to the Gazette Monday morning, said he was surely grateful that Carla recognized what had happened immediately after the three had consumed the poisonous plant and arranged for quick treatment. He said he had since checked into the matter and learned that Latah County has a good weed control program which is helping kill this plant but the incident had occurred in Nez Perce County. Hemlock might be found in roadside ditches and other most disturbed sites. It is now established as a weed over most of North America and often common in waste places in cities, especially west of the Cascade. This highly poisonous species is the "hemlock" of classical antiquity.

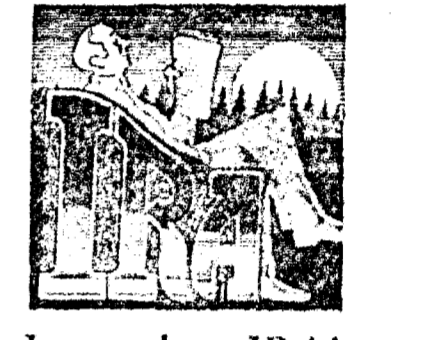

Farm Organizations Demand Immediate Release of Quad Cities Airport Study

A Palouse area farm organization has demanded immediate publication of the Quad Cities Regional Aviation Study. The Federation for Agricultural Resource Management (FARM), an organization representing Palouse farmers and other citizens, called for the action today.

Most of the airport study, which was compiled by Los Angeles airport consultant James Taylor is now in the hands of Stage II Advisory Committee. The Stage II Committee is a quasi-public body established to plan a regional airport in the northern Idaho-southeastern Washington area. The committee recently decided to delay publication of the consultant's final report for several months, claiming that it is a working document and that it contains errors and inconsistencies which need to be corrected.

FARM Chairman Bob Taufen, a Uniontown farmer, disputed the committee's claim, pointing out that the consultant has stated that he is

ready to publish the report. "When this expensive consultant was hired we were told that he possessed expertise unavailable in the northwest," Taufen said. "Now we are told that experts here must correct the consultant's report."

Taufen's remarks follow charges by Raymond G. Speer, Chairman of the Greater Lewiston Chamber of Commerce Aviation Committee, in which Speer said he was "somewhat alarmed" that publication would be delayed. Speer charged that Stage II members "apparently didn't go for the answers they got so they wanted to rework them so they would read 'more correctly'."

"They hired a supposedly competent professional consultant," Speer added. "So the results have to be edited by Mr. Hathaway and company." Cecil Hathaway of the UI is chairman of Stage II committee. According to Taufen, FARM shares Speer's concern. "Why won't the committee publish this study?" asked Taufen. "Why can't all our citizens see what their \$100,000 has bought?"

Taufen said his organization would continue to press the publication issue as long as there is a question about the merit of the Stage II Committee position. FARM, which represents citizens

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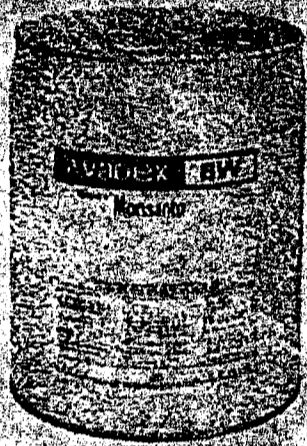

The Interstate System and the Primary System combined total 256,900 miles—7 percent of the total highway mileage in the United States—but carry 49 percent of all motor vehicle travel.

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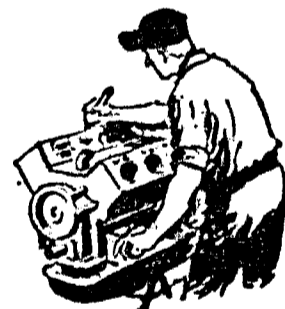
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Bridges to better times

It seldom occurs to people in this era of great, graceful spans, that the rivers of the West were real barriers to the pioneers.

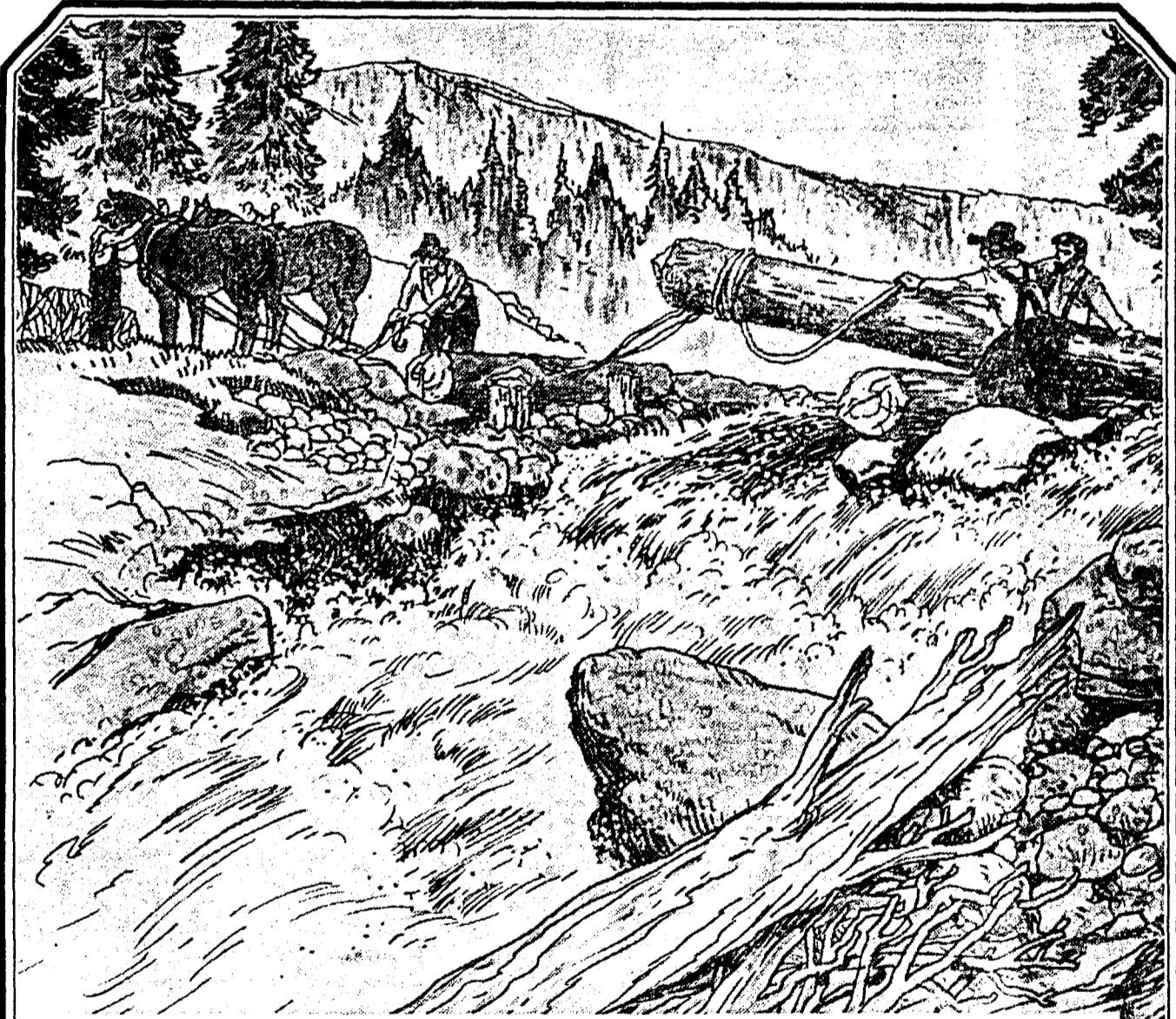
