Greg Fisher of the Soil Conservation Service of Moscow presented slides and spoke on his Five Point program for erosion and sediment control. The five points are: To eliminate summer fallow; 2. minimum tillage; 3. contour seeding; 4. Divided slopes; 5. critical area seeding.
 Mr. Fisher stated 105 tons per acre of top soil was being lost annually on some fields and they are striving to reduce this amount to 5 to 10 tons per acre. Top soil that is washed away is a great loss. His slides and talk were excellent very ably depicting the situation and suggested remedy. It was very interesting and informative.

The next meeting will be held on Tuesday, May 18th at 8 p. m. at the Grange Hall, beginning with a program of slides and explanation on Solid Waste Program in Latah county to which all interested public is invited. This will be presented by Dave Mitchell of Moscow in the absence of Dana Morse, solid waste coordinator of Latah county who will be unable to attend.
