



Construction Continues

April construction activity in Idaho generally maintained the high level recorded in March . This is the highlight of the Idaho Construction Report, a publication of First Security Bank, according to James Hoogland, Jr., and Orrin S. Merrill, managers. The report is edited by Dr. Kelly K. Matthews, vice president and economist, First Security Company, service and operating company of First Security Corporation.

Total construction value for author ized building permit construction in 7 major Idaho locations during April 1976 was \$29,640,427 or 13.4 percent below April 1975. New residential construction for 800 dwelling units to reject any entry for safety reasons. totaled \$20,013,930, no change in the number of dwelling units, but an increase of 13.4 percent in value compared with a year ago. Nonresidential construction was 2.3 percent above April 1975 while alterations and repairs wered own 62.1 per cent.

The report points out that during the January-April period, permits for new dwelling units in the 47 reporting locations totaled 2,580, an increase of 18.8 percent from last year. Total construction value over the same period rose 29.4 percent to \$114.6 million. Construction for residential purposes in Idaho and also nationwide has been the most active segment of the industry.

Throughout the first four months of 1976 according to the report, the impact of accelerated residential construction was apparent in all areas of the state. In terms of dwelling-unit volume, the cities and unin-corporated areas of Ada and Canyon counties accounted for 54 percent of the total. Other areas of rapid residential construction growth across the State include Lewiston, the unincorporated area of Kootenai county, Ketchum, Idaho Falls and the Pocatello-Chubbuck area.

The first railways reached the Northwest in the early eighties. Passengers were mostly of the brave and adventurous types. Their journals remarked at the buffalo herds, the Indians, the vastness of the prairies, the incredible mountains.

One man wrote of the Montana coal deposits that often lay right on the earth's surface. Smoke clouds marked the spontaneously ignited fires that seemed to burn perpetually and little noticed.

No steam locomotives trail their dark plumes today but the coal still lies beneath the prairies by the billions of tons. Scientists estimate that it could meet the nation's energy needs for 500 years to come.

An energy crisis is now upon us. Power plants fueled by surface-mined Western coal represent a practical, immediate solution. Such plants are planned and, although they include every environmental safeguard, their existence is being seriously threatened by anti-power plant forces. Public understanding of the urgency of the situation and support of plant construction without further delay is essential.

Many Farm Accidents Involve A Fall Says Report

More than one out of five farm machinery and tractor accidents involves a fall. This word from Wayne Fisher, Safety Specialist, U/I Cooperative Extension Service.

One of the most deadly of these

falls is the passenger falling from machine, wagon or outside the truck cab. All too often the victim is a youngster who is likely to be killed or be handicapped the rest of their Two accidents reported in the 1975 Farm Safety Survey dramatically portray what can happen. A youngster fell as he attempted to climb onto a moving hay wagon. The hay gave way and he fell beneath the wheels. A wheel passed over his head, crushing it. The other exam-ple is that of a young farmer who was riding on the side of a truck to gain time during harvest. The result was many days lost and very high medical costs. This individual will be permanently handicapped.

Fisher offers this advice. Do not allow anyone to ride unless there is a place provided. Tell them to "get off" rather than "hang on." This should include those who have a place provided if you, the operator feels they are not secure in the situation. The operator has a responsibility to keep people safe around the equipment he is operating.

Individuals who have been a part of a serious accident, where people have been killed or permanently injured are plagued with afterthoughts for the rest of their lives. Most people do not realize the gravity of their responsibility until it is too late. Those allowing riders and fortunate enough to avoid a tragedy should re-alize they have only been lucky. An unexepected factor could have changed one of their times with extra riders into a mishap. The Cooperative Extension Serv

ice, U/I, is hoping to reduce this risk taking by an educational effort. 25,000 "NO RIDER" stickers have been ordered from the National Safety Council. Hopefully, every farm and ranch in Idaho will have one sticker made available to them free of charge. Commercial channels have agreed to stock the stickers for further availability

Fisher states that habits developed over time are hard to change. The stickers can serve as a reminder of the seriousness of the hazard. Co-
