Class 6. Taught to the Tune of a Hickory Stick. Eligible for Award of Creativity.

Class 7. Cameos of Yesterday. A small design measuring up to 8" in its greatest overall dimension. Will be staged in an oval frame. Staging furnished by club.

Class 8. The Silence of the Forest. Eligible for the Tri-Color Award.

Class 9. Faith of Our Fathers. To be displayed on a green pedestal 11" square top, 42" high (furnished by Club). Design may extend below top of pedestal.

Class 10. Chicken Every Sunday. A segment table composed of one place setting to include dishes, glassware, linen and decorative unit. Accessories may be used.

Class 11. Grandma's Garden. Eligible for the Tri-Color Award.

Division III will be divided into Section I (under age 12); Section II (ages 12 to 17).

Section I HORTICULTURE. All Juniors may enter Horticulture Sections under Division I marked with an asterisk (*). They will be judged as Juniors.

Wallace Fleming, 61, Former Kendrick Businessman, Passes In Canada

Wallace L. Fleming, 61, a former Kendrick implement dealer, died at a Prince George, B. C. hospital about 2 a. m. Thursday. He died of a stroke about a week after suffering a broken hip.

Fleming, who lived at South Bank, B. C., was owner of the Fleming Truck and Equipment Co. at Kendrick from 1957 to 1969. He then sold the firm to its present owner, Wayne Harris. He lived at Julietta during the time he operated the business. Before that he lived in the Spokane and Coeur d'Alene areas.

He was born at Rockford, Wash., the son of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Fleming.

He was captured by the Japanese and held a prisoner of war while working as a civilian engineer during World War II.

He is survived by a daughter, Farris Phillips of Redland, California.

Construction Continues To Hold Steady Say Bank

April construction activity in Idaho generally maintained the high level recorded in March. This is the highlight of the Idaho Construction Report, a publication of First Security Bank, according to James Hoogland, Jr., and Orrin S. Merrill, managers. The report is edited by Dr. Kelly K. Matthews, vice president and economist, First Security Company, service and operating company of First Security Corporation.

Total construction value for authorized building permit construction in 7 major Idaho locations during April 1976 was \$29,640,427 or 13.4 percent below April 1975. New residential construction for 800 dwelling units totaled \$20,013,930, no change in the number of dwelling units, but an increase of 13.4 percent in value compared with a year ago. Nonresidential construction was 2.3 percent above April 1975 while alterations and repairs were down 62.1 percent.

The report points out that during the January-April period, permits for new dwelling units in the 47 reporting locations totaled 2,580, an increase of 18.8 percent from last year. Total construction value over the same period rose 29.4 percent to \$114.6 million. Construction for residential purposes in Idaho and also nationwide has been the most active segment of the industry.

Throughout the first four months of 1976 according to the report, the impact of accelerated residential construction was apparent in all areas of the state. In terms of dwelling-unit volume, the cities and unincorporated areas of Ada and Canyon counties accounted for 54 percent of the total. Other areas of rapid residential construction growth across the State include Lewiston, the unincorporated area of Kootenai county, Ketchum, Idaho Falls and the Pocatello-Chubbuck area.

Twelve Persons Given Job Finding Help In County

12 persons were given job finding help during the week with 26 jobs remaining open at the end of the week, according to Frank Hartstein, Moscow office manager for the Idaho Department of Employment. Among the job opportunities available are dayworkers, secretaries, cashier, car splitter, auto body repairman, service station attendant and a salesperson.

The total number of persons seeking unemployment insurance benefits is now 579, as compared to 584 last week, and 514 last year. 45 persons filed new claims during the week, compared to 40 last week. In Moscow area the total now stands at 238 in comparison with 223 last week and 182 a year ago. Genesee remains stable with 15 persons filing now and 14 last week. The Troy-Deary-Bovill area showed some decline with only 206 now actively filing which compares with 221 last week and only 186 a year ago. Kendrick and Polatch both remain relatively the same. It is anticipated that with the continued fair weather more workers will return to work and other outdoor types of work will develop.

Many Farm Accidents Involve A Fall Says Report

More than one out of five farm machinery and tractor accidents involves a fall. This word from Wayne Fisher, Safety Specialist, U/I Cooperative Extension Service.

One of the most deadly of these falls is the passenger falling from his riding place on the tractor, farm machine, wagon or outside the truck cab. All too often the victim is a youngster who is likely to be killed or be handicapped the rest of their life.

Two accidents reported in the 1975 Farm Safety Survey dramatically portray what can happen. A youngster fell as he attempted to climb onto a moving hay wagon. The hay gave way and he fell beneath the wheels. A wheel passed over his head, crushing it. The other example is that of a young farmer who was riding on the side of a truck to gain time during harvest. The result was many days lost and very high medical costs. This individual will be permanently handicapped.

Fisher offers this advice. Do not allow anyone to ride unless there is a place provided. Tell them to "get off" rather than "hang on." This should include those who have a place provided if you, the operator feels they are not secure in the situation. The operator has a responsibility to keep people safe around the equipment he is operating.

Individuals who have been a part of a serious accident, where people have been killed or permanently injured are plagued with afterthoughts for the rest of their lives. Most people do not realize the gravity of their responsibility until it is too late. Those allowing riders and fortunate enough to avoid a tragedy should realize they have only been lucky. An unexpected factor could have changed one of their times with extra riders into a mishap.

The Cooperative Extension Service, U.I. is hoping to reduce this risk taking by an educational effort. 25,000 "NO RIDER" stickers have been ordered from the National Safety Council. Hopefully, every farm and ranch in Idaho will have one sticker made available to them free of charge. Commercial channels have agreed to stock the stickers for further availability.

Fisher states that habits developed over time are hard to change. The stickers can serve as a reminder of the seriousness of the hazard. Co-

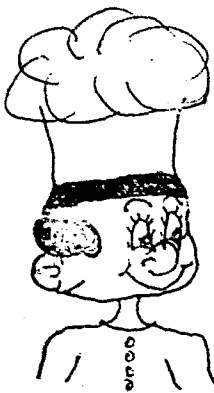
