

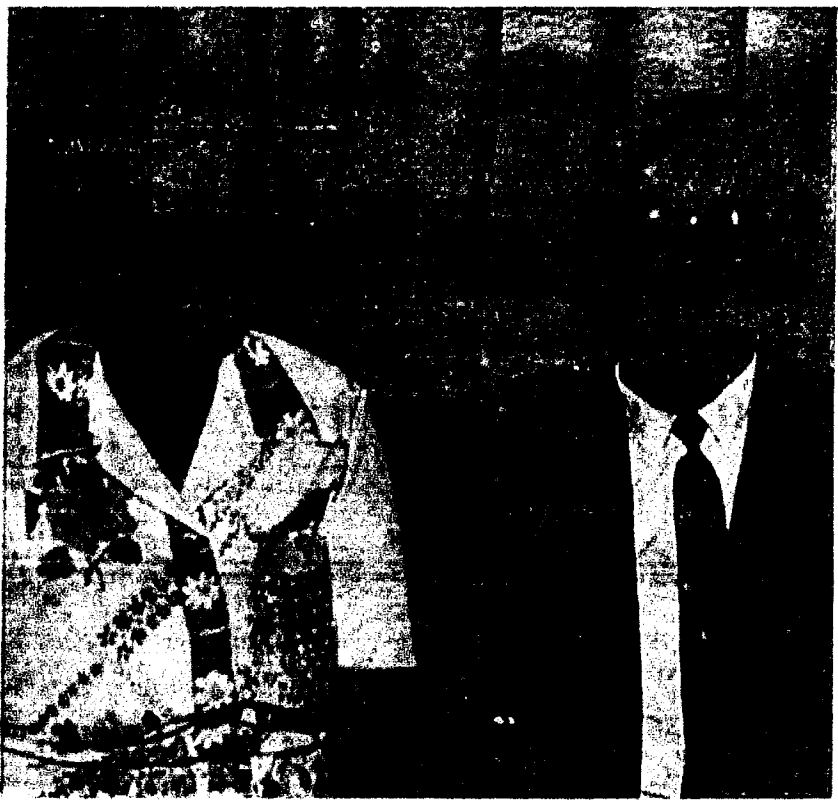
Golden Weddings To Be Observed June 6—

School Budget Hearing Set For Thursday, June 10

The regular May meeting of the school board of District 283, was held May 13 with all members present.

The board set the date of the budget hearing for the 1976-77 school year. The meeting will be on June 10 from 8:00 p. m. to 11:00 p. m.

Three members of the Steering Committee to the Elem. Schools Needs Assessment, Mariene Meyer, David Jones and Gary Browning, presented their recommendations to the board.

Resignations were accepted from Robert Heppner, Shirley Heppner and Steve Nordeen.

The school calendar for 1976-77 was adopted. School will begin Aug. 30, 1976 and be dismissed May 27, 1977.

The Board of Trustees held a special meeting Tuesday, May 18, to canvass the ballots of the school election.

In the election of trustee for Zone 5, Luther Parks received 17 votes, thus retaining his position on the board.

Results of the 5-Mill tax levy for maintenance and operation were 88 in favor and 14 opposed. The Kendrick precinct vote for 55 for; 9 opposed. Juliaetta precinct—33 for and 5 opposed.

The board voted to require preparation and distribution of a student handbook for the coming year; to outline policy on absenteeism and other policies and information.

The board voted to require new teachers to be at school 4 days before school begins and one day after school is dismissed and to require returning teachers to be in attendance 3 days before the start of classes and one day following dismissal.

Contracts were to be offered to teachers for the 1976-77 school year and were to be returned within 10 days after teachers received them.

Mr. Morton reviewed the proposed budget with the board.

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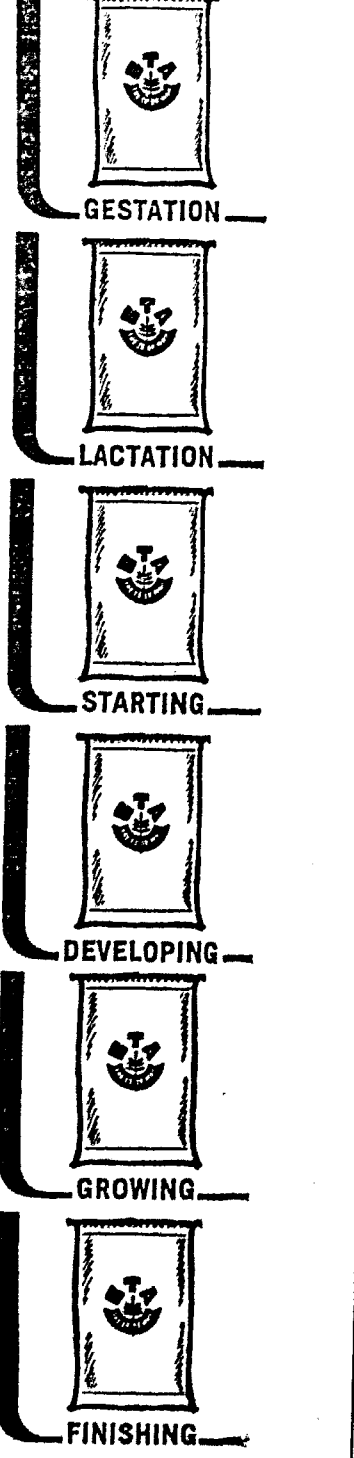

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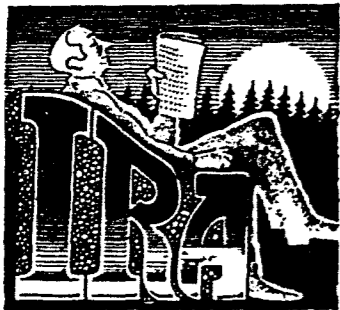

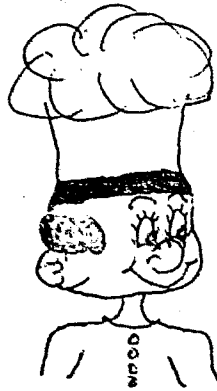
