Gallbladder Problems After Age 40 Rather Common

Galibladder problems are rather common among persons over the age of 40, and occur much more frequently among women than men particularly women who are over-weight and have children, notes the Idaho Medical Association.

The gallbladder, an organ of the digestive system, is a psuch located in the upper right part of the abdominal cavity, underneath the right rib cage. It serves as a storehouse for bile which, when released, assists in the digestive process, particularly for fatty foods.

It may ful to function normally because of infection of the presence of a tumor, but the most common cause of gallbladder disease is the presence of lumps of solid material, commonly called gallstones. They may be lodged in the gallbladder or in the they tube clouding into or away from it, and their presence may obstruct the flow of bile. Exactly what cances them to form is not completely known.

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

Trapping Bear-

The Department of Fish and Game is trapping black bear and moving them out of the Clearwater River drainage, In an experiment to find out if elk

calves survive at a better rate in areas where several bear have been removed the department will haul the bear to other national forests, In a coordinated effort with the U.

S. Forest Service, the department will trap the bears, then haul them in trucks to other parts of the Clearwater National Forest as well as the Panhandle, NezPerce, Payette, Sal-mon, Boise and Challis national for-

Each forest will receive from 5 to 8 bear as determined by Forest Service personnel, the department said.

Trout Limit—

The fishing season just opened is the first test of a new limit system designed to protect larger, wild trout

The trout limit in most areas still is 10 fish, but no more than two of those fish can be over 18 inches long Anglers are allowed up to 5 fish over 12 inches long, but the 12— to 18—inch fish would be limited to 3 if 2 over 18-inches are in the creel. Should the angler's catch stay below the 12-inch limit, he could keep 10 trout. He could also keep 10 trout if 5 of the fish were between 12 and 18 inches and 5 were under 12

There are other combinations of length, but "the bag and possession limit for trout, char and grayling is 10 fish of which not more than five may exceed 12 inches and not more than two of those five may exceed 18 inches."

Anglers are reminded to check regulations closely, since some waters in the state have 5-fish or fewer limits on trout.




