





Machinery Accidents Have High Severity Rating

Medical costs of machinery operational accidents average \$650. This is considerably higher than \$340, the average of all agricultural accidents. Permanent handicaps are likely in one out of four machine accidents ed are power tool, tractor, falls on muchines and injuries during repair. Idaho agricultural machine operation accidents cost \$170,000. These are results from the 1975 Idaho Farm Safety Survey. Wayne Fisher, safety specialist, U/I Cooperative Exten sion Service suggests those working with machines remember a mistake can mean a serious injury. Being castious will avoid medical expense and permanent loss of capability and

in the long run save time.

Fisher offers a special note of caution in regard to children. The survey shows many children are injured white playing in agricultural sur-roundings. Children become curious about moving chains, open gears, belts, and augers. Before anyone is aware of danger, the child is injured. Other hazards include falls from hay stacks or wagons, and animal related accidents. Many children are injured by a variety of cuts and punc-tures. The machine injury, however, is more likely to leave the child permanently maimed.

Having a proper shield, and keeping it in place, could have prevented 43 percent of the machine injuries. The remainder occurred in locations not normally shielded due to the function of the component. Fisher in the air, while a subordinate wolf will carry its tail low or even between its legs.

Fisher points out that the employer can benefit by training his employees in safe meth-Accidents to workers mean down time while seeking medical attention. Secondly, training and warning the worker will help the employ er comply with OSHA regulations. Thirdly, and perhaps most import-ant, proof of safety training and warning can be of benefit to the employer if a worker initiates legal action due to an accident.
