





The committee will advise health professionals on various aspects of the proposed immunization campaign.

The immunization program will be undertaken in two major phases due to the fact that two kinds of vaccine will be available. In the initial phase, planned to begin in late July or early August, only those persons who have unusually high risk of serious consequences of influenza will be offered the vaccine. This will be a bivalent (bi-valent) variety, which means that the vaccine will be effective arginal variety influences. tive against swine influenza and the Type A Victoria influenza which was

After the high risk individuals have received protection, the healthy public will be offered a monovalent (mono-valent) vaccine, which offers protection only against swine influenze (also known as Type A New Jersey influenza).

Dr. John A. Mather, state epidemilogist, explained further that the bivalent vaccine will be offered thru private physicians' offices, district health departments and extended care facilities (nursing homes), to all high risk people. What will the increased number of bucks-only seasons do for Idaho's mule deer herds?

Bucks-only hunting by definition will mean a greater harvest of males from herds, and Theissen said buckfered the swine influenza vaccine af- doe ratios must be carefully moni-

> "A post season buck-doe ratio should not be allowed to go below 15-20 bucks per 100 does in those units managed for high-yield and 25 bucks per 100 does in those units managed for trophy or quality hunting," Theissen said.

Should ratios drop below these levels. Theissen predicted "difficult management problems in the future. Theissen said the deer seasons are designed to cut the total harvest from the 1975 level of about 40,000 to 35,000.

"The percent of males in the harvest should increase from last years 60 percent to around 75 percent and the total number of does should drop from about 16,000 in 1975 to about 9,000 in 1976," Theissen said.
Theissen said that on a statewide

basis, mule deer numbers are down about 25 percent from the 1970 level. He said some herds had responded



Construction Activity **Exceeds Preceding Month** 

Idaho building permit construction activity in May exceeded the preced-ing month and significant improvement was recorded relative to the

corresponding month a year ago.
This was the highlight of the Idaho Construction Report, a publication of First Security Bank, according to James Hoogland Jr. The report is edited by Dr. Kelly K. Matthews, vice president and economist of First Security Company, service and operat-ing company of First Security Corporation.

Total construction value for authorized building permit construction in 47 major Idaho locations during May 1976 was \$33,036,438 or 27.6 percent above May 1975.

New residential construction for 807 dwelling units totaled \$20,633,439, an increase of 3.5 per cent in the number of dwelling units, and an increase of 14.3 per cent in value compared with a year ago.

Nonresidential construction, influenced by large projects in the Pocatello area, was 146 per cent above May 1975; alterations and repairs were down 5.9 per cent. The recent flood in the upper Snake River Valley is expected to heavily

influence construction in the inspected area for the next few months.
