DROWNING DEATHS NOT NEW PROBLEM IN IDAHO

The rash of drownings reported recently are not new occurrence in Idaho. Historically the drowning's rate has been high. Nationwide, 1970-74 yearly drownings averaged 2.9 persons per one-hundred thousand population. Idaho lost 7.5 persons yearly per one-hundred thousand during the same period. Drownings were lower than average for Idaho in 1975 with 50 persons losing their lives.

The Idaho yearly average for the 1970-74 period is 57 drownings. The low of the 5-year period was 48 drownings in 1973 and the high was 73 in 1971. Motor vehicle related drownings are not included in these numbers as supplied by the Bureau of Vital Statistics, Department of Health and Welfare.

The most frequent place of drowning is the river. About equal numbers lose their lives in lakes as in the classification called canal, creek and ditch. Swimming pools drownings have been quite low in Idaho with the largest share of these drownings occurring in private pools. Public pools have had a commendable record in the past several years only to be marred by a recent tragedy.

Toddler drownings are, as expected high in Idaho and for the most part can be linked to the vast network of irrigation canals. Contrary to popular opinion, however, the largest share of drownings happen to individuals old enough to be able to recognize and avoid water sport situation they cannot cope with. Over seventy per cent of the drownings occurring are people over 10 years of age.

Persons over 20 years of age are usually victims of river and lake mishaps. Occasionally a youngster perishes as one of these groups. Breaking the adults into narrower classi-

fication, 22-44 years, finds the number of victims to be excessive when compared to National Safety Council figures. The per capita rate is double the nationwide. Age 45 and upward finds fewer drownings in Idaho than on the national basis.

The next ranked trouble area is the youngster 10-14 years of age. Drownings are high in the 15-24 year age group both nationwide and in Idaho.

The age group 5-9 years is low in drownings, both in Idaho and nationwide.

Wayne Fisher, Extension Safety Specialist, U/I Cooperative Extension Service, comments on these statistics. Safety awareness is vital to Idaho's continued enjoyment of water sports. Safety measures can add to the pleasure of those participating. Common sense dictates most water safety measures. Those of the parents age group, 25-44 years, need to be concerned about themselves, their toddlers and their young swimmers.

Nine out of ten forest fires can be prevented. Care and caution are essential tools in the forest, if they are used by everyone perhaps we wouldn't always need to be prepared with shovels, axes and buckets.
