Vicki Witt New Owner of Beauty Nook In Kendrick—



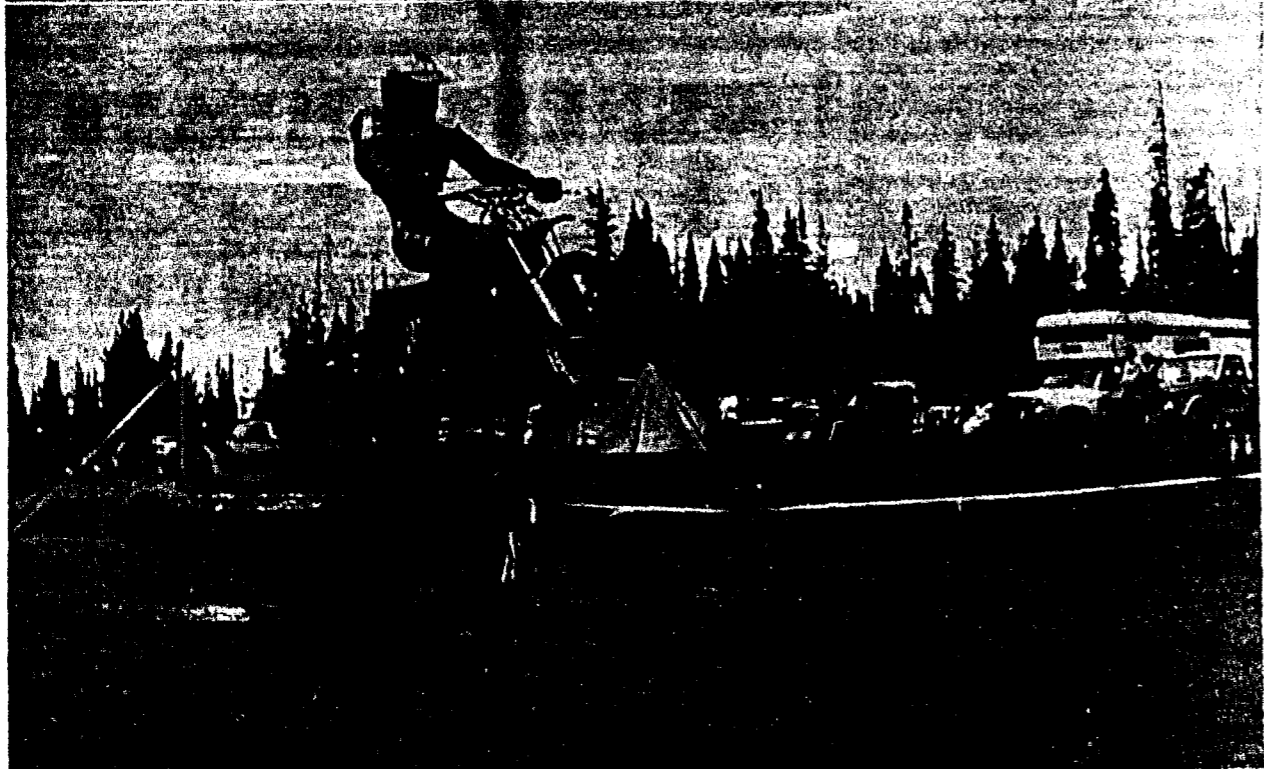

Laetrile

Laetrile, an unapproved drug derived from apricot kernels and promoted as a cure for cancer, has been condemned by the Idaho Medical Association.

Laetrile is the trade name for amygdalin, a substance which has been known for some 50 years, and which has been sold for the past 25 years.

It may not be shipped in the United States because it is not approved by the Food and Drug Administration which requires evidence of the safety and effectiveness of drugs before they can be placed on the market.

It has been tested and found wanting by the National Cancer Institute and prestigious research centers such as the Sloan-Kettering Institute for Cancer Research. Animal testing and clinical data have failed to show that it is effective in the treatment of cancer.

The contention that Laetrile is a vitamin-B-17 has been proven false and both in human beings and in research of animals, the resolution says, further stating that Laetrile has been fraudulently administered to patients as cancer therapy when no diagnosis of cancer has been documented.

The use of Laetrile may prevent a cancer patient from receiving the benefit of proven cancer therapy at a time when such treatment could still be effective.

License Sales

Although total 1976 license sales are 15 per cent above the first six months of 1975, license revenue is short of the \$8 million budgeted for this fiscal year.

Total licenses sold over the past six months was 202,726, and 175,127 were sold during the first 6 months of last year.

The drop in revenue can be traced to a lay in three license categories. Traditional "money-maker" licenses are classes 21, 51, and 52, nonresident hunting licenses, deer and elk tags.

The year 1975 was one of the worst for license sales and although comparisons show an increase, the rise does not indicate an easing of financial pressure on the department.

In its six-month summary for '76 the department said resident licenses sold are 23,600 over the first 6 months of last year, an increase of 16 percent.

The year-to-date totals for all non resident licenses are 17 percent above last year, but in the nonresident hunting license class, the totals were 12 percent below the year-to-date figures for 1975.
