The Jaycees hope to place self-adhesive, brightly colored fire warning stickers on the bedroom windows or place where an invalid or children may be found in the event of fire. It is felt that this would help firemen quickly determine where rescue efforts should be concentrated in the event of emergency. An "I" on the sticker would indicate invalid; a "C" would indicate a child.

The stickers would be free of charge and the Jaycees will work with local fire departments and local city governments in distributing and placing the stickers.

Hazeline said he and his members are still making final plans to determine the best way to get the stickers out to the public.

Scabies Incident At Hotel Controlled

An incident of Scabies which appeared last week at the Kendrick Hotel was quickly brought under control. It was reported this week by Carla Emery who operates the business as part of her School of Country Living. Carla told the Gazette Tuesday morning that a young man from Florida apparently brought the contagious skin infection with him. He left after a few days but not before he had transmitted the parasites to several others in one of the dormitory style rooms and also to some who were handling the sheets and bedding. Two of these infected sought medical treatment from Dr. Boaz, who is also the county health doctor. Dr. Boaz treated the two and then notified the Nez Perce County Health officials who came out to discuss the incident with a representative of the School.

Carla said that in all, five people had been treated for Scabies and they are now either cured or responding well to medication. All the blankets and bedding which might have been used has been cleaned and disinfected and the Health authorities were satisfied that all necessary precautions had been taken.

Julius Ristau worked for the Northern Pacific Railway as a section hand and before the family left Kendrick Ed also was employed by the railroad. In 1915 the family moved back to Minnesota and never returned until last week.

Ristau remembered the flood in Kendrick and also the big fire in 1904 which wiped out all of the business district. He also remembers when one of the first automobiles in town tried to make it up Sperry Grade but didn't have enough power and had to back down.

Larry Vestal delivered the first Kamak barley from his farm on the Rimrock area of Genesee last Wednesday, reported Mike Martinez, assistant manager of Genesee Union Warehouse Co. That same day Zener Ranch's delivered the first small sieve Alaska peas to Genesee Union.

The peas' quality looked good, Martinez said. "Actually better than we had expected." Since that time other Rimrock area farmers have started cutting, Martinez said. These include Odberg,

Baldus, Gilje and Weber.

Thor Gilje cut and delivered the first of the year's peas to Asgrow Seed Co. in Genesee last Friday, reported Asgrow manager Leonard Singhose. These were small sieve Alaska peas into its Kendrick warehouse. The Wegner Bros. from Cameran are cutting peas and others are cutting on the lower Polkath. Geo. Brocke, Jr., said that as of Tuesday afternoon there were six growers cutting and delivering to Brocke and Sons. The first rape seed of the season also came in Monday from the Troy area.

Spring Wheat In

Surprisingly early, the Lewiston Grain Growers Juliaetta warehouse took the first load of spring wheat in Monday and has also received peas from the Heath and Knapik farms in the Howard Gulch area. Three growers were cutting and hauling

into LLG this week and more are expected to be starting this week.

Kendrick Rochdale reported that they haven't received any of the current harvest as of Tuesday afternoon but were expecting to do so within the next day or so.

Idaho Building Construction Declined In June Says Bank Newsletter

Idaho building permit construction activity declined in June to a level below the previous month and also below the level in June a year ago.

This was the highlight of the Idaho Construction Report, a publication of First Security Bank, according to James Hoogland, Jr., manager. The report is edited by Dr. Kelly K. Matthews, vice president and economist of First Security Company, service and operating company of First Security Corporation.

Total construction value for authorized building permit construction in 47 major Idaho locations during June, 1976 was \$29,687,280 or 17.1 per cent below June, 1975.

New residential construction for 720 dwelling units totaled \$17,076,304, a decrease of 6.4 per cent in the number of dwelling units and a decrease of 4.9 per cent in value compared with a year ago.

Non-residential construction, valued at \$6,287,354 was down 34.1 per cent, while alterations and repairs totaling \$8,323,622 were 23.5 cent below a year ago.

The Pocatello-Chubbuck area in Southeastern Idaho and the Coeur d'Alene-Kootenai County area in Northern Idaho continued in June to experience the most rapid growth rate in residential construction. Permits for new dwelling units in areas of Ada and Canyon counties were, however, below the number issued in May, 1976, and in June a year ago.

Overall, the letter concludes, the construction industry in Idaho for the first six months of 1976 experienced a healthy increase and the outlook for the remainder of the year is favorable.

F&G Commission Adopts More Restrictive Seasons

By Royce Williams
Idaho Dept. of Fish & Game
With some exceptions in the Panhandle and eastern Idaho controlled hunts, the Fish and Game Commission has approved statewide bulls only hunting this fall for elk.
Deer hunters also face significantly more restrictive seasons on does as a result of the Commission's two-day meeting at Boise.
Controlled hunts for both of Idaho's major big game species also are more restrictive this year, but there were few changes made in controlled hunts for trophy species.
Commissioners were more liberal in mountain lion seasons than in past years, adding from 2 to 4 weeks to many lion seasons and extending others (7 units) by 2 months.

Bear seasons were changed from year-round season in 9 units to a September-July season, and 4 units open to year-round seasons in the past were closed.
Changes in this fall's archery hunts included a move away from bucks only deer hunts in six eastern Idaho units, the addition of two new archery hunts and an extension of one hunt near Boise.
Muzzle loader seasons remained similar to last year except a new deer hunt was added in southern Idaho in Unit 22.
Opening dates for upland game bird seasons remain similar to last year, but commissioners closed the sage grouse season in the Camas Creek drainage in Camas and parts of Elmore and Blaine counties.
Also new with the 1976 regulations will be an opener on forest grouse in to coincide with the general deer and elk seasons.
This year's regulations make it legal to shoot a forest grouse in any area in which the general deer and elk seasons are open.

ing many trees, the National Wildlife Federation says. After they bury nuts, they often don't dig up all of them. As a result, the nuts sprout in the spring and become trees.

Idaho Traffic Fatalities Reduced in '75

Traffic fatalities in Idaho fell 13% during 1975 compared to 1974. The reduction resulted in Idaho having the 2nd best percent decrease of traffic fatalities among all states in the nation last year. The number of traffic fatalities in Idaho was reduced nearly one person for every 100 million vehicle miles of travel in the state. The fatality reduction occurred although the state recorded its highest number of miles traveled by motor vehicles during any one year.
Fatalities, fatal accidents and incapacitating injuries resulting from traffic accidents in Idaho were all lower in 1975 than during 1974. Fatalities in urban areas increased slightly, while rural traffic fatalities dropped. Reduction of urban traffic fatalities was noteworthy on Idaho's interstate and U. S. numbered routes.
Motorcycle, train crossing and pedestrian collisions took more lives in 1975 than during 1974. Train crossing collisions increased 71% over '74 and motorcycle fatalities dropped. Persons 25 years of age or younger were overly involved as drivers of fa-

tal accident vehicles. The 25 to 34-year-old age group was involved in the greatest number of fatal and injury accidents, while the 20 to 24-year-old drivers followed closely behind.

A driver's failure to yield the right of way, speed and improper driving were some of the major causes of motor vehicle accidents during 1975. Laboratory analysis of valid blood samples from accident victims proved that 49.4% of the victims who died in traffic accidents had alcohol in their blood.

Idaho is mid-way into the 1976 prevention year. Traffic fatalities are down 16% and fatal accidents are about 13 percent last year.

Nine out of ten forest fires can be prevented. Care and caution are essential tools in the forest, if they are used by everyone perhaps we wouldn't always need to be prepared with shovels, axes and buckets.

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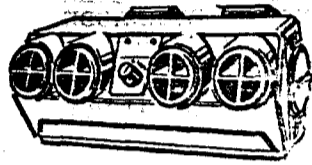
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Wildlife Conference

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Unemployment Claims Dropped Last Week

According to Frank Hartstein, Moscow Department of Employment office manager, 47 persons were able to find employment through the efforts of the Moscow office. This figure compares favorably with the 49 persons placed last week and the 28 persons placed at this time last year. This is due largely to the effort being placed upon employment of youths in agri-service jobs, but also to the upturn of the business economy of the area. 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License Plates with '7' Expire July 31

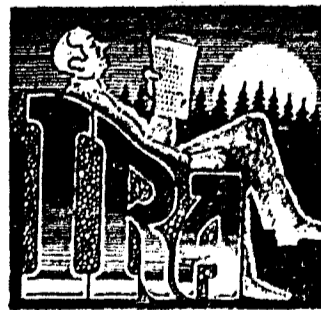
Idaho motorists with license plates on the staggered system ending in seven (7) displaying "78" red and white or blue and white stickers are reminded their registration card says "License Expires Last Day of July, 1976" or "License Expires July 31, 1976" and must be renewed. Black on white "77" validation stickers may be acquired at the County Assessor's office in the county in which you reside.

Idahonans who own and operate passenger cars and pickups are still required by law to continuously have liability insurance. Applicants must certify the existence of automobile liability insurance covering the motor vehicle.

Travel trailers, motor homes, truck campers, camping trailers, and van conversions must also be licensed and display a recreational vehicle sticker in addition to any valid license plate needed for the vehicle.

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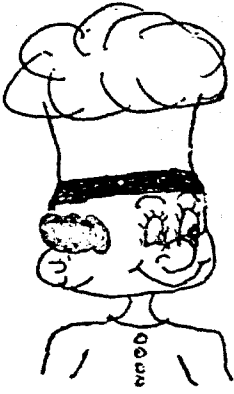
