





Samples of fresh squeezed orange juice contained up to 100 percent more Vitamin C than samples of

pasteurized orange juice. Also studied was frozen orange juice concentrate, and it tested out almost as high in Vitamin C as fresh juice. A study 25 years ago had shown that canned orange juice was equal to fresh juice in the important vitamin.

The researchers advised physicians to take into account the source of orange juice when evaluating the diets of patients with Vitamin C deficiencies. If pasteurized juice is used, much more of it is needed to get the same amount of Vitamin C as from fresh juice.

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

#### Crash Diets Can Cause Hair To Fall Out

A rigorous crash diet can take off the excess pounds. It also can make your hair fall out.

Two military physicians from Let-terman Army Medical Center, San Francisco reported on 9 patients who lost most of their hair 2 to 5 months after starting a vigorous weight reduction program.

The individuals trimmed from 25 to 55 pounds in their crash diets. But the rigorous caloric restriction caused an inadequate supply of energy to the roots of the hair, said Drs. Detief


