September Dates

September will hold dates sportsmen will find important to remember this year:
 September 1—Dove season opens in all counties of the state.
 September 4—Bear hunting begins in the northern part of the state and mountain lion hunting opens over most of the state. Archers begin hunts for deer, elk, bear, antelope and mountain goats.
 September 15—Some deer and elk hunting opens in the backcountry units.
 September 18—Partridge, grouse and quail season opens, and turkey season opens in Units, 11, 13, 14, 15, 19A, 22, 23, 32A, and 39.
 September 28—Last day to buy an elk tag anywhere in the state. Deer tag sales will also end in Boundary, Bonner, Kootenai, Shoshone, Benewah, Latah, Clearwater, Nez Perce, Lewis and Idaho counties. Elk tags for the Camas County controlled hunt (Hunt No. 244) must be validated.

Latah County Job Picture Continues To Improve

Job opportunities continued to improve during the past week in Latah county. Frank Hartstein, Moscow office manager for the Idaho Department of Employment, reported that his office found work for a total of 38 persons during the past week. This figure did not include a few young people placed on summer jobs for the last week of the vacation period, nor a number of others who had been referred to jobs that will start in the future. During the previous week 25 persons were given job finding help, and during the last week in August a year ago, the total was 23. 17 jobs remain to be filled now and consist primarily of secretarial, clerical and service type jobs.

there were 413 idled workers in the county. 33 persons filed new claims for benefits, down slightly from the previous week. Most of the new claims were filed by workers who had moved here and were filing claims against other states. The most noticeable increase was in the immediate Moscow area, where the total rose from 250 to 282. Other areas showing increase were Genesee from 15 to 19 during the week and the Pottlatch area, from 55 to 58. The Kendrick area remained the same, at 17, but was up from the 13 a year ago and the Troy-Deary-Bovill area showed a decline from 92 to 90. However the figure from the eastern part of the county was only 71 at the end of August in 1975.

June license sales, typically the peak month for sales, were above the same month in 1975 in all major categories.

Different Orange Drinks Contain Varied Amounts Of Vitamin C

The typical American breakfast includes a glass of orange juice, a good source of Vitamin C. But the amount of Vitamin C in the breakfast orange juice varies widely, notes the Idaho Medical Association. Fresh orange juice gets top rating as a Vitamin C source in a research study conducted at Mt. Sinai School of Medicine, New York City. Samples of fresh squeezed orange juice contained up to 100 percent more Vitamin C than samples of

pasteurized orange juice. Also studied was frozen orange juice concentrate, and it tested out almost as high in Vitamin C as fresh juice. A study 25 years ago had shown that canned orange juice was equal to fresh juice in the important vitamin. The researchers advised physicians to take into account the source of orange juice when evaluating the diets of patients with Vitamin C deficiencies. If pasteurized juice is used, much more of it is needed to get the same amount of Vitamin C as from fresh juice.

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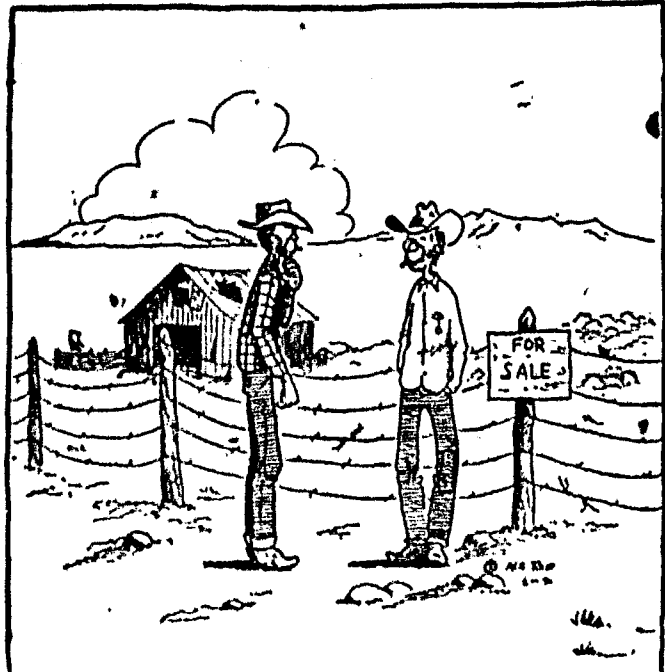

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Football Blocking and Tackling Techniques

Football blocking and tackling techniques which have been blamed in the injuries and deaths of student players are picking up opposition, including that of the Idaho Medical Association.

The techniques involve the use of the head and helmet as the point of initial contact in tackling and blocking.

In a resolution adopted at its 1976 annual meeting, the association cited the danger of head and neck injuries in strongly advocating strict enforcement of rule changes outlawing face tackling and butt blocking.

In its 1976 rules, the NCAA states that the helmet shall not be used as the primary point of contact in the teaching of blocking and tackling, and that no player shall deliberately use his helmet to butt or ram an opponent.

The National Association of State High School Associations has repeatedly issued warnings on the techniques and the National Football Alliance has made them personal fouls, beginning this season.

There were 13 football related deaths in the US in 1975 said Dick Stickle, Executive Secretary of the Idaho High School Activities Association resulting from injury to the neck or head.

In its resolution the IMA referred to the threat of paralysis, the potential for tragic consequences if the head continues to be used as the point of initial contact in tackling and blocking and urged coaches and administrators to strictly enforce the new rules.

The Fish and Game Commission will close the Nature Conservancy property on Silver Creek to all hunting this fall.

At its August meeting, the Commission approved closing the area to hunting, but fishing will not be affected on the more than 479 acres near Sun Valley.

Through donations, the Nature Conservancy has landed its option to buy the property that borders the world famous trout stream.

Idaho School Buses Carry Precious Cargo

School buses carry a precious cargo. Many young lives may be snuffed out by a single error in judgment or lack of proper equipment.

Continuing attention must be given to keep the accident, injury and death rate as low as possible. Ninety motor vehicle accident reports during the year name school buses as being involved. Two fatalities per year result from these crashes.

Most frequently the fatalities involved in the accident injured bus passengers outnumber those injured in second vehicles. Serious accidents receive much nationwide attention, however, school bus accident numbers are relatively low considering the number of passenger miles.

Idaho's school transportation system accumulates over 500 million passenger miles yearly. One hundred thousand students daily ride the fleet of 1,700 available buses. Total daily bus travel is 80,000 miles with routes ranging from a few miles up to over 100.

Buses make a few as 10 stops in urban areas whereas rural buses stop up to 30 times while picking up or dropping off students. Road conditions in some parts of Idaho dictate that shorter than normal vehicles be used to manipulate the curves and some are equipped with 4 wheel drive for extreme weather conditions.

School bus safety is complex from more than the standpoints of numbers, varying community structure and road conditions. The equipment and the people involved add limitations. The people include the student, school officials, the bus driver, the drivers of other vehicles and the parents of the students.

The parents of the student have a direct responsibility in training their children in good conduct and safe practices while waiting for the bus and when riding. They also have a voice in regard to the transportation system. The road worthiness of the buses their children ride is of concern to the parents. School officials are directly responsible for the bus system and many of their choices will be influenced by public interest and concern.

Proper equipment must be purchased and maintained at a high standard for safety's sake. School buses face rigorous conditions, therefore, they should be expected to pass rigorous inspections.

Special hazards are common to school bus driving. Frequent stopping and starting, many turns at intersections, and slower speeds complicate movement in traffic. Idaho fortunately has not had any major school bus accidents. School bus drivers, however, must be aware of specific hazards on their routes. Two examples of these are the railroad crossing and the blind intersection.

Four near miss railroad crossing incidents were reported during the spring semester of 1976. Another near disaster was reported as occurring at a blind rural intersection. A truck driver took evasive action to avoid a school bus pulling onto a main road. The truck driver nearly lost his life when his truck overturned. Bus loads of children have been killed in other states in similar types of accidents. Last minute reactions avoided tragedies in these cases.

Parents should be aware of the qualifications of their school bus drivers and the availability of training to help drivers become more proficient. Unusual hours, hectic conditions and generally low pay scale limits the number of persons wanting to drive buses. It takes a special kind of individual to be willing to assume this responsibility. Parents should show their appreciation to their school bus drivers by "Safe Driver" recognition programs as well as individual personal contact.

Every citizen needs to give concerned attention to school bus transportation safety. Every driver should also do his part by driving with special care when he recognizes a school bus making its rounds.

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
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Letters to the Editor...

(Editor's Note—The Gazette contacted Mr. Tracy, principal of Kendrick High School concerning the status of the drill team.
