





Eye Injuries Caused Frof Tennis Balls

A well-hit tennis ball travels at 50 to 85 miles per hour as it crosses the net, and can cause injury if it hits the eye, according to the Idaho Medical Association.

Eye specialists reporting on ten patients who suffered eye injuries from tennis balls stated that most of the damage occurred when a player was rushing the net.

A person rushing up to the net, or playing close to the net, is at greater risk than a player in the back court, where the ball is traveling at a slow. er speed.

Drs. Morton H. Seelenfreund and Dennis B. Freilich, New York City, pointed out that compared to the great number of players, those injured by a ball in the eye are a very small minority.

But there is some danger, and they suggest some type of eye protector, such as the handball eye protector, or sports sunglasses made of shatterproof plastic with metal wire or plaxtic side pieces that curl around the ears for stability.

Also players were urged to proper instruction in holding their tennis rackets to protect the face from a rapidly returning ball as they rish up to the net.

The doctors noted that one of the patients was a spectator, standing at the edge of the court.
