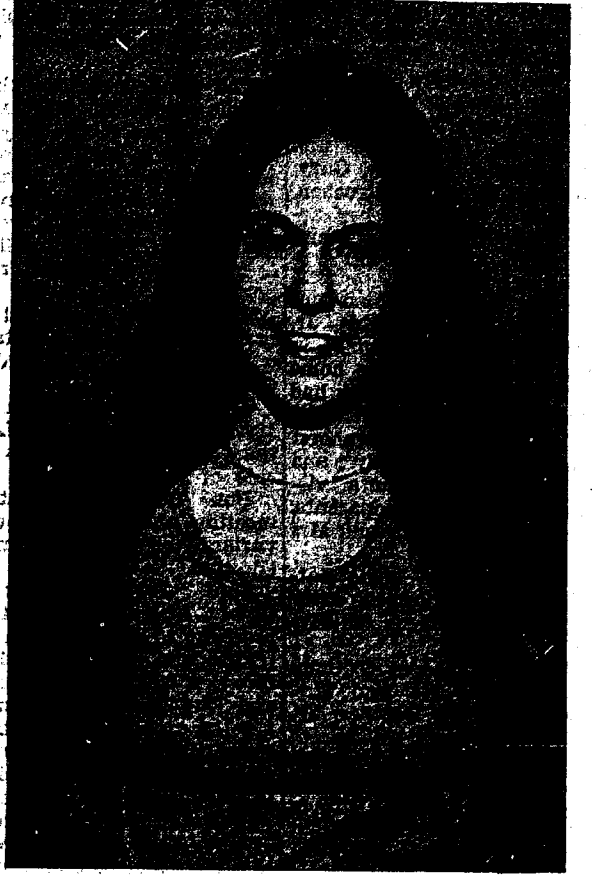

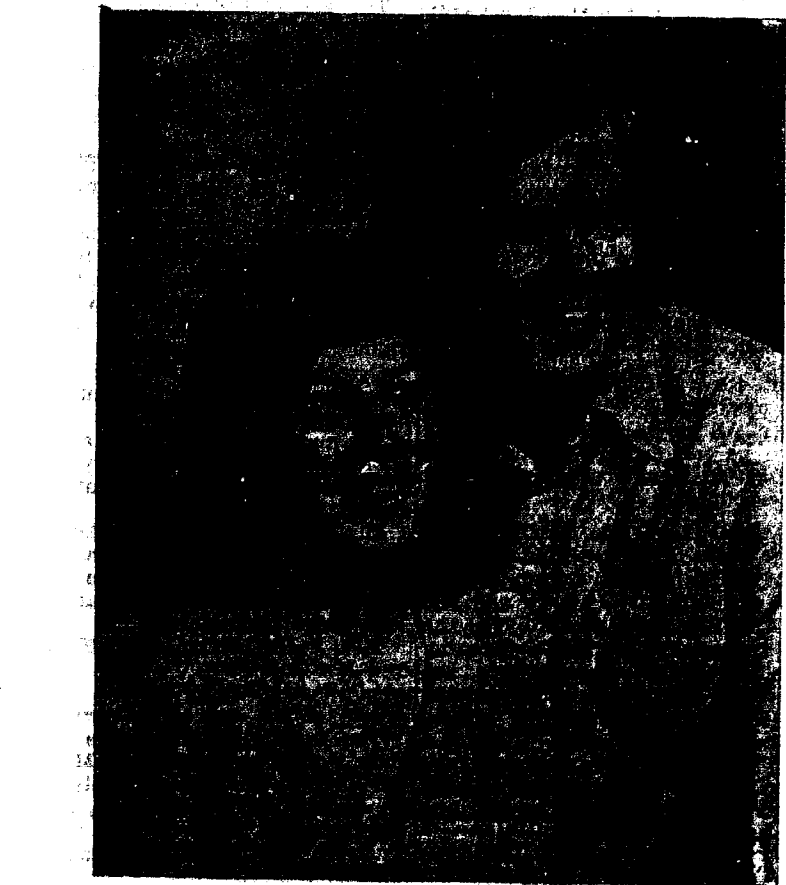
Other survivors are two sisters, Henrietta Glenn of Cameron and Anna Marie Albright of Lewiston. A brother, Gus Blum, died last May 29.

Jensen's To Be Honored On 25th Anniversary

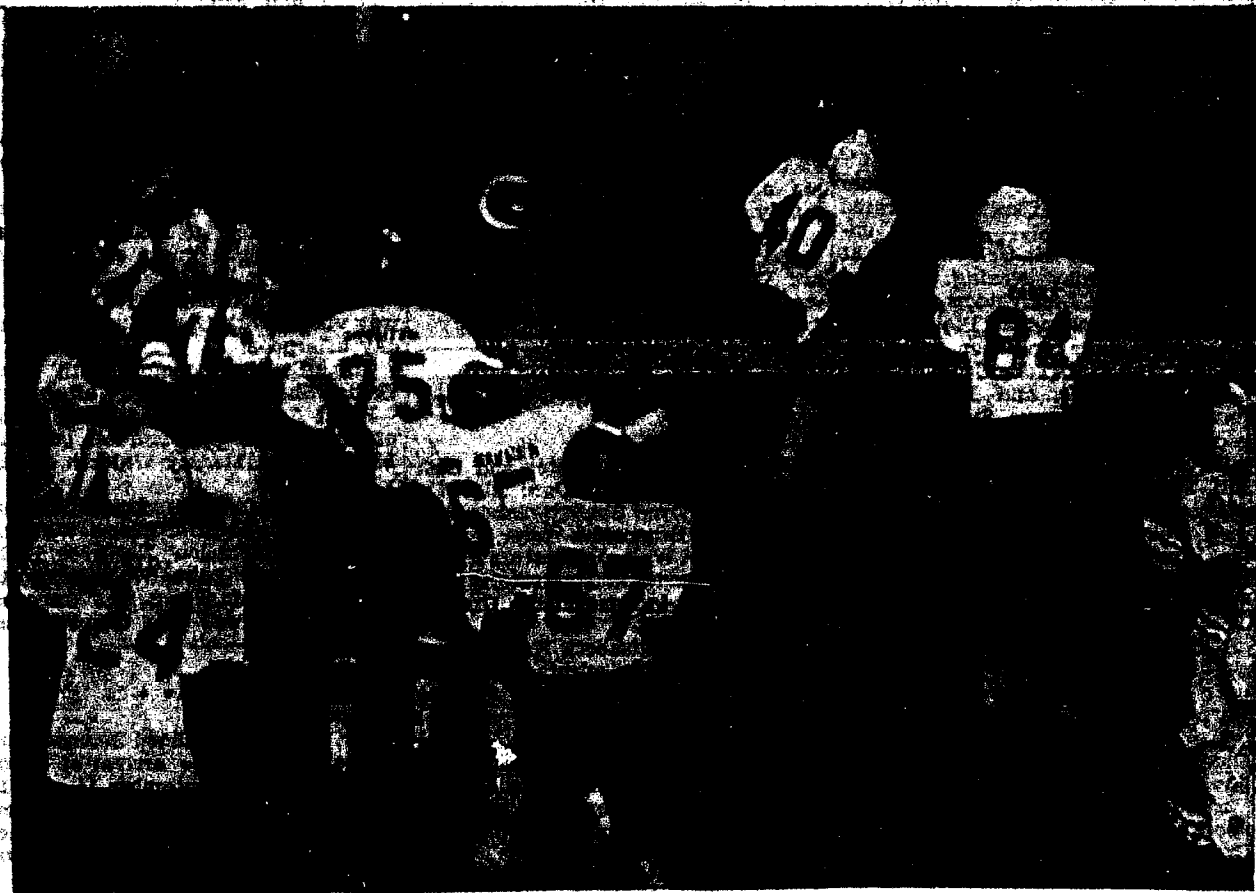

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the landowner as a gesture of good faith that he will respect the land and the privilege of using it to hunt or fish. Wearing the triangle patch and acting the part of a true sportsman will hopefully gain the goodwill of the landholder and result in more acres of land open to the public.

Another thing the council does is furnish signs to the landholder free of charge. These signs have several messages on them, all of which are intended to improve the landholder-sportsman relationship.

One sign is "Hunting by Permission," and reminds the sportsman that good hunting ethics and the law require him to ask permission before trespassing on private property, and implying that permission will be given when properly requested. Also available are signs reminding the person to close gates, to watch for livestock or sprinkler pipe, and not to road hunt. Still another sign that is available free is the "Hunter Welcome" sign. This sign states that the landholder is willing to open his land to hunting in return for courteous and respectful use of the land, livestock, fences and buildings.

The sign is used by landholders who do not have a problem with hunters or fishermen and no longer wish to be bothered with individual requests for permission. The sign

welcomes hunters, and puts them on their honor to remember that courtesy and respect for life and property are necessary to insure continuance of the sport of hunting and fishing on private lands.

The ultimate goal of the council is to improve landholder-sportsman relations to the point where the landholder need not worry about hunters or anglers abusing the privileges of using his private land, and the sportsman will have more land available for the enjoyment of hunting and fishing.

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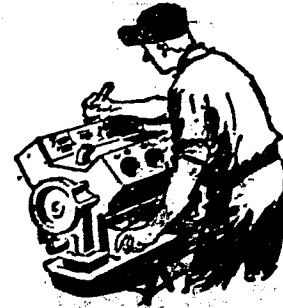

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PICKING UP SPRINKLER PIPE CAN BE DANGEROUS

The approach of harvest means that many farmers will be picking up their sprinkler irrigation pipe, according to Dorell Larsen, Irrigation Specialist, U/I Cooperative Extension Service. Each year many accidental injuries occur to people picking up pipe. The major hazard is high voltage overhead power lines. Aluminum pipe is an excellent conductor. A person handling a pipe that comes into contact with a power line is likely to be killed or severely injured. Wind can catch the pipe, whipping it up in the line, or all too frequently the pipe is tipped up to clear out gravel or a rodent and inadvertently touches overhead wire.

School is in full swing for another year, and with the beginning of "school days" our thoughts turn to fall, winter, holidays—which means, of course, entertaining. Children rushing home from school, making a mad dash for the cookie jar, and of course, with cooler weather, why not bake a few cookies or easy-to-make cake, and invite the neighbors and friends in. The approach of the holidays tends to bring out a bit more good will and friendliness, too.

Zucchini is plentiful right now, so here's a few recipes to help you use the extra you have on hand.

- Zucchini Picnic Cake**
- 1 cup raisins
 - 1/2 cup water
 - 1/2 cup shortening
 - 2 cups sugar
 - 2 eggs
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla
 - 3 3/4 cups grated unpeeled raw zucchini
 - 1 tsp. grated orange rind
 - 2 cups sifted flour
 - 2 teaspoons soda
 - 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1 cup chopped nuts
 - powdered sugar

In small saucepan combine raisins and water; bring to boil. Remove from heat; cool. Cream shortening and sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in eggs, one at a time, beating well after each. Stir in vanilla, zucchini-raisins with liquid and orange rind. Sift dry ingredients; add to creamed mixture, stirring until well blended. Fold in nuts. Spoon batter into a greased 9x13-inch pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour or until cake tests done. Cool; dust with powdered sugar or frost as desired.

Hamburger Stuffed Zucchini

6-8 in. or 1 large zucchini squash
1 pound ground beef
1 cup minced onion
1 egg, slightly beaten
1/2 cup cracker crumbs
Salt, pepper, garlic salt to taste
1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese, divided
1 15-oz. can tomato sauce, divided

Cut zucchini in half lengthwise; scoop out insides, leaving shell. Brown ground beef and onion; add squash pulp. Cover and cook until squash is soft. Season with salt, pepper and garlic salt. Remove from heat; stir in egg, cracker crumbs, 1/4 cup Parmesan cheese and tomato sauce to moisten. Season squash shells with salt and pepper; stuff with filling. Place in shallow baking pan. Spoon a small amount of remaining tomato sauce on squash halves; pour remaining sauce around them. Cover and bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes (about 45 min. for large zucchini). Remove cover and top with remaining cheese. Bake 15 minutes longer or until squash is tender and top is toasted.

Yield: 6 servings

Choosing a storage location that is clear of overhead power lines is a primary safety step, according to Bill Berry, Idaho Power Co. Engineer. Fence corner locations offer an "out of the way" storage place but often have power lines overhead. Avoid these locations and be aware of power lines while taking up pipe in the field.

Other types of accidents can also plague the pipe removal task according to Wayne Fisher, Extension Safety Specialist. Back strains are common when handling pipe. Use proper lifting techniques. Don't handle too many sections at one time. When lifting heavier loads, use your leg muscles by bending your knees and keep your back straight. Reaching across, and also twisting your body rather than shifting your feet, are moves which contribute to back injuries.

Sprained ankles can occur when kicking pipe locks loose. Fingers can

get out on sharp corners or mashed between pipe. Careless action must be avoided. Gloves will help protect the hands and planned coordination when handling pipe will save mashed fingers.

Fisher also warns to be careful around the pipe trailer when it's moving. The driver and helpers should be alert and anticipate dangerous moves other persons might make.

Operators will be in a hurry to get the pipe in so they can get to other tasks. They are urged to take time to make plans so power lines and other hazards are avoided. Employers should consider instructing their workers in safe techniques and designate a location for storage that is free of over loaded lines. A crippling or fatal injury to an employee can mean a disastrous lawsuit. Time spent in planning will add to safety and accomplishment and avoid injuries and distress.

Nine out of ten forest fires can be prevented. Care and caution are essential tools in the forest, if they are used by everyone perhaps we wouldn't always need to be prepared with shovels, axes and buckets.

Diabetes Detection Program Planned for Kendrick-Juliaetta Area

Plans are underway for a free diabetes screening program to be held at the Kendrick Fraternal Temple Monday, September 27, according to Mr. and Mrs. E. M. White, co-presidents of the "Golden Sunset" senior citizens group.

The program, presented in cooperation with the new Moscow-Pullman unit of the American Diabetes Assn., will be aimed at persons in the so-called "high risk" categories: those who are over forty, overweight, are blood relatives of diabetics, or are women who have given birth to large babies (more than nine pounds). Persons should also be tested if they have had warning signs such as an excessive thirst, frequent urination, recent unexplained weight loss despite increased appetite, recurring and persistent sores on legs and feet, cuts and bruises slow to heal, boils and carbuncles, intense itching, certain eye changes and past "suspicious" sugar tests in persons not presently under treatment. Known diabetics will not be tested.

Diabetes is now the third leading cause of death from disease in the United States, affecting five per cent of the population and increasing at the rate of six per cent a year. There are now ten million Americans with diabetes but not all of them know it. The purpose of a screening program is to find these "hidden" diabetics and get them to early medical attention.

Diabetes results from the inability of the pancreas to produce enough effective insulin. This hormone permits sugars and starches of the diet to be converted into needed heat and energy. The untreated diabetic lacks energy while unused sugar piles up in the blood and urine, eventually leading to serious problems which are avoidable through prompt medical intervention.

Hours for the screening will be afternoon and early evening. Details are to be announced at a later date.

At their regular meeting, September 9, the School Board adopted revisions in the student attendance policy. I wish to outline the major points of that policy so that students and parents will be well informed on a matter which affects them directly:

Except in extraordinary cases, a student will not be given credit in a subject if he is not in attendance at least 85% of the days school is in session (SBP 107.3.3): 1. Based on 90 days in a given semester, a student will not be given credit in a subject if he is absent more than 13 1/2 days; 2. Any days missed due to school-sponsored activities will not be considered an absence.

Students who are absent for any reason will have one day to make up missed work for each day they were absent. If extraordinary circumstances exist in a case where a student has missed more than 15% of the days school is in session, he may appeal his loss of credits to the Building Principal.

The Student enrollment for the District is down 33 students from this time last year. Last year, there were 386 students enrolled in school, so far only 353 students have enrolled in school this year. The breakdown by level is as follows:

Ag. instructor and F.F.A. advisor will be taking a livestock judging team to Latah and Nez Perce County fairs. In addition, 11 students will be showing and selling animals through the F.F.A. at the Latah County Fair and one student will show at the Nez Perce County Fair. Our second graders will spend the day at the Latah County Fair this week and will be given a tour of the fairgrounds and free carnival rides to acquaint them with the fair and some of its objectives. Several other students are involved in the fairs with 4-H projects. To all those involved I wish them luck with their projects, knowing the time and energy expended on them.
