

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

Except in extraordinary cases, a student will not be given credit in a subject if he is not in attendance at least 85% of the days school is in session (SBP 107.3.3): 1. Based on 90 days in a given semester, a student will not be given credit in a subject if he is absent more than 131/2 days; 2. Any days missed due to schoolsponsored activities will not be considered an absence.

Students who are absent for any reason will have one day to make up missed work for each day they were absent.

If extroardinary circumstances exist in a case where a student has missed more than 15% of the days school is in session, he may appeal his loss of credits to the Building Principal.


