**South America  
Lures Dearyite**

Betty Howell recently spent five weeks on a tour of South America in a group of eleven people, visiting most of the countries with the exception of Argentina and Brazil.

The first leg of the trip was a flight from Los Angeles to Bogota, Colombia. When told she was 9,000 from home, Betty says she was hit with the full realization that she had left the U.S.

During their five weeks of travel, they went by train, bus, taxi and ship as well as plane; the accommodations were better than expected, though not like in the U.S. The food was frequently less than appetizing to Betty (who has cooked in local restaurants for several years), and she returned home 15 pounds lighter than she left.

Some of the highlights of the trip were visiting Inca ruins, copper and silver mines, a lake 14,000 feet up in the Andes, many beautiful cathedrals, being in the midst of a riot, and traveling through the Panama Canal on a ship.

The riot occurred in Lima, Peru, a city of over a million people. Four of their group were just leaving the building when the rioters came down the street, bullets and smoke bombs flying; someone pulled them back inside and ushered them upstairs where the windows and doors and at the top of the stairway. The protest was over the devaluation of their monetary unit, Sol.

The last leg of the trip was a 10-day cruise from Valparaiso, Chile along the west coast and through the Panama Canal and, from there, by plane back to L.A.

Marlene Carman didn't go quite as far as Betty but she did meet her in L.A. and they drove back to Deary by way of Reno and Boise where they had stopovers.

Asked if she had had enough traveling for a while, Betty was quick to say, "No, there are lots of other places I'd like to see."



## Home Cookin'...

Apples are plentiful this year, and can also be prepared so many different ways. Here's a couple of recipes you might like to try. They are both delicious—anyway they will be a change from the same old recipes you've used for years, and who knows—the family might even like them!

### SAUCY APPLE SALAD

1—1-lb. can applesauce

2 3-oz. pkgs. lime gelatin (I prefer lemon)  
 2 7-oz. bottles lemon-lime carbonated beverage  
 2 tblsp. grated orange rind  
 1 11-oz. can mandarin oranges, drained  
 1 8 1/2 oz. can crushed pineapple, drained  
 Heat applesauce to boiling; remove from heat. Add gelatin; stir until completely dissolved. Gradually add lemon-lime soda. Chill until slightly thickened. Fold in orange rind and drained fruit. Turn into 1 1/2-qt. mold; chill until set. Unmold on salad greens.  
 Yield: 8 servings.

### CARAMEL APPLE SQUARES

3/4 cup butter or margarine  
 1 cup brown sugar (packed)  
 2 cups pared, sliced apples  
 1/2 cup raisins  
 1/3 cup shortening  
 1 1/3 cup sugar  
 2 eggs  
 1/2 tsp. vanilla  
 1 1/3 cups sifted flour  
 3 tsp. baking powder  
 1/2 tsp. salt  
 2/3 cup water  
 whipped cream  
 Melt butter in 9-inch round cake pan. Add brown sugar, stir until dissolved. Top with apple slices and raisins. Cream shortening and sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs

one at a time, beating well after each. Stir in vanilla. Sift flour, baking powder and salt; add to the creamed mixture alternately with water. Pour over apples. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 minutes or until cake tests done. Remove from oven; invert on serving plate. Serve warm or cold with whipped cream.  
 Yield: 9 servings.

### APPLESAUCE DROP COOKIES

3/4 cup shortening  
 1 cup brown sugar, packed  
 1 egg  
 1/2 cup applesauce  
 2 1/4 cups sifted flour  
 1/2 tsp. salt  
 1/2 teaspoon soda  
 3/4 tsp. cinnamon  
 1/4 tsp. cloves  
 1 cup raisins  
 1/2 cup chopped nuts

Cream shortening and sugar. Stir in egg; mix well. Add applesauce. Sift dry ingredients; stir in. Mix in raisins and nuts. Drop dough by teaspoonfuls onto greased cookie sheet. Bake at 375 degrees for 10 to 12 minutes.  
 Yield: 4 dozen cake-like cookies

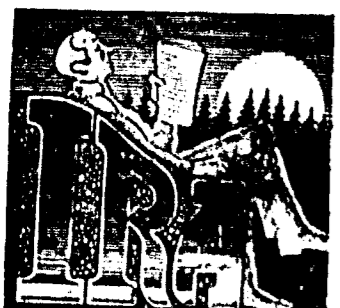

**IDAHO DEPT. OF EMPLOYMENT**  
 23 new job openings were listed with the Moscow Office of the Idaho Department of Employment during the past week. Frank Hartstein, Moscow office manager said this compared favorably with the 17 listed a

week ago and was higher than the 19 new openings listed this week a year ago. Placement of job seekers dropped from 35 last week to 23 verified placements for the week. 25 positions are still open, including jobs for nurse aides, secretaries, an NCR

proof operator, bookkeepers, maids, farm equipment operators and a journeyman auto mechanic.  
 Hartstein's report indicated that 26 persons filed new claims for unemployment insurance through his office during the week, a slight increase over the previous week's figure of 23. However, the total number of persons seeking jobs pay checks dropped from last week's figure of 384 to a current total of 311. A year ago there were 280 persons receiving unemployment compensation benefits. In the immediate Moscow area there

are now 182 persons receiving benefits, down considerably from last week's total of 225; and comparable to last year's figure of 190. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area the current total is 67, down slightly from last week's total of 79, but considerably higher than last year's figure of 46. Genesee's total of 14 is down slightly from 17 the previous week. Kendrick's total also has dropped slightly from 13 to 10. The Poblatch area experienced a considerable drop in its jobless rate, only 38 persons are unemployed, compared to 50 last week.

**Tag Cutoff**  
 Elk hunters in Idaho have 2 weeks left to get their tags before the tags go off the market. Midnight, Sept. 28 is the deadline.  
 A cutoff of deer tag sales also goes into effect in all counties north of Idaho County on the same day.  
 Idaho County is included in the September 28 cutoff date, but counties south of Idaho County will have until midnight Oct. 12 to buy deer tags.  
 Two exceptions will allow some hunters to get deer and elk tags from the department after cutoff dates. The exceptions are persons who qualify by age and residency after the cutoff and Idaho servicemen on leave arriving after the cutoff date.
