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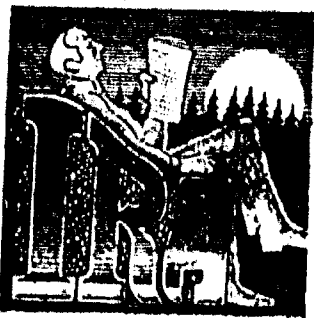

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DEPT. OF EMPLOYMENT

16 applicants were given job-finding help during the past week said Frank Hartstein, Dept. of Employment Moscow Local Office Manager, down slightly from last week's total of 23 placements. Presently there are 24 openings available for qualified nurse aides, secretaries, an NCR proof operator, bookkeepers, maids, farm equipment operators, and a journeyman auto mechanic. Hartstein's report indicated that the number of area persons seeking jobless pay dropped to 286 from last week's total of 311, compared to 263

last year at this time, while 29 persons applied for unemployment insurance benefits. The Moscow area experienced a slight drop from last week's total of 182 to the current total of 176, lower than last year's total of 180. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area, only 55 persons are seeking unemployment benefits, compared to 67 last week, considerably higher than last year's total of 44. The Kendrick and Pottlatch areas totals dropped slightly from 10 to 9 and 38 to 37, respectively. The Pottlatch figure, however, is relatively higher than last year's figure of 24.

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The following are the proposed Constitutional Amendments to be voted on at the next General Election to be held November 2, 1970.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

"Shall Section 3, Article VIII, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho, be amended to allow cities and political subdivisions to issue revenue bonds for the purpose of rehabilitating existing electrical generating facilities, when approved by a majority of the electors voting in favor of the bonds?"

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL'S STATEMENT OF MEANING AND PURPOSE
S. J. R. No. 109

The purpose of this proposed amendment to Section 3, Article VIII, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho is to allow cities and other political subdivisions to issue revenue bonds for the purpose of rehabilitating existing electrical generating facilities which are owned and operated by that city or subdivision. In order to annually raise the money for the rehabilitation work, revenue bonds could be issued, after these bonds have been approved by the majority vote of the taxpayers in the city or political subdivision. The revenue bonds would be retired by the revenues collected from the sale of electrical energy.

The adoption of this proposed amendment would clarify the constitutional and statutory authority of cities and political subdivisions to rehabilitate existing electrical generating facilities through the use of revenue bonds.

Statements FOR the proposed amendment:

1. Cities and political subdivisions which own and operate their own electrical generating systems should have the ability to keep these facilities in good repair.
2. The citizens of the several cities in Idaho who have invested in municipally owned power systems need the continuing authority to make the major repairs to that system in order to protect the citizens' investments.
3. It simply isn't good business to allow cities to make substantial investments in electrical generating facilities and then not allow them to keep these facilities in efficient operating condition.

Statements AGAINST the proposed amendment:

1. This proposed amendment is special interest legislation involving only a limited number of cities in the state. It is proposed that this special interest constitutional amendment be approved when other possible avenues have not been exhausted. Essentially the same improvements could be accomplished through the approval of general obligation bonds by a two-thirds majority of the people in the affected area. However, this has not been attempted.
2. Approval of this amendment would allow revenue bonds, with the approval of a majority of the voters in the affected area, to compete on the bond market with bonds of other governmental units throughout the country. As the funds available are limited, this could make it more difficult to sell other bonds and potentially increase interest rates for such bonds.

H. J. R. No. 6

"Shall Section 23, Article III, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended by striking the provision of ten dollars per day and ten cents per mile travel allowance and providing that the legislature shall have no authority to establish its salary but to authorize a citizens committee on Legislative compensation to establish the rate of compensation and expenses, subject to rejection or reduction by the Legislature; provided that no change in the rate of compensation shall apply to the Legislature then in office except as provided in this Section?"

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL'S STATEMENT OF MEANING AND PURPOSE
H. J. R. No. 6

The purpose of this proposed amendment to Section 23, Article III, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho is to remove the present provisions for a salary of ten dollars per day, limited to sixty days, and ten cents per mile travel allowance for members of the Legislature, and to authorize a citizens committee on legislative compensation to recommend the rate of compensation and expenses for legislative service. The rate established by the committee

would be in effect unless reduced or rejected by the Legislature; but, the Legislature could not increase the rate.

If adopted, this amendment would remove the fixed amount of compensation found in the Constitution and direct establishment of a citizens committee composed of six persons. The committee would be authorized to study legislative compensation and recommend a rate deemed responsible by the committee. The Legislature would be authorized to reject or reduce the amount established by the committee, but could not increase the salary or expenses. Members of the committee would be appointed by the Governor and the Supreme Court, but no person could serve who holds public office to which compensation was attached.

Statements FOR the proposed amendment:

1. Legislative compensation is presently established at \$10 per day, limited to 60 days for a regular session and 20 days for a special session. This rate was established in 1948, and can only be changed by constitutional amendment. It is unrealistic to have the Legislature in 1970 or some future Legislature to a figure established 20 years or more ago. The rate of inflation, the changing needs of our workers, and the demands placed upon members of the Legislature argue for greater flexibility in establishing the rate of compensation.

2. If H. J. R. No. 6 were to remove authority to increase rates of legislative compensation from the request of the Legislature. In the past, legislators have been very conservative in providing an adequate expense allowance, but even then have been open to the charge that they are adjusting legislation with a direct personal interest. The provisions of this amendment would remove the initial salary review from legislative hands and return them to the people.

3. The present provisions of the Constitution have led to use of an expense allowance. While the salary is firmly established, the Legislature has followed the trend in other states and has provided an expense allowance to make up some of the difference between the salary and the actual cost of serving. While expense allowances have been held to be completely legal, it would be better to establish a clear public record of compensation for legislative service.

4. Most proponents believe that the amendment will result in increased compensation for legislators, and approve of this because of the effect that persons should be able to serve in the Legislature without undue hardship. While legislative service should not become a highly paid government position, compensation should be established at such a rate as to allow a cross section of Idaho citizens to serve. Only when all persons are eligible can Idaho claim to have a true citizens Legislature.

5. The citizens committee created by this proposal is removed from the political arena by providing that no member may be a current office holder. The citizens of Idaho can have confidence that this committee, composed of persons like themselves, will be representative of Idaho thinking.

Statements AGAINST the proposed amendment:

1. Legislative service is among the most cherished of the rights of citizens. Election to the Legislature was never intended to be lucrative, as indicated by the fact that the framers of the Constitution placed specific limits upon salary. The rewards of public service are the honor, dignity and public respect which attach to the office. Such rewards cannot be measured in dollars and cents, but are evidenced by the desire to serve one's fellow man.

2. Unlimited increases in compensation may eventually result in salary levels which attract persons to the Legislature merely for the monetary rewards attached to the office. A professional Legislature would mean little representation for the average citizen.

3. Creation of a compensation committee is designed to remove the responsibility for controlling legislative expenses from the Legislature. The Legislature deems itself competent to establish the budget of the entire state, and establish the rate of compensation of every other state employee. It is inconsistent that they should then attempt to delegate to others the responsibility for recommendations on legislative compensation.

4. The proposed amendment moves future salary levels one more step beyond the control of the people. Rates will be recommended by an appointed committee. Persons appointed to committees do not have the approval of the people which is derived only by election.

5. The establishment of a citizens committee, with appointments from the Governor and the Supreme Court, could create an unhealthy situation, of conflicting interests. The potential exists for using legislative salaries in political bargaining situations among the three branches of government.

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Policy of School Record Access Set at Genesee

The Genesee School District release of pupil records policy establishes the rights of parents and eligible students to have access to their children's school records, limits the disclosure of personally identifiable information from the school records without consent, and provides an opportunity for a hearing to challenge information contained to school records. Students 18 years of age, married, or attending a post secondary institution may exercise these rights on his/her behalf.

The term "record" is interpreted to mean identifying data, academic work completed, level of achievement, attendance data, test scores, teacher rating, health data, and family background information.

Parents and eligible students who want access to records should contact the building principal to arrange a conference.

The complete release of pupil records policy may be reviewed in the Board Policy Handbook 350.2 page 15-15.2 on file in the school library and administrative offices.

Speak outs will be held throughout the state for gathering information from patrons regarding proposed changes in Idaho's present graduation requirements. The speak out for our area will be Thursday, Sept. 30 at 8 p. m. in the Upper Student Lounge, Lewiston Senior High School 3317 12th Street, Lewiston, Idaho.

It is hoped that the people of our area will take advantage of this opportunity to share in helping formulate the graduation requirements for Idaho students.
