**Personal Income Up Says Bank Report**

Total personal income will experience a strong rise in Idaho in 1976 according to the quarterly First Security Bank News Letter being distributed this week, says James Hoogland, Jr. and Stanley Merrill, managers of the First Security Bank of Kendrick and First Security Bank of Genesee. Dr. Kelly K. Matthews, vice president and economist, is the editor of the News Letter.

Total personal income in Idaho in 1976 is estimated to reach \$4.785 billion, an increase of \$551 million, or 13 percent above the 1975 total reported by the U. S. Department of Commerce.

This forecast is based on data available through the first 9 months of the year plus an estimate for the last three months.

After correction for inflation and the decreased purchasing power of the dollar, real personal income in Idaho in 1976 will have increased approximately 7 1/2 percent.

Wages and salaries and other labor income are expected to total nearly \$3 billion in 1976, an increase of 13.1 percent. The growth rate represents an employment increase of 4 to 5 percent and an average increase in wages of 7 to 8 percent.

At this level, total wages, salaries and other labor income in 1976 would represent 62 percent of total personal income.

Net farm income is expected to show a moderate increase following the sharp reduction experienced in 1975.

Nationally, economic activity, after a sluggish summer, began to improve near the end of the third quarter. Retail sales and residential construction showed marked improvement, while production and employment continued to expand at a respectable rate.

Favorable business conditions are expected to persist throughout the fourth quarter and into 1977.

Real Gross National Product, the value of all final goods and services purchased, after the impact of inflation has been removed, increased at an estimated annual rate of 4 1/2 percent in the third quarter. Improved levels of consumer and business spending are expected to strengthen the tempo of economic activity in the fourth quarter and into 1977.

Other business indicators reported in the News Letter include industrial production, which increased at a moderate pace in the third quarter. Consumer and business spending have experienced a pause, but consumer spending began to rise again in August. Although the lackluster trend in business spending has not followed suit, a recent capital spending survey reveals that there will be a rather solid expansion late this year or early in 1977.

The basic rate of inflation at the retail level remained generally stable in the third quarter, increasing about 6 percent at an annual rate. Little change in the current inflationary pattern is anticipated in the fourth quarter or into the early months of 1977.

Wholesale prices slipped downward in August, as sharply declining food prices continued to check relatively big gains in the wholesale price of industrial gains.





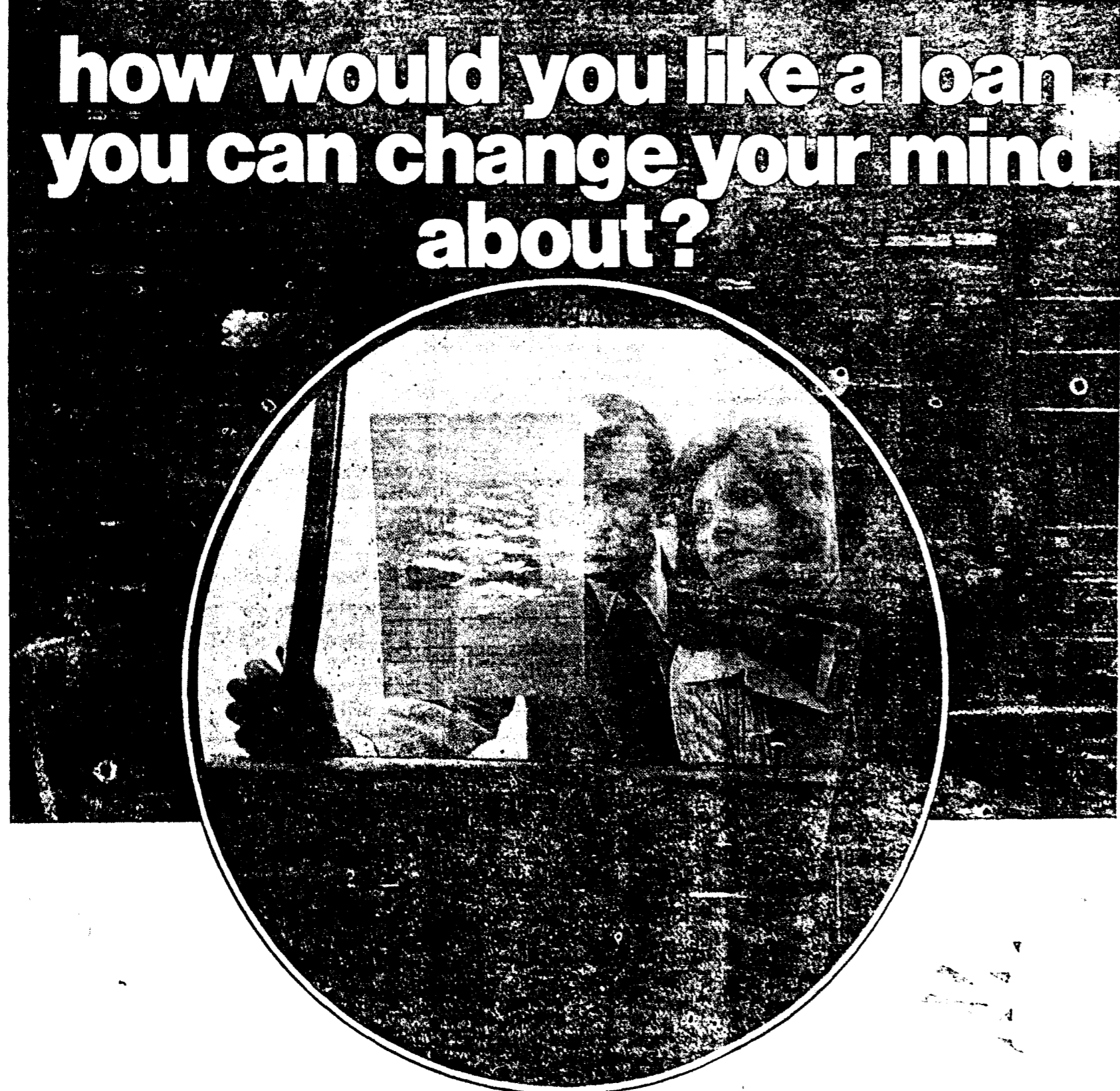

**READING PROGRAM**

One of the needs identified by the Elementary School Needs Assessment Study last year was that of placing more emphasis on basic skills for students. Since reading is the foundation upon which all academic success is built it is extremely important to begin early in establishing strength in basic reading skills for all students.

At the beginning of the year the teaching staff established as their number one goal the improvement of the reading ability of students in our district. We are aware that some students are many grade levels behind in their reading and we are concentrating our efforts to help these individuals improve their reading skills. Because of the wide range and different degree of severity in the reading disabilities of those identified students it is difficult to predict the progress that can be made on the improvement of their reading skills. Some students will advance rapidly with only a small amount of additional help. Others will show little or no progress regardless of the amount of individual attention given them.

Presently 24 students are in the Title I Supplementary Reading Program at the elementary school. This represents 16% of the elementary students that are one or more grade levels behind in reading. All of these students receive regular classroom instruction in reading and also work in small groups at their own reading level for 20-40 minutes per day with Mrs. Fries in the Resource Room. In addition 22 (7%) students are presently in the Special Education program at the Elementary and Secondary level. The majority of these students have learning disabilities in reading. Each of these students work in the Resource Room for 1/2 hour to 1 1/2 hours per day with Mr. McKinnon at the elementary level and Mrs. Potter at the secondary level on an individual or small group basis. Each of these Special Education teachers also work with the teachers to provide materials and suggested methods for allowing these Special Ed. students to work at their own level in the classroom so that they may progress at a rate that is consistent with their ability.

I feel that our present reading program and the training and ability of our teachers to implement the program is exceptional. 1 to 1 1/2 hours per day are devoted to formal reading. Students are ability grouped and the program is ungraded in structure. Every teacher meets with 3 to 4 reading groups each day. In addition 1-2 hours per day is spent on related reading activities in the areas of phonics, spelling, writing and language skills. The average S.R.A. reading scores in grade 1-8 are well above the national averages. However, we are well aware that we must focus our energies on those students who show deficiencies in reading without depriving the average or above average readers the attention required for them to realize their own potential.
