Both clinics are planned for 12-4 p.m. High risk individuals are those 65 years old and over 18 years of age with chronic lung, heart, and kidney disease and those with dia-

The vaccines used in the Swine Flu program are two in number, For the high-risk individuals, the vaccine is a combination of Swine Flu and lation, the vaccine contains only Swine Flu. These vaccines have been extensively tested in field trials and have been demonstrated to be safe, to produce side reactions in only a small number of individuals, and to receiving the immunization.

Some conditions individuals might have which would prevent receiving the immunization are:





The following are the proposed Constitutional Amendments to be voted on at the next General Election to be held November 2, 1976.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS To vote on the following, mark a cross in the square at the right of "Yes" or

S. J. R. No. 109 "Shall Section 3, Article VIII, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho, be amended to allow cities and political subdivisions to issue revenue bonds for the purpose of rehabilisating existing electrical generating facilities, when approved by a majority of the electors voting in favor of the bonds?"

#### LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL'S STATEMENT OF MEANING AND PURPOSE S. J. R. No. 109

The purpose of this proposed amendment to Section 3, Article VIII, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho is to allow cities and other political subdivisions to rehabilitate existing electrical generating facilities which are owned and operated by that city or subdivision. In order to initially raise the money for the rehabilitation work, revenue bonds could be issued, after these bonds have been approved by the majority vote of the taxpayers in the city or political subdivision. The revenue bonds would be retired by the revenues collected from the sale of electrical

The adoption of this proposed amendment would clarify the constitutional and statutory authority of cities and political subdivisions to rehabilitate existing electrical generating facilities through the use of revenue bonds.

#### Statements FOR the proposed amendment:

1. Cities and political subdivisions which own and operate their own electrical generating systems should have the ability to keep these facilities in good repair.

2. The citizens of the several cities in Idaho who have invested in municipally owned power systems need the continuing authority to make the major repairs to that system in order to protect the citizens' investments.

3. It simply isn't good business to allow cities to make substantial investments in electrical generating facilities and then not allow them to keep these facilities in efficient operating condi-

#### Statements AGAINST the proposed amendment:

1. This proposed amendment is special interest legislation involving only a limited number of cities in the state. It is proposed that this special interest constitutional amendment be approved when other possible avenues have not been exhausted. Essentially the same improvements could be accomplished through the approval of general obligation bonds by a two-thirds majority of the people in the affected area. However, this has not been attempted.

2. Approval of this amendment would allow revenue bonds, with the approval of a majority of the voters in the affected area, to compete on the bond market with bonds of other governmental units throughout the country. As the funds available are limited, this could make it more diffcult to sell other bonds and potentially increase interest rates for such bonds.

H. J. R. No. 6

"Shall Section 23, Article III, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended by striking the provision of ten dollars per day and ten cents per mile travel allowance and providing that the legislature shall have no author-Ity to establish its salary but to authorize a citizens committee on Legislative compensation to establish the rate of compensation and expenses, subject to rejection or reduction by the Legislature; provided that no change in the rate of compensation shall apply to the Legislature then in office except as provided in this Section?

#### LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL'S STATEMENT OF MEANING AND PURPOSE

H. J. R. No. 6 The purpose of this proposed amendment to Section 23, Article III, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho is to remove the present provisions for a salary of ten dollars per day, limited to sixty days, and ten cents per mile travel allowance for members of the Legislature, and to authorize a citizens committee on legislative compensation to recommend the rate of compensation and expenses for legislative service. The rate established by the committee would be in effect unless reduced or rejected by the Legislature; but, the Legislature could not increase the rate.

If adopted, this amendment would remove the fixed amount of compensation found in the Constutition and direct establishment of a citizens committee composed of six persons. The committee would be authorized to study legislative compensation and recommend a rate deemed responsible by the committee. The Legislature would be authorized to reject or reduce the amount established by the committee, but could not increase the salary or expenses. Members of the committee would be appointed by the Governor and the Supreme Court, but no person could serve who holds public office to which compensation was attached.

#### Statements FOR the proposed amendment:

1. Legislative compensation is presently established at \$10 per day, limited to 60 days for a regular session and 20 days for a special session. This rate was established in 1946, and can only be changed by constitutional amendment. It is unrealistic to bind the Legislature in 1976 or some future Legislature to a figure established 30 years or more ago. The rate of inflation, the changing needs of our society, and the demands placed upon members of the Legislature argue for greater flexibility in establishing the rate of compensation.

2. H.J.R. 6 would remove authority to increase rates of legislative compensation from the realm of the Legislature. In the past, legislators have been very conservative in providing an adequate expense allowance, but even then have been open to the charge that they are adopting Legislation with a direct personal interest. The provisions of this amendment would remove the initial salary review from legislative bands and

return them to the people. 3. The present provisions of the Constitution have led to use of an expense allowance. While the salary is firmly established, the Legislature has followed the trend in other states and has provided an expense allowance to make up some of the difference between the salary and the actual cost of serving. While expense allowances have been held to be completely legal, it would be better to establish a clear public record of compensation for legislative service.

4. Most proponents believe that the will result in increased compensation for legislators, and approve of this because of the belief that persons should be able to serve in the Legislature without undue hardship. While legislative service should not become a highly paid government position, compensation should be established at such a rate as to allow a true cross section of Idaho citizens to serve. Only when all persons are eligible can Idaho claim to have a true citizens Legislature.

5. The citizens committee created by this proposal is removed from the political arena by providing that no member may be a current office holder. The citizens of Idaho can have confidence that this committee, composed of persons like themselves, will be representative of Idaho thinking.

#### Statements AGAINST the proposed amendment:

1. Legislative service is among the most cherished of the rights of cithrens. Election to the Legislature was never intended to be lucrative, as indicated by the fact that the framers of the Constitution placed specific limits upon salary. The rewards of public service are the honor, dignity and public respect which attach to the office. Such rewards cannot be measured in dollars and cents, but are evidenced by the desire to serve one's fellow man.

2. Unlimited increases in compensation may eventually result in salary levels which attract persons to the Legislature merely for the monetary rewards attached to the office. A professional Legislature would mean little representation for the average citizen.

3. Creation of a compensation committee is designed to remove the responsibility for controlling legislative expenses from the Legislature. The Legislature deems itself competent to establish the budget of the entire state, and establish the rate of compensation of every other state employee. It is inconsistent that they should then attempt to delegate to others the responsibility for recommendations on legislative compensation.

4. The proposed amendment moves future salary levels one more step beyond the control of the people. Rates will be recommended by an appointed committee. Persons appointed to committees do not have the approval of the people which is derived only by elec-

5. The establishment of a citizens committee, with appointments from the Governor and the Supreme Court, could create an unbealthy situation of conflicting interests. The potential exists for using legislative salaries in political bargaining situations among the three branches of government.

### IDAHO DEPT. OF EMPLOYMENT

New job listings increased slight ly during the past week in the Moscow area. cow area. Frank Hartstein, Mos-cow office manager for the Idaho Department of Employment, said that his office received calls for 26 workers during the week compared with 21 during the previous week. During the middle week of October a year ago only 8 new jobs were listed with his office. Hartstein said that 21 persons were given job find-ing help, down one from the week before, but more than double the number of persons placed on jobs during the same week in 1975. At the end of the week there were still 19 jobs available in the area. These included sales clerks, auto service station attendants, cooks waitresses, both food and cocktail, farm tractor oper-

ator, and domestic workers. The number of persons filing unemployment insurance claims continues to dwindle according to another part of Hartstein's weekly report. He said only 264 persons are continuing to file claims in the area. This is down just slightly from the 271 of a week ago, but considerably fewer than the 334 claims that were curtent a year ago. Only 20 persons filed new claims during the week, half of the number filing the previous week and less than half of the 53 who filed new claims during the same week last year.





## 'Principal's Corner'—

By Bill Tracy 

READING PROGRAM

One of the needs identified by the Elementary School Needs Assessment Study last year was that of placing more emphasis on basic skills for students. Since reading is the foundation upon which all academic success is built it is extremely important to begin early in establishing strength in basic reading skills for all stu-

At the beginning of the year the teaching staff established as their number one goal the improvement of the reading ability of students in our district. We are aware that some students are many grade levels hehind in their reading and we are concentrating our efforts to help these individuals improve their reading skills. Because of the wide range and different degree of severity in the reading disabilities of those iden-tified students it is difficult to predict the progress that can be made on the improvement of their reading skills. Some students will advance rapidly with only a small amount of additional help. Others will show little or no progress regardless of the amount of individual attention given

Presently 24 students are in the Title I Supplementary Reading Program at the elementary school. This represents 16% of the elementary students that are one or more grade levels behind in reading. All of these students receive regular classroom instruction in reading and also work in small groups at their own reading level for 20-40 minutes per day with Mrs. Fries in the Resource Room. In addition 22 (7%) students are presently in the Special Education program at the Elementary and Secondary level. The majority of these students have learning disabilities in reading. Each of these students work in the Resource Room for 1/2 hour to 1½ hours per day with Mr. McKinnon at the elementary level and Mrs. Potter at the secondary level on an individual or small group basis. Each of these Special Education teachers also work with the teachers to provide materials and suggested methods for allowing these Special Ed. students to work at their own level in the classroom so that they may progress at a rate that is consistent with heir abiliy.

I feel that our present reading pro-

gram and the training and ability of our teachers to implement the program is exceptional. 1 to 11/2 hours per day are devoted to formal read-ing.
