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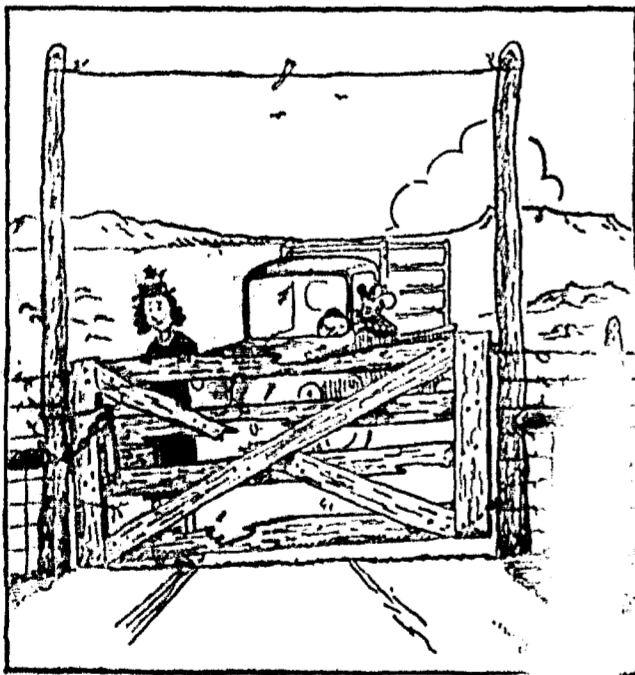

**Hunters Stew**

**Hot Dish—Very Good—**  
1/2 pound hamburger, seasoned  
1 sliced onion  
1/2 cup chopped celery  
1/2 cup sliced carrots  
6 sliced potatoes  
1 can tomato soup  
1 can water  
Brown hamburger. Put in roaster, add onions, then layer carrots, celery and potatoes.  
Blend soup and water.  
Pour over mixture and mix slightly.  
Bake 2 1/2 hours at 350 degrees.  
Turn down and bake until done.

**Cookies**

very good—3-4 dozen  
1 cup butter or margarine, softened  
2 cups sugar  
4 cups flour  
1 tsp. soda  
1 tsp. baking powder  
1/2 cup lemon juice  
1/4 tsp. salt  
1/2 cup buttermilk  
1/2 tsp. nutmeg  
1 egg  
In a large bowl, beat butter and 1 1/2 cups sugar until creamy. Add egg, lemon juice. Beat at medium speed until fluffy.  
Combine flour, baking powder, soda, salt. Mix well. Add to lemon juice alternately with butter milk. Blend until moistened.  
Drop by teaspoon onto ungreased cookie sheet.  
Combine 2 tbl. sugar and nutmeg. Wet bottom of glass in water. Dip in sugar mixture and flatten cookies slightly with sugar-coated glass.  
Bake 375 d. 10-15 minutes or until golden brown.

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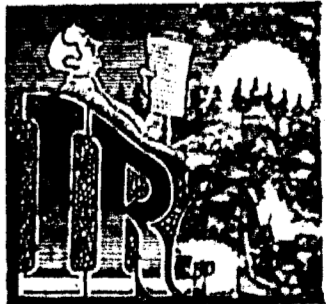

**The Kendrick School 'Principal's Corner'**

**School Vandalism**

At the risk of providing a few students with the publicity and recognition they are probably seeking, I feel compelled to respond to the recent wave of malicious mischief at the high school. Since November 1st, the windows at the high school have been waxed three times. After each cleaning, the misguided individuals feel it is necessary to repeat their defacement of public property and at the same time slander students and staff with their profane scribbles. In addition to these attacks on the school, three faculty members, including myself, have had their personal vehicles vandalized.

This kind of destructive behavior reflects only the worst upon our student body, school and community. What impressions do visitors and parents leave with when they come to our school and see the graffiti plastered on the windows? How willing are teachers to advise, sponsor, chaperone or attend student activities if their car is in jeopardy of being sabotaged.

Those who reinforce this kind of behavior and protect the guilty individuals, are doing them a grave injustice. They do not need or deserve this kind of encouragement. I personally have little compassion for those few who willfully and deliberately seek to destroy the personal and public property of others. I disagree with the adage that "kids will be kids". Kids will be what we want, expect and insist that they should be.

**High Attendance Reports**

I am very pleased with the attendance our students have exhibited so far this year. We have had a total of 94.74% present in the entire district since the beginning of the school year. This breaks down to 94.89% present for the elementary school (K-8) and 94.60% present for the Jr.-Sr. high school. The staff and I constantly stress to students the importance of maintaining regular attendance as well as being responsible for getting to class on time. Besides enhancing their academic achievement, good attendance at school, I feel, is directly responsible for the dependability that is desirable for any employee in the world of work.

Some of our students and their parents have yet to understand our concern over poor attendance. We feel it's important for kids to come to school and we want the parents to share this attitude with us. It is very discouraging for us when students return from an absence with notes from their parents like the following:

"Johnny had to go shopping yesterday."

"Bob went to town to buy a pair of basketball shoes today so he wouldn't have to miss practice tonight."

"Susie had to get her hair done for her senior pictures."

"Jack got a haircut yesterday so he could play ball."

"Jane went to town to buy a dress for the dance tonight."

Excuses for babysitting, hunting, and being needed at home are also quite common. If we could eliminate absences for reasons like the above, I feel we could further improve upon our attendance record. I want to thank the majority of our students and parents who believe, like we, that coming to school is very important.

**Sensory Delight**

There are four women in our schools who are the popular employees in the district. They come to work each and every morning and begin creating their masterpiece for the day. Their success is measured by the taste and smell receptors of the students and staff. They haven't failed us yet in providing a well-balanced, nutritious and tasty meal at noon. I am speaking of course about our cooks, Helen Fey, Ode Draper, Jean Clemenhagen and Irene Thornton. These gals are as energetic and personable as any group of people one can find. It is apparent that they enjoy their work and we appreciate the job they do. By the way, Thanksgiving dinner at school was terrific.

22,000 lbs. and it made beautiful music. Next was the Cypress Gardens with its oak trees hanging with Spanish moss, exotic shrubs, flowers of both domestic and imported. Another boat ride into the jungle was made. They also enjoyed a water show starring Elvis Presley. A feature of the show was 9 water skiers on one ski at one time.

This was a two-hour show which also featured the Human Kite Flyers. Two of them were pulled around the lake and then were landed on the beach in front of the grandstand.

Here at St. Petersburg, the Wolffs met a nephew, Steve Wilson, Stewart Wilson's grandson, and his wife. Steve is serving a four-year term in the Air Force and they spent both evenings with the Parks and Wolffs. All enjoyed dinner at the Kopee Tree restaurant, a very elaborate place with a garden and fountain.

They also saw the Ringling Bros. Museums.

The Reptile show featured a long-yellow snake so tame people could touch it. It is said these snakes eat mice and other rodents and are protected by law. An exhibition showing how fast and far a rattlesnake could strike was also very interesting.

From Florida the next stop was Alabama and the Warm Spring pool there was a large glass swim pool containing 5 "mermaid" who drank pop under water, talked by phone and one dived to a depth of 117 feet.

Mobile, Alabama lived under 7 different flags. Some of the old houses with all the iron lace trim were the big attraction. The city is in the process of restoring them. The oak trees make an arch over the streets and provided cooling shade for the homes before air conditioning. Here the Mayor of Mobile came and welcomed the group and saw that the members of the tour received the best of treatment, including a ticket to a night club. It was the biggest welcome the travelers received.

Bellingrath Gardens was fabulous—the house and grounds were built by the inventor of Coca Cola. The house was furnished with imported China, silver and gold table services from France and rugs from all parts of the world. The gardens contain some 40 acres of lake and the walls and gardens contain flowers of all kinds.

Three days were spent in New Orleans with its narrow streets of the French Quarter, the oldest part of the city. They took a boat ride up the Mississippi on a stern-wheeler, which was a large ship with two decks, a dining room, bar, dance floor and knick knack shop. The tour covered 25 miles and the group freighters from Russia and Japan; one unloading steel and one loading out wheat. There were 20 ships at anchor in the harbor and the River was at its lowest ebb in history.

Through the Red River Valley it was farming country and oil refineries operated by Shell Oil. Much of this was land made by digging the land out and making lakes and building on the resulting land—you had a home with a water front.

At Baton Rouge they crossed the Mississippi again seeing sugar cane fields, oil refineries and some soy bean and corn fields.

In Texas there were oil fields and gas fields to be seen on the way to Dallas. They crossed into New Mexico to tour the Carlsbad Caverns. That took them down 800 feet. They were down under the ground for 3 hours and when they came to the surface

in it was snowing. Three inches of snow covered the ground and the next morning, in El Paso, there was 6 inches of snow cover and the bus didn't get highway clearance until 11 o'clock. Travel was difficult because of the icy roads.

The trip through Mesa, Phoenix and on to Las Vegas was made in snow and darkness. A stop was made at Hoover Dam and then on to Arizona and out on the Nevada side.

Las Vegas, Carson City and Reno are all noted for slot machines and gambling—the doors of these places never shut.

At Klamath Falls, Oregon the tour had its farewell dinner and the Parks and Wolffs left the tour at Bend and came back to Boise.

The tour lasted 34 days. Two days were spent in Boise before returning home.
