Cherry Salad Supreme
 1—3-oz pkg. raspberry gelatin
 1—21 oz. can cherry pie filling
 1—3 oz. pkg. lemon gelatin
 1—3 oz. pkg. cream cheese
 1/3 cup salad dressing or mayonnaise
 1—8 3/4 oz. crushed pineapple

Dissolve raspberry gelatin in 1 cup boiling water, stir in pie filling. Turn into 9x9x2-in. baking dish. Chill till partially set. Dissolve lemon jello in 1 cup boiling water. Beat together cheese and salad dressing. Gradually add lemon jello. Stir in pineapple. Whip 1/2 cup whipping cream, fold in lemon mixture with 1 cup tiny marshmallows. Spread on top cherry layer. Top with 2 tbls. chopped nuts. Chill till set. 12 servings.

Oatmeal Molasses Bread
 2 loaves—very good

Stir together in mixing bowl—
 1 1/2 cups water
 1 cup rolled oats (quick)
 1/3 cup shortening
 1/2 cup molasses
 1 tbls. salt
 Cool to lukewarm

Combine stirring to dissolve—
 2 pkg. yeast cake
 1/2 cup warm water (not hot 110-115 d)
 Stir into luke warm oatmeal mixture. Mix well, add two eggs; 5 1/2 cups of flour and mix well. Knead—cover. Let stand 15 minutes. Place dough in 2 greased 8x5x3 pans. Let rise in warm place (85d) until double.

Bake until brown 350d. 1 hour.

**For Safe Driving—
Prepare for Winter**

It is too late to think about winter preparedness when you are stalled or stuck or perhaps stranded. Winter has a habit of catching people unprepared according to Wayne Fisher, U/I Cooperative Extension Service. The Safety Specialist points out four areas of winter emphasis.

(1)—Have Your Vehicle Ready—winterized; dependable tires and battery; lights, wipers, and defrosters that "are working"; exhaust system in first class condition; refill the fuel tank when half empty.

(2)—Carry Safety Items in Every Vehicle—plastic ice scraper and snow brush; tools, (at least) pliers, screwdriver, and adjustable wrench; shovel; tire chains (even if the vehicle has studded snow tires); battery booster cables; tow chain or webbing (20 ft.); sack of sand (not excessive amount); highway flares.

Only Carry Extra Gasoline In An Extreme Emergency—using a heavy metal can, three-fourths full and tightly capped. Escaping gasoline fumes in your car's trunk could explode with the force of several sticks of dynamite.

(3)—Adjust Your Speed and Driving Procedures According to road Conditions—Excessive speed for road conditions causes many winter mishaps. Take time, allowing for conditions. Know how to control your vehicle. Stop and start carefully. A heavy foot adds to the problems. Calmly pumping the brakes in an emergency will stop you quicker. Also gradual acceleration will help you get going

more easily. Remember if skidding, turn the steering wheel in the direction of the skid even when the vehicle is headed off the road.

(4)—Make Extra Preparation Before You Cross Open Country—Have a "survival kit" in the car in case you get stranded. Your local Extension Office can supply you with recommendations for a survival kit or write Box 300, Boise, Idaho, 83701. Another open country caution is to "know before you go." Listen to weather reports and if not sure of safety, check with the Highway Patrol. When on the road keep in touch with someone at home and with other motorists. C. E. or personal contact at a service station will help you find a travel contact. Don't travel at an unsafe speed to "keep up" and don't tailgate. Travel only close enough together to know all is A-O. K.

Winter travel is hazardous especially during holidays. Extra care, planning and preparation will help you avoid many inconveniences and the possible consequences of a motor vehicle mishap.

If you are on foot, and in a hurry, remember this—If there is no pedestrian signal, wait for a break in traffic before trying to cross, especially if you can't move very fast! Never underestimate the speed of a vehicle approaching your intended path of travel. This reminder from the Idaho Traffic Safety Commission.



**The Kendrick School
'Principal's Corner'**

Discipline Report—
Disciplinary cases at the Jr.-Sr. High School for October and November are listed below. The thirty-three disciplinary problems for the past two months bring the total for the year to fifty-six at the secondary level.

1. Skipping classes and/or leaving school grounds without permission—six students.
2. Destroying or defacing school property—three students.
3. Severe classroom disturbances—thirteen students.
4. Use of profanity in classroom—three students.
5. Fighting at school—5 students.
6. Smoking on school grounds—1 student.
7. Truancy—two students.

Parents were notified in writing in all of the above cases stating the offense and the action taken. In addition, many parents were telephoned and conferences with the parents of six students were held to help resolve the disciplinary problem of their child. Five students were detained after school for two hours, four students were suspended from school from one to three days for more severe disciplinary reasons.

For every disciplinary referral that reaches my office, one to three hours of administrative time is necessary to confer with the referring teacher, counsel with the student, write a discipline notice to parents, telephone and/or hold conference with the parents and see that disciplinary action is carried out. As one can see a tremendous amount of time is necessary to modify the behavior of a few individuals. Eight students represent more than a third of the fifty-six disciplinary cases referred this year at the secondary level.

At the Elementary school the following disciplinary cases were reported to the principal's office for October and November.

1. Fighting—four students.
 2. Misbehavior on the playground—one student.
- Parents were notified in writing of their child's misconduct. A spanking was administered to one student. All students were counseled with and strongly encouraged to change their behavior.

Equal Time for Good Students—
I want to emphasize that the vast majority of the students in our District are good kids and are extremely willing to perform and behave in a manner which compliments the school and community. Ninety-nine percent of our students strive to maintain high academic standards, good attendance, and are seldom, if ever, a discipline problem. This is very encouraging in a time when Americans feel that discipline is the number one problem in our schools.
When more than fifty percent of our secondary students earn a 3.0 grade point average ('B' average) or better for the first quarter, when only five percent of our students are absent each day, and when discipline cases are restricted to mostly a few repeat offenders, we have to be proud of our kids.
