Reminded of Dog Licenses

Eugene Taylor, a member of the Juliaetta City Council, reminded pet owners in that city that dog licenses on all animals kept within the city limits are now due for the year 1977 and may be purchased at the Juliaetta City Hall.

License fees are \$2.50 for males and spayed females and \$5.00 for unspayed female dogs. The fee will double after February 1, Taylor noted.

In addition, the license tag must be attached to the animal. Any dog found roaming at large without a tag will be presumed to be untagged and may be picked up and disposed of in accordance with city ordinances. Taylor further reminded residents that Juliaetta has a full-time leash law which prohibits animals from roaming unattended, day or night, 365 days a year. It is also unlawful for other animals such as chickens, geese, etc., to run free.

"Some people say, 'don't you want kids to own a dog,' Taylor said Tuesday morning referring to the city's leash and licensing laws. "But that just isn't the case. Licensing and leash laws are as much for the animal's protection as it is to prevent the dogs from becoming a nuisance," he said. The city feels that if parents want their child to have a pet, then it is their responsibility to see that the pet is cared for. Licensing is one method of making certain that an animal's ownership is acknowledged and the responsibility for that animal is established.

PLANNING SAFE HOLIDAY TRIPS

While most of Idaho has been enjoying a mild winter so far, motorists planning to drive over Idaho's mountain passes in the weeks ahead are urged by the Idaho Division of Highways to plan ahead for safe trips during the Christmas and New Years holiday season.

Five major passes are open the year around, barring adverse weather and road conditions that could cause them to be closed temporarily. The passes that are normally well-maintained during the winter are Lookout, Lofo, Lost Trail, Monida, and Targhee.

All of these passes are on major routes into the State of Montana and generally cross the Bitterroot Range of the Continental Divide.

Some Idaho's ten mountain passes, Thompson, Glidden, Lemhi, Banrock and Teton Pass on the Gem State's eastern border, are considered secondary or unimproved roads and could be closed at any time during inclement weather.

Freezing temperatures, severe storms, too much snow and poor visibility can create dangerous driving conditions. Maintenance crews with snow removal and sanding equipment move in as soon as possible and try to quickly clear paths for vehicles to get through.

No matter where motorists drive throughout the State over the holidays, it is wise to ride on a safe set of tires, and to be prepared to put on tire chains when the "Warning . . . chains advised beyond this point when road is snow covered or icy" signs are posted. Even in areas where signs are not posted, drivers should watch out for possible slides, rolling rocks, ice and snow on the roadways and for possible delays caused by traffic congestion.

Drivers are also warned to be alert for Division of Highways maintenance crews working with slow-moving sanding and snow removal equipment, particularly in winding mountain road areas.

Before driving over Idaho's higher passes this winter, motorists should telephone one of the Division of Highways District offices to obtain the latest mountain pass road condition reports. Cities and telephone numbers include: Coeur d'Alene--687-4101 Lewiston--748-3005

BOOKS-BY-MAIL PROGRAM

As of January 1, the Books-by-mail program of the North Central Idaho Regional Library System will be operating from the Moscow branch of the Moscow-Latah County Library System. The Books-by-Mail service has been headquartered since 1971 at the Nez Perce Library, but the Regional Library System Board voted recently to contract with Moscow-Latah County Library for this service because of the current internal problem experienced by the Lewiston-Nez Perce Library. Another factor in this decision was that the people served by the Moscow-Latah County Library currently utilize 75 per cent of the Books-by-Mail program.

The Books-by-Mail program is one of the major services provided by the North Central Idaho Regional Library System, a state funded cooperative of libraries in a six-county area from Riggins north through Benewah County. The System is administered by a Board made up of representatives from the local library boards of the ten participating libraries. Anyone living in an area served by one of these participating libraries is eligible to receive Books-by-Mail.

The Books-by-Mail program is designed to serve people already paying library taxes but who can not utilize library service because of transportation problems, health problems or geographical location. It is entirely free of extra charges with all mailing costs paid by the North Central Idaho Regional Library System.

"We will be sending out monthly catalogs to users," said Moscow librarian Gloria Gehrman, "and can include current fiction, nonfiction, paperbacks, a kids' insert, and special surprises. We will be polling current users to what they most want to see."

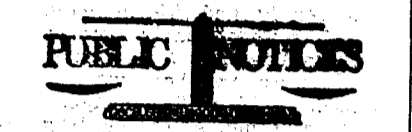

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IDAHO RULES LISTED FOR FIREARMS USE

Many persons in Idaho know what they must do to get a rifle, shotgun or pistol but questions coming to the Department of Fish and Game indicate they aren't sure about what's legal and illegal about using the firearm.

The department has put together a leaflet on the 10 basic regulations covering the use of firearms. They are summarized this way:

—Any person carrying an unlicensed rifle or shotgun in the field must have a valid hunting license with him. An exception to this rule is a person taking predatory animals on his own land.

—Children under 12 cannot buy a hunting license, so they cannot legally carry firearms while in the field.

—The use of any .22 caliber firearm shooting rimfire cartridges is prohibited on any game animals except cottontail or pygmy rabbits.

—A rifle or pistol cannot be used to hunt upland game birds or waterfowl. Exceptions to this rule are the regulations for the early chukar season, forest grouse and turkeys.

—Automatic rifles (those firing continuously on the depression of the trigger) may not be used in hunting but the semiautomatic rifle is legal.

—Shotguns may be used to hunt any big game animals. Use of buckshot, slugs or ball in shotguns is recommended. Shotgun shells longer than 3 1/2 inches to hunt game birds is illegal.

—Migratory waterfowl must be hunted with a shotgun not larger than a 10-gauge and incapable of holding more than three shells.

—Handguns (larger than .22 caliber rimfire) may be used to hunt big game.

—It is unlawful to hunt, shoot or kill game birds or animals from a boat, aircraft, automobile or other mechanically powered vehicle.

—It is unlawful to shoot from or across a public road.

—Enjoy life a little more by taking a walk around your home town. Remember as you walk, to cross only at corners or in marked crosswalks. This reminder from the Idaho Traffic Safety Commission.

F&G QUESTIONS 'CRITICAL' GRIZZLY AREAS

The Department of Fish and Game went on record this week in opposition to designating areas of the Selway-Bitterroot Wilderness as "critical grizzly bear habitat."

In a public hearing in St. Anthony, Lloyd Oldenburg, game research supervisor for the department, read a statement that also questioned three other areas in Idaho already proposed for the "critical" classification.

The statement says the areas already designated leave too many unanswered questions about future management:

"What priorities are to be established regarding use of a critical area? At what point is the determination made that the population density of grizzly bear is optimum? Who makes this decision and on what criteria is the decision based? What effect does critical habitat designation have on fishing, hiking and hunting of other species, including so-called look-alike species?"

"To date these questions have not been answered, and we urge that the effect of 'critical' designation be clearly defined" before the designations are made, Oldenburg said.

Two of the areas designated critical habitat are in the Panhandle National Forest. One area is in the

Targhee National Forest. The Selway-Bitterroot area was mentioned in the November 5 Federal Register as under study for future inclusion.

The department recommended that the three areas already designated be given "consideration as critical habitat if, and only if, it is a legal requirement that the designation be made now."

The department urged the Secretary of Interior to "comply with rules and regulations of the Endangered Species Act of 1973," rules that call for a "decision based on the best scientific and commercial data available to him."

First Aid for Frostbite

In first aid for frostbite, forget about rubbing the affected part with snow, suggests the Idaho Medical Association.

Forget also the completely invalid caution against rapid thawing. Do not massage or rub the frozen part. In fact, don't touch it at all.

True frostbite means that tissues are frozen. Crystals of ice form between the cells. Nerves, muscles, and blood vessel tissues are most susceptible.

The wind plays an important part in frostbite. The chilling effect of air at 20 degrees moving at 45 miles an hour is the same as 40-below-zero air on a still day.

Often one does not feel frostbite. Someone else may notice that your nose or ear is turning white. The frozen part becomes hard to the touch and loses feeling.

To prevent frostbite, dress for the temperature. Avoid overexertion and excessive perspiration. Avoid contact of bare flesh with cold metal. Do not smoke or drink alcohol.

When frostbite occurs, begin re-warming as soon as possible. A hot bath is excellent, but avoid scalding. Hot wet towels, changed frequently and applied gently, will help. If no fire or hot water is available, place the victim in a sleeping bag or cover him or her with coats and blankets. Hot liquids help raise body temperatures.

Even for a mild case, prompt medical attention is important. The depth and degree of the frozen tissue cannot be readily ascertained, and treatment will vary with the severity of the injury.

Most cases of frostbite can be avoided with proper dress and the exercise of common sense about exposure in severe cold.

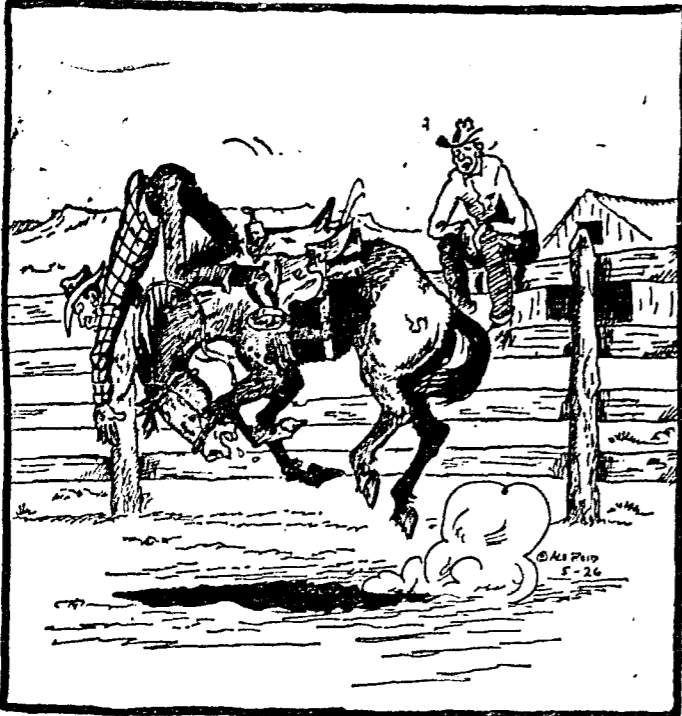

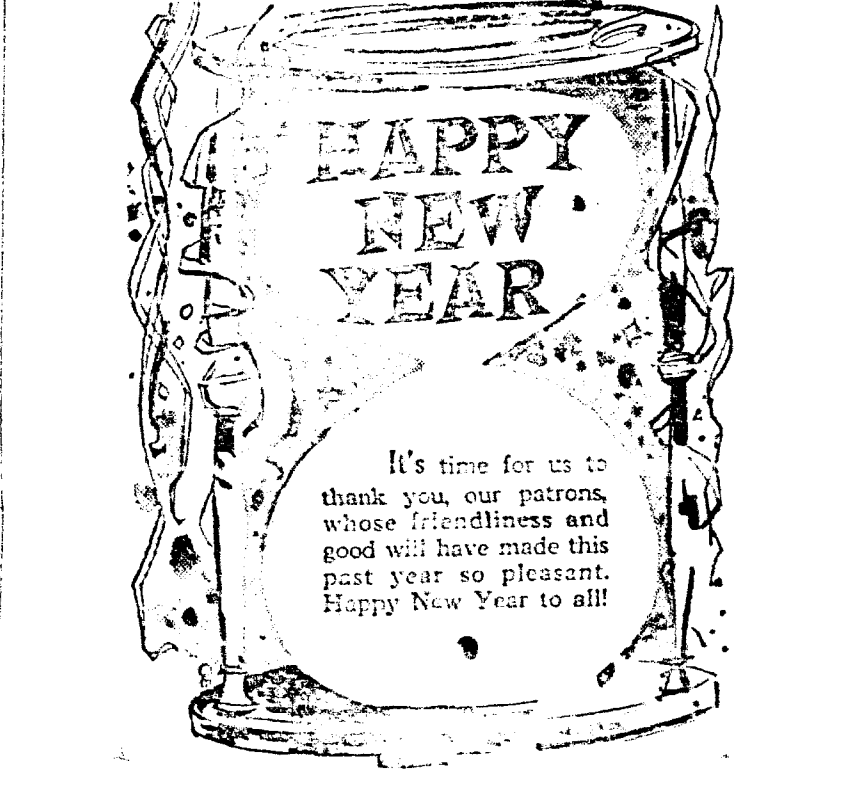

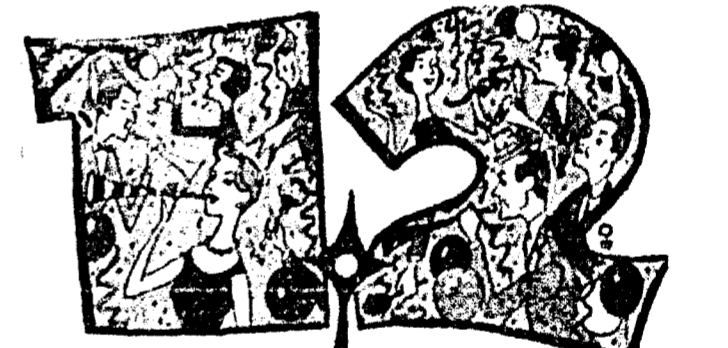
