Forage Tests Called Key to More Profit

Clifton Anderson

Assistant Agricultural Editor Twin Falls-A small amount of time spent in collecting hay samples can bring increased profits to livestock producers this winter, according to Dr. H. R. Gueunthner, U/I extension agronomist.

"When your hay has been tested for quality, you are able to provide a balanced ration for your animals," Guenthner said.

County agents of the U/I Extenson Service will explain forage-testing procedures, the extension agronomist said.

"For most purposes, it will be sufficient to get an analysis of dry matter and crude protein," he said. "For dairy herds and other high-energy rations, it is helpful to also know the amount of phosphorus, potassium, calcium, magnesium, and other com-

The laboratories which analyze forage samples need to have a representative sample of hay, Guenthner

said.
"With baled hay, it is not difficult to get a good sample," he explained.
"Just take a core sample from 10 to 20 representative bales. These samples can be mixed together for a composite analysis. Each cutting should be sampled and analyzed sep-

Some farmers have made foragesamplers from ski poles. Readymade samplers are available from feed companies.

"The sampler is used in conjunction with a hand brace or electric drill." Guenthner said. "It takes core samples without much effort. They key to an accurate analysis is taking a representative sample of all the hay you have."

Seventeen Given Job Help In Latah County

Seventeen persons were placed on jobs this week through the Moscow office of the Department of Employment, said Frank Hartstein, Moscow Local Office Manager. SAFETY IS IMPORTANT DURING FARM MACHINERY REPAIR

Farm machinery repair during winter is wise management. Repairs made now will relieve busy season According to accident statistics, however, more persons are injured repairing machinery than are operating it. This caution from Wayne Fisher, Extension Safety Specialist, University of Idaho Coop-erative Extension Service.

Fisher offers some safety tips he hopes can avoid injuries. Eye injuries are quite common. Safety goggles are recommended, especially when hammering on steel or working with the emery wheel. Eye protection is a nuisance but, Fisher warns, not as much as the loss of any eye would be. Eyes of others working in the shop can be protected from the welder's flash by a simple home

built portable screen.

Electric cords are easily damaged in shop conditions. Broken or poorly repaired cords are not dependable Placing the and are dangerous. cord out of the way should be given time and attention. If broken, a proper splice should be made.

Strain injuries are common during equipment repair. The weight of objects to be handled should be recognized and a hoist used when needed Lifting injuries are often initiated by: bending over to lift, reaching while lifting or twisting the body to turn. Proper picking up procedures are: kneel on one knee, boost the heavy object onto the other knee and then rise up with it. Wrong lifting can rupture the diaphram in the chest cavity as well as cause back injuries and common hernia. Heavy objects also smash fingers and toes. Thinking and planning are an important part of lifting injury preven-

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



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
